Edens, Chairman of Sch-leicher County USDA War Board. Those needing a larger amount of ammunition than can be secured by using Certificate No. 4 may purchase a special quota (50 rounds of .22 caliber long rifle cartridges, 20 center fire rifle cartridges, and 25 shotgun shells) by using certificate No. 5, provided they secure these amounts written orders are in the hands of the dealer by that the shortage of ammunition date. If a farmer or rancher needs a larger amount of ammunition than can be secured by using Certificate No. 4 and 5, he may apply to the Government Division, War Production Board, Washington, D. C. using Form PD-860.
