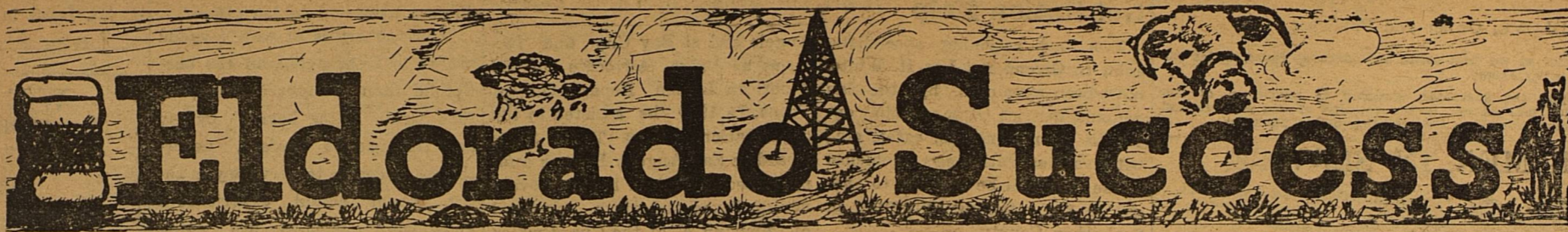

Down Fort McKavett way the D. C. O. Wilsons last November purchased 400 cut-back lambs and placed them in a pasture which had been ungrazed for three years. Without additional feeding these lambs were shorn this Spring, producing an average of 8 pounds of wool to the lamb. Recently they were shipped to Fort Worth where they averaged 95 pounds upon arrival (out of the wool), and brought 12 cents per pound.

And a sale reported this week was purchase of 70 milk lambs from the Finley estate at \$9.75 and shipped to Fort Worth.

San Angelo Attorney Seeking Dist. Judge Post In 51st District

W. S. Leslie, attorney of San Angelo, announces his candidacy for the office of District Judge of the 51st Judicial District composed of Tom Green, Schleicher, Irion, Coke and Sterling Counties.

Mr. Leslie, a member of a pioneer West Texas family, is 46 years of age and moved to San Angelo just over ten years ago. For the past six and a half years he has, in addition to the regular practice of law, served as City Judge of the City of San Angelo under several changes in the city administration.

He is a World War veteran, having volunteered at the age of 18, and having served overseas with the 169th Aero Squadron for approximately eighteen months. After returning home, he attended Texas University and Baylor University and graduated with an L. L. B. in 1925. He began the practice of law in Bay City, Matagorda County, in 1925 and continued there until the spring of 1934 when he moved to San Angelo.

Mr. Leslie has taken an active part in civic affairs. He is a member of the First Baptist Church, the Masonic Lodge, the American Legion and the Kiwanis Club. He has served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Board of City Development of San Angelo. Grade One Tire Supply Is Limited

A recent announcement that "B" and "C" gas ration book holders are eligible for Grade 1 passenger car tires has led many to believe that there are enough of these tires to meet all needs, yet applications are greatly exceeding the county quotas, J. E. Hill, chairman of the local ration board, has announced.

Unless a person is an "essential eligible," which means that he is contributing to the war effort, and unless the county's quota is adequate, many applicants for Grade 1 passenger car tires may have to take a certificate for a Grade III tire, Mr. Hill explained. The local board is examining all applications carefully, on the basis of "essential eligibility." It is necessary to apply to the board for any tire, and to have a certificate before making a purchase.

Pineapples Are Being Secured For Canning

The Schleicher County Home Demonstration Club Marketing Committee wish to inform the public and club members that they are taking orders now for pineapple. Orders should be placed immediately with a member of the club committee or with the president, if you desire pineapple.

The pineapple will cost \$3.30 per dozen, and will average approximately 4 pounds; this figure about 28c each. Purchase price must accompany orders, and there will be a 36-hour notice before arrival of the fruit. The local Red & White Store will handle the fruit for the committee and purchasers free of cost, and for that reason it is requested the fruit be removed as soon as possible. It is hoped to have as many as 300 dozen orders. Remember you must order now.

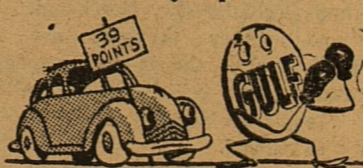

Numerous complaints have been made to City Officials regarding cows molesting Victory Gardens and Lawns over the city.

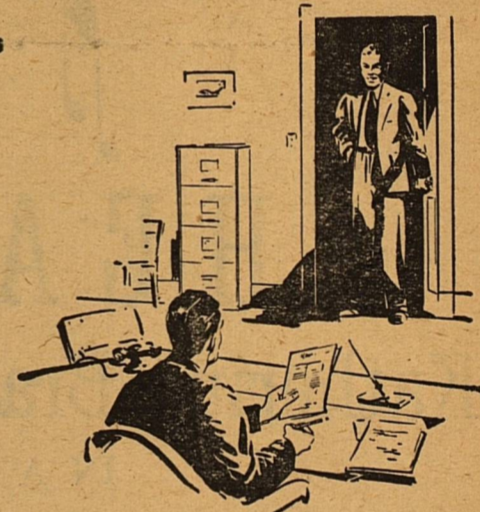
At a meeting of the City Council held this week, action was taken to make an appeal to cow owners to prevent cows getting loose and damaging property.

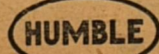
