



The barn itself is of approved construction, with concrete floor, and with all openings screened and kept as nearly fly-proof as possible. The milk is cooled by being flowed over a container filled with ice. It is then put into sterilized bottles which are capped by a machine, thereby guaranteeing that no human hands come into contact with the interior of the bottles or the milk.

The milking barn and milk rooms are scrubbed daily, and all utensils used in the process of cooling and bottling the milk are sterilized every time they are used.

In addition to the whole milk sold, Mr. Stanford supplies cream to a number of homes and to several cafes in Eldorado. Still another dairy product which is very popular in the summer months is chocolate milk, in the manufacture of which the same scrupulous care is taken as with all the other operations of the dairy.
