"It appears without any question that the miners are due some wage adjustment. A recent report pointed out that their wage scale had been increased nearly 100 per-cent, from \$23 some odd, to around \$41 some odd. At first glance, that appears as a sufficient increase, and a sufficient wage, even in these times. But, on the other hand, the work of the miners is extra hazardous. Sometimes they lay on their backs, or on their sides, to mine the coal, away down in the bowls of the earth.





"If Lewis and his miners do not wish to mine coal for use by vital defense plants, then let them be sent to the war fronts to do the nation's fighting,

and let soldiers and service men whose places they take, come home and mine the coal. Unquestionably there are thousands of boys in service who would jump at the chance to swap jobs, or duties.
