## County Court Meets Monday Evening With All Members Present

Will We Get Good Roads in Schlecicher County?
That depends to a great extent on county of ficials. It's up to them to get the proper application submitted for government
which to repair the lateral roads.

August 7, the Lions club appointed a committee to make an investigation of the government's offer to furnish money to take care of the unemployed, and at the same time give to the the unemployed, and at the same time give to the
states and counties some permanent improvestates and counties some permanent improve-
ment for public benefit. After a trip to the District WPA office, the committee met with the County Commissioners and recommended that immediate steps be taken to secure government funds, and offered the help of the entire club in assisting the officials of the county in any way possibla

During the week beginning August 11, the committee met with the taxpayers and voters of the county at the various community centers throushout the county. At these meetings a great deal of interest was shown. The plans were explained, whereby the government would furnish the money to build farm-to-market roads. The county would be out very little money. Every man attending these meetings expressed a desire for good roads-and recognized this as a chance of a life time.

Tuesday, Autgust 20 , a county-wide meeting was held with the WPA officials present. They explained the entire setup and stressed the importance of "quick action.
Friday, August 23, a meeting was called in San Angelo for all county and city officials, the purpose of which was to familiarize them concerning the WPA set-up and tell them how to go about getting the applications in and for how much.

Several members of the Lions Club were present, and it was an inspiration to see the work of every county official in this district.

Those who attended the meeting in San Angelo went home and got busy. The committeemen who attended from Eldorado came back home and started out to get some action. After a week of inactivity the WPA men made a trip down here and did everything in their power to impress on us the importance of immediate a tion on account of the dead-line set by the Washington office. All applications had to reach the San Antonio office by September 6.

Finally three of the Commissioners were called, and an engineer tentatively employed, and an application filed with the WPA office. This application, in letter form was necessary to reserve the allotment for Schleicher county. However, the application will not be passed on until plans and specifications are sent in with the final application all signed up in the proper form.

Monday of this week the engineer who had tentative agreement with the county, turnied in his resignation.

This week an effort is being made to secure the services of a competent engineer in order that the plans may be sent in at the earliest date possible.

If these plans are submitted in the proper manner and reach the WPA office, we have a good chance of obtaining the money with which to build roads.
