GOVERNMENT ESTI-MATE OF COTTON CROP TOO HIGH

Revised Figures Show Texas Crop Short. Hall Among The Leading Counties.

Washington, Jan. 7. Correctness of the Government's recently made estimate of the condition of the cotton crop was questioned at a meeting of the House Agriculture Committee today by Repre-

ands of acres planted to cotton had been abandoned and that a , considerable amount of the cotton produced and remaining in the field had suffered from bad weath-

er and would not be gathered. Revised figures of the Census Bureau for Texas announced today show that 2,234,495 bales of cotton of the crop had been ginned up to Dec. 13, as against 2,417,375 bales for the same period of last year in that State.

DEMOCRTS SEEK TO AVOID TREATY AS CAMPAIGN ISSUE

Washington, Jan. 6 .-- A definate move by Democratic Senators to prevent the treaty from being made a campaign issue developed this afternoon when Senator Mc-Nary, Republican, of Oregon, a leader of the Republican and reservationists, was handed a definite proposal for the compromise from the Democratic side.

The proposal embodied a new et of reservations which were said to embody the views of forty-four of the forty-seven Democratic Senators. They approached the so-called Lodge reservations more clearly than any substitute reservations Democratic Senators have thus far proposed.


