



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

the Independence of Texas and was one of the signers of the declaration. Soon thereafter, on March 16, 1836, he was elected as Secretary of War in the provisional government. Rusk tactfully conveyed President Burnet's order to Houston to stop the retreat eastward, take the Harrisburg road, and meet the enemy in battle. At San Jacinto he fought gallantly, assuming command after Houston was wounded and pressing on to victory. He then pursued the retreating Mexicans to Goliad. There the remains of Fannin and his men were given a military burial, in "the biggest grave in Texas."

When Houston became president, he selected Rusk as Secretary of War. Rusk later resigned from Houston's cabinet and began practicing law in Nacogdoches. He served in the House of Representatives, Second Congress of the Republic, September 25, 1837 to May 24, 1838.

He took an active part in making war upon the Cherokee Indians in East Texas, and was a leader in the battle of July 16,

Orville S. Carpenter about a report completed this week.

Four years ago the audit was started by the Senate Investigating Committee in conjunction with the State Auditor and the State Comptroller. At that time number of sheriffs were indicted and two of the officials committed suicide. "Local officers receive fees from the State for felony cases and for the legal procedure necessary in prosecution. Deficiency certificates (promise of the State, to pay when the Legislature makes an appropriation) are given these local officials. When the Legislature appropriates the money, local officers bring their certificates in and receive payment. Our audit was to determine, whether or not these claims were just," Mr. Carpenter explained. "Forgeries and other irregularities were discovered, but the principal reason for refusing payment on a fee account is that the official has already been paid fees in excess of the amount to which he is legally entitled," the State Auditor said. "Claims totaling \$574,255.53 have been set up against fee officers, and of this amount \$119,-498.13 in cash has been collected. At present the greater part of these claims is in the hands of the Attorney General for collection. Of the deficieency audited, \$306,850.99 was refused as representing invalid claims for payment against the State. By elimination of practices heretofore existing, \$831,714.51 in fees was cut from the judiciary appropriation," he continued. "Actual saving to the taxpayer made possible by this audit was \$1,712,821," Mr. Carpenter declared.
