Smuggle Mexican Across is Cause of Fight.

While the casualties on the Mexican side of the border were not known tonight, it was estimated that 100 had been klled by fire from the American side while at least twice that number, including from the galleries. It is expected ed. It was reported tonight that the mayor of Nogales, Sonora, was killed, but this was not confirmed.

The fighting followed the alleged efforts of a Mexican custom official to smuggle a fellow country man across the boundry into the United States. An American sentry attempted to stop him. Two Mexicans fired at the sentry across the street, striking him in the right

The fire was returned by American patrols and after Mexicans rushed from nearby buildings and started shooting across the line behind buildings and walls

the firing became general. Keinforcements from the 35th Infantry detachment and the Ten th (colored) cavalry were rushed to the border and took up combat positions. It was reported tonight that a detachment of the Tenth Cavalry crossed the border in pur suit of the Mexicans, but this was not confirmed. ### **DESOLATION SITS** HEAVILY ON THE **WESTERN PLAINS**

Silent Caravans Move Out of Drouth Areas of Texas, Leaving Parched Land Postessions Behind.

Three years of drouth has placed a crown of thorns on the men, women and children of West Texas and without money, some without the very ne-cessities of life, without food for their animals who are drawing them toward greener fields and richer harvests, the caravans of desolation are dragging their way into the cities of Fort Worth and Waco, and men who held high their heads in title and ownership are offering themselves "for sale" that they may sustain their women and children sheltered from the flaming sun by tarpaulins which have not felt the moisture of the skies for so long that the youngest of the caravan never

"Heartrending" is the word that has come to Food Administrator Peden from the drouth area. Last year the farmers and the cattlemen braved it out. Surely nature, herself, could not be so cruel as to inflict upon them another year a scourge of intense heat and shriveling up of the plains; but this year there is nothing left to chal-lenge a ravage of nature as relentless as the great guns in their devastating

of the northern plains of France.

The situation is without the province of man and dollars. Rain has forgot ten the plains, no clouds break the intensity of the blue, no refreshment comes in dew, no relief advances in a kindly mist or fog. All that can be done is to help the men and the women and the children as they come into Eastern Texas.

The Silent Exedus.

E. B. Spiller, secretary of the Cattle ed that Fort Worth is crowded with wagons of "expatriates of the plains," and the same intelligence comes from Waco. On one day alone 125 families passed through Brownwood, and on another day 110 families passed through Goldthwaite.

On August 17 Administrator Peden wired to Governor Hobby on the situation

Drouth conditions now prevailing in Western Texas most serious in history of the country. Oldest inhabitants have no recollection of anything approaching it. Ten counties in the Brownwood district will not make an average of 500 bales of cotton per county as against normal production of 15,000 bales. Thousands of farmers and farm hands necessarily seeking other employment, and an average of 250 farmers a day are leaving the dis-

proper State and Federal aid, farmers would be able to plant wheat and oats, but they must have this aid."

Similar conditions to that in the Brownwood section are reported to Administrator Peden from the district administrators at San Angelo and Amarillo, and a recitation of these coniltions has been wired to Governor Hobby by the three administrators of Brownwood, San Angelo and Amarillo.

Trying to Help Them.

Administrator Peden is deeply concerned over the situation and has placed the facts before H. W. Lewis, chief of the United States employment service for Texas, at San Antonio, as well as directed letters to his county administrators urging that they give the extent of personal relief needed also that wherever these unhappy families can be placed so as to gain a ivelihood that immediate report be



What is a Federal Price Reporter? A man or woman appointed by Adminis 'Nor Peden to check prices as charged by retail merchants for licensed commodities of foodstuffs.

What is their duty? To check the stores in their respec tive communities not less than once a week on forms sent out by the Price Section of the Federal Food Administration for Texas.

How many are there in Texas? The list for August shows 300 names but it is growing daily. Appointments are based on population and the plan is to have one reporter for each town of 1500 or over; two for each town of 5000 or over; three for each town of 7500 or over; four for each town of 10,000 or over; and so on adding one Price Reporter for each 2500 addition-

al population. How are the Price Report blanks

Every retail store should be covered by the Price Reporters at least once a week, and as near a check made upon every community as possible. When the reports are received by the Price Section at State headquarters for the Federal Food Administration for Texas, the lists are checked against the Price Interpreting Committee fair price lists for the district in which they originate, and where there is evidence of excess profits the County Administrator is notified of the name of the offender, the date of the of fense, and the person making the check. An adjustment is then up to the County Food Administrator.

How are the Price Reporters co-re lated with the Price Interpreting Com-

Wherever possible the County Food Administrators should link the Price Reporting Committees with the Price Interpreting Committees. The two departments should work in close bar mony and Price Reperters should thor oughly familiarize themselves with the eterpretations of the Price Interpret ing Committees, noting carefully the derstanding the economic factors which enter into these changes. To not so UNDERSTAND is to miss com pletely the viewpoint and to render the work insufficient.

Are Price Reporters valuateers? Yes-just as the Food Administra-tion is essentially a volunteer work. There is no higher following today than that of Service to the Nation in one field or another, and men and wo men who are designated as Price Re porters should accept their appoin entering the army under the Selecti
