Tonnage This Year

Handles 400,000 Pounds More Than In 1936; Shearing Just About Over

Shows Increased Wool

Local Wool House

This week brought to a close the shearing of the 1937 spring clip of wool in Eldorado section and wools of local ranchmen are either stored in the warehouse or are on board steamers destined for the mills who contracted them earlier in the season.

Records of wool company reveal a substantial increase in tonnage again this season, exceeding 1936 by over 400,000 pounds, or an increase approximately 30 per cent over last year, and 300 per cent over 1932, the first year of operation. Wools of the 1937 clip contracted thru the warehouse amounted to 1,292,377 pounds at an average price of 35 1-2 cents per pound. Of contracted

wools, less than 90,000 pounds remain to be shipped. Free wools (uncontracted) received by the firm amount to 554,624 pounds of which approximately 65,000 pounds have been sold at prices ranging from 35 cents to 40 1-2 cents per pound. Warehouse has on hand unsold and uncontracted 487,-626 pounds which are being held for prices above the current quotations.



The minimum monthly benefit that will be paid is \$10, which goes to the beneficiary who has been paid only \$2,000 total wages, while the maximum monthly benefit will be \$85 per month To qualify for a monthly benefit that will be paid is \$10, which goes to the beneficiary who has been paid only \$2,000 total wages, he must have received these wages in some part of 5 different calendar years, and he must cease working for wages in coverded employment. Benefits are based on wages received, and are figured on the basis of 1-2 regularly, part-time, or temorarily, since January 1. The report per cent of the first \$3,000 wages received, or \$15 a month, plus 1-12 per cent per month on the next \$42,000, or \$35, plus 1-24 per cent per month on the next \$84,000 or \$35, making a total of \$85 per month maximum. As an example, Clark said, a man now 60 years of age who works for \$50 a month for the next five years till he is 65 years old, will have received \$600 a year for five years, or a total of \$3,000. The coarsely round sulphurs of 80 to 100 nesh screen test did not give satisfactory results. increase their productive value. Even though their hours go down their usefulness and their wages go up.

The labor unions have also been a factor. They have won many concessions from management, and cut the working week without cutting wages.

Management has also done a great deal to make shorter hours possible. It has improved the technique of production in many ways, to the end that less employe motion be wasted, and that each worker produce more in his working time. It has often voluntarily reduced hours even as it has raised hourly rates of pay.

ernment has been a factor. A number of states, of which Oregon was the first, have specified the maximum hours per week which women in industry can work, and these statutes have been upheld in the courts as being necessary to the public health and well being. The Federal government has also stepped in, as happened with the NRA. A Federal law now in effect refuses government contracts to manufacturers whose employes work more than 40 hours a week.
