

Insufficient rest and overexercise the particularly common. It is more difficult, of course, to see that the child obtains sufficient rest during the summer, the long days and planned diversions beng largely responsible; but more rest, not less, should be the rule during the summer months. Heat and execise may interfere with proper digestion, indiscertions in diet are often permitted or even encouraged. Milk, the child's staple food, which deteriorates rapidly in warmth, is not sufficiently protected; and other foods are subjected to contaminations which would be less likely to occur in winter.

A sudden change from an indoor to an outdoor life often leads to long exposure to the summer sunshine and when this is unduly prolonged sunburn often results. Children who have played out in the sun all the year have become more or less hardened to the effects of the sun but those that don suntan suits for the first time should be careful not to prolong the exposure at first. Exposing the skin a short time at first and gradually increasing this will soon build up a beneficial tan without sunburn.

Abolishing Fee System for

Paying Officials · Two years ago a Senate investigating committee discovered a number of flagrant abuses of the fee system as practised in under the system there has been to Secretary of State Gerald C.

Proposed Amendment No. 6 on the ballot provides that the fee system as a method of paying certain precinct, county and district officials shall be abolished in counties having 20,000 or more population according to the last Federal census. The Legislature will, if the amendment is adopted, set the salaries for officials now receiving fees in such counties In counties of under 20,000 population the Commissioners Courts may put their county and precinct officials on a salary basis if they so desire. The Amendment does not specifically state who shall set the salaries of such officials in this case.

If this amendment is adopted all district officers must be compensated on a salary basis.

The amendment provides that fees shall continue to be collected the county instead of the officer The evident purpose of this amendment is to place as many insofar as is possible the payment of officials through the present

However, this point is merely one of the claims made and has not been substantiated by the Secretary of State. Advocates point out that they pay taxes to support public schools but that if they choose to send their children to private or parochial schools the least the State can do is to supply the textbooks free.

> Probably the most important and less publicized provision of this amendment is the fact that it proposes to rewrite Section 5 of Article Seven of the Constitution so as to permit the apportionment of school funds on some other basis than scholastic pop-

For many years there has been considerable agitation in certain quarters to abolish the "schoool census" or sholastic population system of apportioning school funds and substitute in heu thereof the "average attendance" basis or some other basis. The Legislature would determine jus how this was to be done, if this Amendment is adopted.

### FOUND SHE COULD IMPROVE CLOTHES CLOSET

"When my club asked me to take the wardrobe demonstration had not the slightest idea that there was an improvement which I could conveniently make in my clothes closet, said Mrs. Marion Wade, wardrobe demonstrator for the Country Woman's Club but as I started to work, I realized the closet was too dark, was crowded and ill arranged. I secured from a neighbor enough white ceiling paper to paper the inside of the closet. I painted the door and floor white. I made a hat rack, using the ends of a fruit box and two smoothe sticks, and painted it white. I rebuilt the clothes rod, and made two hanging hat holders; made a large door pocket having six spaces for hose, handkerchiefs, patterns, etc. I discarded some things which I had kept crowded in the closet, and put other things in more convenient places.

At a cost of 10 cents and a bit of time and work, I now have a clothes closet that seems much larger and is much lighter having plenty of space for my clothes and shoes, and leaving the floor space clear. The result is gratifying and the closet is nice enough for any room."
