### WHY THE BONUS LOST


Veterans who hitched their adjusted compensation wagon to the star of the inflationists might have been holding saleable government bonds for their bonus certificates today, if they had stayed with a friend and a true friend instead of following a new Moses at this session of Congress.

Senator Tom Connally had obtained approval by the Senate finance committee of a bill to issue government bonds for the full amount due on the bonus, and to reduce the interest rate on loans against bonus certificates to two per cent.

He declared that the president would have approved the bill, and he ought to know. being one of the closest members of the Senate to the White House.

But the leaders of the veterans substituted the inflation bill on the floor of the Senate, and it was vetoed, and the veto sustained.

No further action on the compensation is expected at this session of Congress.

### LIVESTOCK SHIPMENTS ABOVE LAST YEAR'S

Austin, July 3.— Aggregate livestock shipments from Texas to Fort Worth and to interstate points during May were sharply above those of the similar month last year. There was a substantial decline in forwardings of both hogs and sheep.

Marketings of all classes of livestock combined totaled 7,298 cars, against 5,292 cars during May last year, an increase of 38 per cent. Comparative figures for the four classes of livestock composing this total were:

Cattle, 5,690 vs. 3,492 cars, an increase of 63 per cent; calves 610 vs. 490 cars, an increase of 25 per cent; hogs 264 vs. 351 cars, a decrease of 25 per cent; and sheep 734 vs. 959 cars, a decrease of 24 per cent.


