Giant Killer." The school is open to all children age 4 years through those entering the sixth grade. There will be Bible, music, games with prizes and lunch on the ground for all who attend.

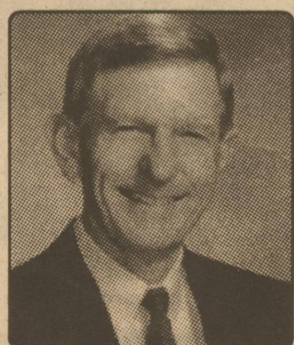

approved the district's financial reports and amended the 1999-2000 budget by moving \$198,142.00 from the district's reserves or "fund balance." The trustees also authorized a contract for student accident insurance but held out the possibility that they might upgrade the plan at a future meeting.

Finance director Loretta Edmiston reported to the board that the district's summer meal program served an average of 66 children per day during its first week. She noted the response to the program has been good and that attendance increased steadily during the week.

The trustees then met with SCISD's Annenberg program director Mark Marshall, who has already submitted his resignation the district and will be leaving at the end of the month to attend law school in Lubbock. Board president Phil McCormick explained that the board wanted to evaluate the program's performance before committing to hire a replacement for Marshall. A lengthy discussion ensued followed by an even longer executive session. At one point in the closed door meeting, Supt. Hal Porter was called in to meet with the board. However, when the group emerged into open session they took no action on the subject.

The board then received a report about the Class Reduction Act evaluation. It was noted that a portion of a teacher's salary is paid for by the act for the purpose of reducing class size. The trustees also approved the District Improvement Plan and had a first reading of the Student Cod of Conduct.

Trustee Ilse William's resignation was then accepted by unanimous vote and Kurtis Homer was appointed to fill William's unexpired term.

Before adjourning, the board voted to spend \$30,000.00 to purchase several city lots along W. Fields Avenue, N. Oak Street and W. Brooks Avenue.

County employees want new phone system

The most pressing subject on the agenda at the June 12 meeting of the Schleicher County Commissioner's Court was the aging phone system in the courthouse. According to employees who work in the building, the phone system has been making life miserable for years. It was explained that some phones don't work at all, while others require the person answering to shout. Several elected officials and county employees were on hand to plead with commissioners for a new phone system.

Listening to the requests were County Judge Johnny Griffin, Commissioner's Ross Whitten and Bill Clark. Commissioners Johnny Mayo and Steve Minor were absent. Lydia Vallejo, secretary to Judge Griffin, told the men that anytime she answered a call she had to shout to be heard. Several times during the meeting this became evident when she answered the phone in her office, which is next door to the Commissioner's Court room.

After discussing the item the commissioners instructed Mrs. Vallejo to contact phone system

providers to request bids for a new system.

The commissioners then discussed the possibility of Sheriff Doran moving a mobile home onto the airport property. It was noted that it would be necessary to have someone living at the airport in order for the county to have a "terminal" designation at the facility. Sheriff Doran seemed receptive to the idea, however, no formal action was taken on the matter.

Judge Griffin then reported that Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative had recalculated the cost of installing ceiling fans in the Memorial Building. He noted the cost to the county will be \$1,500.00, some \$500 less than the county had expected to pay.

Sheriff Doran reported to the commissioners he would be providing them with quarterly activity reports from his department. He noted that citizens often ask commissioners questions about the Sheriff's Dept. and told the men that he hoped the reports would help them answer such questions.

Commissioner Bill Clark then reported to the Sheriff that the vehicle belonging to the new rural

route mail carrier, Sherry Gibson, had been mistaken for a deputy's vehicle. Clark said the car, a Chevy Lumina, with a flashing light on the roof had caused one citizen to contact him and ask why the Sheriff's office was going through their mail.

In other business, the commissioners voted to pay \$149.50 yearly dues to the Concho Valley Council of Governments. They then went into an executive session to discuss personnel issues. Upon returning to open meeting, the commissioners took no action on the subject.

Judge Griffin reported receiving correspondence from the Texas Forest Service concerning a fireworks ban. However, due to much of the county receiving rains recently, the commissioners opted to table further discussion of a ban. Also tabled was the annual contribution to the Community Resource budget for the 2000 fiscal year.

County Treasurer Karen Henderson reported transferring \$150,000 from the General Fund, Farm/Market and Airport Fund money market accounts to the respective checking accounts.

Next, Judge Griffin reported receiving a warning from State Rep. Harvey Hilderbran's office about proposed hiring standards for jailers and law-enforcement dispatchers. Judge Griffin said the new rules, if adopted, would require all jailers and dispatchers to have a college degree. He said this would create an undue burden on small counties like Schleicher.

The commissioners ended their meeting by reviewing proposals from engineering firms and grant management firms for the upcoming round of Texas Community Development Program grants. Once the commissioners score the proposals the court could vote to contract with two of the firms to represent the county.

Community. But, a drought was settling in and the Shaws leased the farm and moved to Eldorado in 1946.

They operated the ice house for a time and later the Gulf Station on Main Street by Cameron Lumber Yard. When the new Gulf Station opened on Robinson's Corner (where Eldorado Pharmacy stands today) Mr. Shaw became the operator until he sold it to Mr. Ervin Mund in September 1951. C.N. ran for Sheriff and Tax Assessor/Collector in 1951 losing the race to the incumbent, E.H. (Greasy) Sweat. At the time of the election, C.N. was working for a pipeline company.

The Shaws purchased the Keno's Motel in 1963 from Mrs. Ogden after they had sold their

Bailey Ranch farm to T.C. Meador. Mr. Keno Ogden built the 12-unit motel in 1951, on the property once occupied by a two-story building owned by Kate E. Robinson. That building had burned in 1950. Mr. Ogden passed away on January 23, 1963 and the Shaws purchased the motel from his widow in March of that same year.

Keno's Motel was then modernized with carpet, televisions, telephones and new units and renamed Shaw's Motel. Just over two years later, C.N. Shaw passed away in his home on August 31, 1965. He died of lung cancer.

Between the years of 1965 and 1972 Edith managed the motel by herself. Then, her sister Christine Hodges came from Stanton to live with her. Christine's husband, who worked for the Soil & Water Con-

servation District had passed away shortly before that time.

Christine became part of Shaw's Motel history, too. She has worked alongside Edith for 28 years. Together they built and maintained a thriving business in this small West Texas town.

They say it will be hard to leave Eldorado, but they are looking forward to living nearer their relatives who promise to dote on them.

Edith says the motel became a way of life to her...a way of life that was full of hard work. She also says she will miss all the friends she accumulated while spending the past 63 years in Schleicher County.

Before we parted, I asked Edith what her husband's C.N.'s initials stood for. She leaned near me and said, "If I told you, he would kill me."

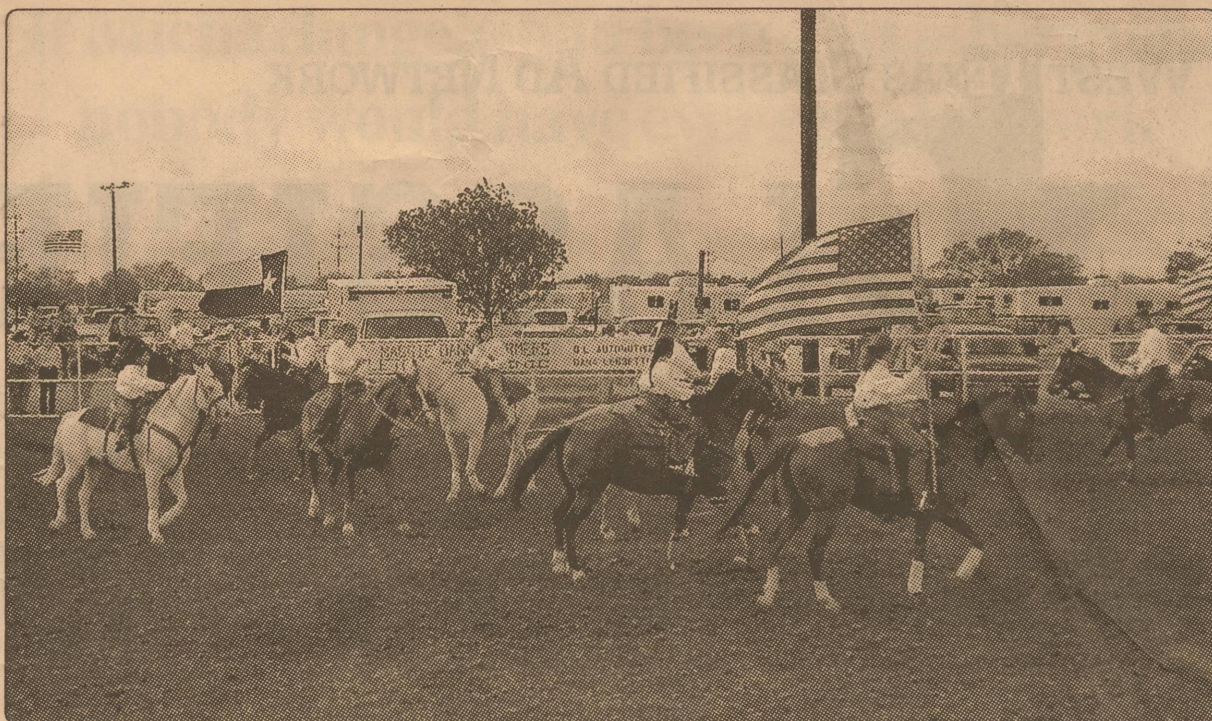
