CONVAIR WORKER'S EGG SAYS WAR TO END IN NOVEMBER

(Editor's Note: The following is an article taken from "The Eagle," weekly publication of Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp. Fort Worth, and is being reproduced by request):

"War Ends-11-15-44."

So reads the inscription on an egg found by Elton G. Patton, fire department, in his hen nest

Chemists disagree on the origin of the inscription-one group asserting that it is the work of man and another declaring that the writing is definitely a natural part of the egg shell.

Fire Chief Charles H. Jones, who has been custodian of the egg since it was brought to Convair, explains that the inscription is gible and cannot be scraped or removed with acid. The inscription is the same color as the egg shell but is slightly in relief.


