## **Eradication of** Bitterweed Is Studied By Group

Control and eradication measures designed to combat poison bitterweed were studied by the local Soil Conservation Service staff when they recently visited the Texas Experiment Station ranch near Barnhart.

The Experiment Station ranch consists of 5 sections of grassland, located on true divide type range, and was heavily infested with bitterweed when the Station was established in the fall of

The ranch is crossfenced into numerous pastures, and pastures are stocked with straight cattle, straight sheep, mixed grazing with cattle and sheep, and various methods of rotated grazing with both straight

and mixed stocking.
Wallace Dameron, in charge of the Experiment Station ranch (which is a part of the Main Station located southeast of Sonora), met the group at the Station headquarters and explained the treatment and results on each pasture. "The ranch is stocked with one animal unit to 16 acres, Realizing that the food tunity to plant or raise corn tuation was going to be for table use.

or 40 animal units per section" Mr. Damron stated. He added that bitterweed on the station had decreased 60 per cent since 1938.

Mr. Dameron attributed the bitterweed decrease largely to increased competition from other vegetation, which has improved rapidly (Continued on Page 2)





## DAIRY FOODS HAVE GONE TO WAR



To provide for the nutritional | 16 pounds of butter the average needs of the nation's fighting forces and for lend lease, civilians must get along with less dairy products in 1943 amounting to the equivalent of 39 quarts of milk. Last year the

American ate. This year we can only have 12.8 pounds of butter coming from 121 quarts of milk. Last year the average person consumed the cheese from 30 quarts of milk, the ice cream from 21 quarts of milk and condensed and decrease. This average person consumed 397 of milk, the ice cream from 21 quarts of milk as milk or milk products. This was more than in any previous year. For 1943 there are only 358 quarts of milk available for cheese for the average person 13 quarts for ice green and 13

are only 358 quarts of milk available per person.

There have also been important shifts in the way in which milk is consumed. Last year the average person consumed the equivalent of 177 quarts of milk as milk and cream. This year there will be 190 quarts per person available in that form.

But in every other case the amount of dairy products available has declined. Last year 150 quarts of milk went into the making of the later of the average person; 13 quarts for ice cream and 13 quarts for milk in other forms.

Even though production is higher than last year all of the balance of the product is being used for the armed forces and for lend lease. Because of the exceptional nutritional and protective qualities of dairy products soldiers are given approximately twice as much of them as are available for the average person; 13 quarts for cice cream and 13 quarts for milk in other forms.




