The start of the drive was slow and to many discouraging, but the chairman kept pulling axes out of his sleeve and the more he pulled the more his precinct chairmen and other helpers pulled. The "flush" was placed on the table Saturday and the workers went to town with what was lacking to put the quota over and if we haven't mis-figured went over the top some \$18,025.00.

## 121,750 POUNDS SCRAP METAL COLLECTED BY ARMY IN THREE DAYS

Although the county had previously been "worked" in gathering of scrap metal, a very substantial amount had been collected at the end of a three-day collection drive being conducted here this week by Army men and trucks.

Lieut. Don Parsons stated at the close of Wednesday's collection that 121,750 pounds had been collected. "Those having scrap that is at this time essentially needed are urged to notify the county agent's office, W. M. Patterson, Jr., or others on the committees," Lieutenant Parsons said.

## Bond Quota Over More Than \$18,000

Seventy thousand dollars was the figure that remained to be raised at the opening of business Saturday morning. . . This figure was what was needed to put Schleicher county over the top in regard to their bond quota of the Third War Loan.

Before midnight Saturday, however, it was announced that an approximate total of \$70,000.00 had been sold that day. This brought the total up to \$237,925.00, going over the quota \$18,025.

## Land Bank Loan Interest Is Reduced

A. E. Prugel, Secretary-Treasurer of the Sonora National Farm Loan Association, has received information that the Board of Directors of the Federal Land Bank of Houston has authorized the lowering of the interest rate to 4 percent on all Federal Land Bank loans, made through national farm loan associations that now bear interest rate at above 4 percent per annum, effective July 1, 1944.

This reduction in the contract rate of interest will effect about 80 percent of the Land Bank borrowers in this area, according to Mr. Prugel. Prior to 1935, he said, loans were closed at 4 1/4 to 6 percent, depending upon the cost of money in the bond markets at that time. All Land Bank Loans have been made at a contract rate of 4 percent since March 1935.

"The action of the Board of Directors of the bank in effect guarantees that the rate will not go higher than 4 percent for the life of the loan," Mr. Prugel said. "This voluntary reduction of the contract rate of interest is made possible by the successful operation of the Land Bank System of cooperative credit which is designed to make available necessary farm credit at low rates and on long terms."

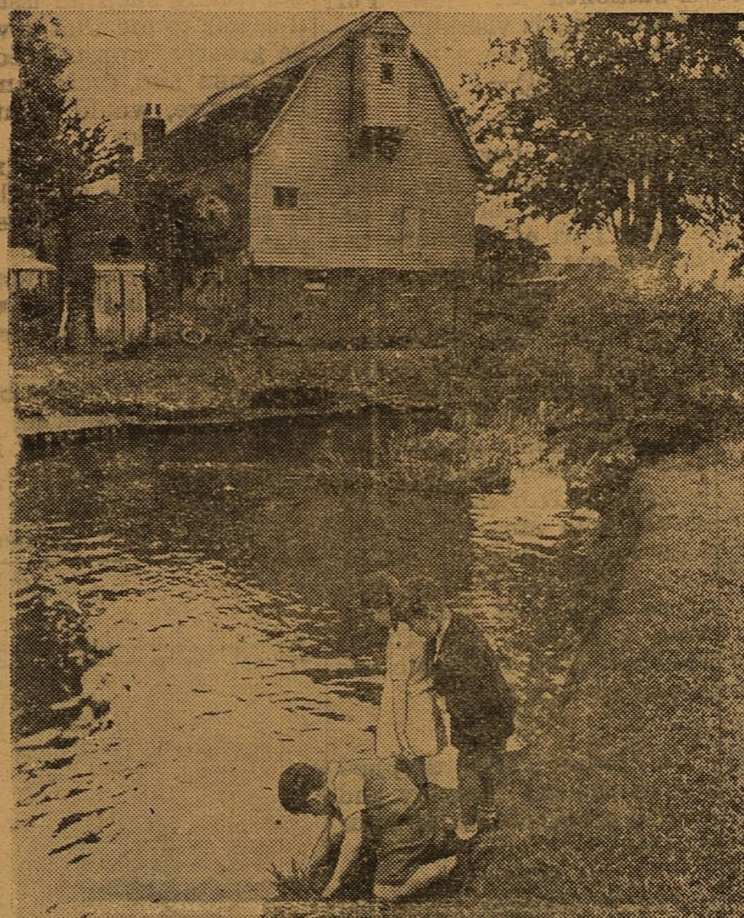

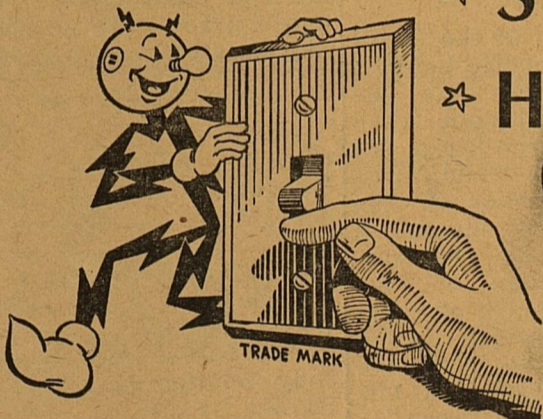

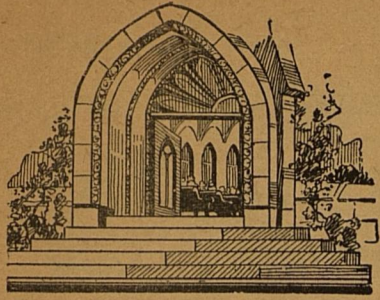

The copper situation in this county is serious. The base of every shell is copper. We need additional telegraphic and telephone lines on the front which are made of copper. Tin cans collected in this section of Texas are prepared for shredding material for use in precipitation mining of copper.
