WAR MUST BE WON, OUR FREEDOM PRESEVED

interest to our many readers.)

In an Independence Day address delivered from the steps of the historic state capitol of South Carolina at Columbia, National Commander Roane Waring sounded a warning that America may lose her freedom and independence at home while her armies are hammering out victories on foreign battlefields.

Declaring that it is "meet that we on this, probably one of the most tragic anniversaries of our independence, stop and carefully consider what might be called the state of the nation," National Commander Waring warned against "the dangers that threaten our form of government from within."

"Important as is our war effort," he said, "as necessary as it may be to devote our every energy to the successful be swept aside. conclusion of this war, we must be ever mindful that this war is being fought solely for the purpose of vindicating, sustaining and perpetuating our democratic ideals—the America of our forefathers. It would be a tragedy, indeed, to successfully conclude this war, dictate a peace of absolute victory and then discover that we had lost our freedom and independence at home.

"Ever before us then should march in step with our war effort the grim resolve to defend and perpetuate our democratic institutions, the ideals of our great American government—freedom guaranteed us by the Constitution and that is the right of every citizen to live his own life in the way of his own choosing, free from regimentation and from bureaucratic control.

"Ever should we be mindful that this government of their theories and illusionary dreams. ours was created for the sole purpose of protecting the rights of the individual, of guaranteeing to him the enjoyment of free enterprise in the exercise of his free initiative Our government was never created to dominate him, to control him, to suppress him nor to dictate to him his personal life.

"These inalienable rights must at all times be jealously guarded, more so now than ever before, lest in our zest for prosecuting the war we overlook entirely the necessity of guarding our domestic rights. These inalienable rights must not be taken for granted. We have always had them —they came to us as free as the air we breathe. With our forefathers this was not so. They fought and bled, and many of them died for these rights.

The flower of our young manhood has been called to arms. Our job on the home front is to preserve the freedom of this, their America, and to keep the necessary war materials flowing to them. The hearts of the American people are with their soldiers. While they may be somewhat confused at times by the veritable patchwork of government regulations and counter-regulations, they are honestly, fervently and conscientiously doing their best.

"Yes, there have been failures. There have in some p laces been collapses of the war effort. There have been unnecessary and acrimonious disputes that have arisen between the masess and the classes of American people. There have been strikes. There has been much absenteesm and many slow-downs in war work. There can be no more excuse for either management or for labor to desert their jobs than there is an excuse for the soldier who deserts the battleline. All of this responsibility for these failures cannot be laid alone on the doorsteps of management or of labor. Much responsibility rests upon the shoul ders of government, for there has been a failure of government in leadership and directing.

"Just as the lack of a strong leadership can wreck an army, so can also the vacillating policy which the government pursued toward labor and management wreck production. Such vacillating policy tends to confuse the issues and encourage strikes when none would exist if strong leadership had been forthcoming!

"Thank heaven, Congress has at last awakened to its responsibility—it is now fulfilling its obligation in this constitutional government of ours by passing the legislation necessary to meet our war needs. Ours is a constitutional government whether we be at peace or at

"In the capital of our nation long even before Pearl Harbar many of those on the Federal payroll developed affections for new and un-American philosophies of government. They created a gigantic political octopus whose powerful tentacles seek to reach further and further into the private lives of American citizens. Here in this government of ours these so-called master minds of politics, distinguished only by their inexperience and incompetency, but steeped in foreign ideologies, have built a patchwork of bureaucratic directives.

"With these they seek to put class against class, business against labor, farmer against consumer, and, yes, race against race. This pattern of modernistic art to the average American is without meaning or design. Too many of our people in the stress of war seem somehow to have forgotten that this government of ours was founded by men of business and of wisdom and of judgment. Out of their collective experience they built for us the pattern

"We hear on every side talk of so-called mass movements, of social revolutions. What does all this mean?? Social revolutions against what? Our government and our country? God forbid! But nevertheless it has become the

Only a short while ago the Vice-President of this country was quoted in a speech as saying: 'The peoples' revolution is on the march, and the devil and all his angels cannot prevail against it.' "America's war effort must in no way be abated, but at the same time we must zealously guard the preparation for the future and we must be ever ready to strike and strike with telling effect at any move calculated to commit this country to a course not carefully charted along the lines of sound Americanism.





Proclamation

RECOGNIZING THE FACT that in carrying the war into enemy territory, we shall need greater amounts of money than any nation has ever asked from its citizens in all history, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, do officially proclaim that on Thursday, the ninth of September, 1943, the Third War Loan shall be launched.

As Commander-in-Chief, I hereby invoke every citizen to give all possible aid and support to this Third War Loan drive, not only so that our financial goal may be reached, but to encourage and inspire those of our husbands and fathers and sons who are under fire on a dozen fronts all over the world. It is my earnest hope that every American will realize that in buying War Bonds in this Third War Loan he has an opportunity to express voluntarily and under the guidance of his conscience, the extent to which he will "back the attack."

The American people supported well the first and second War Loan drives and in fact did even more than was asked of them. Our need for money now is greater than ever, and will continue to grow until the very day that Victory is won; so we must ask far more sacrifice, far more cooperation than ever before.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.
