We may grow a bit lazy at times in Texas and have a dislike for the cotton fields under the midday heat of summer, but we manage to produce crops enough to help feed and clothe the British. and the laziest cotton field laborer will do more real work, in a day than Prof. Todd does in a whole year. State Engineer Franks and en-gineer C. L. Hasie are busy this week making surveys for the new river bridge which will probably be started soon. The engineers are re-routing the road across the railroad wye. It is not definitely routed at this writing, but the engineers think that a route will be made just west of the Wye and an overpass across the railroad tracks constructed.

The highway grade was put up before the railroad started their track on the new South Plains line and when the big turning wye was built the highway crossed it twice according to the original survey. The new routing will only cross the track one time, and that will be on an overpass, where there will be no danger.

4 Complete surveys will be made up to the river bank for the bridge on both sides and everything put in shape for the actual construction of the bridge.

There will be no change in the routing of the highway through the city of Estelline. The grade as it stands will be concreted thru town east of the public square .-Estelline News.

That she married him for what she thought he had, and that she did not love him at all. 
