When to print a disagreeable story and when to leave one out of the paper is one of the most troublesome problems of a smalltown editor. In the case of a person who is unfaithful to a public trust, or one who is guilty of serious crime, it is not difficult to decide, because the public interest, as well as the public's right to have the news, demands that it be printed.

There are some cases, however, in which the offense is entirely of a personal nature, and in which publishing the story would bring sorrow and embarrasment to innocent presons without serving any beneficial purpose. In these the making of a proper decison is often not easy. If the story is printed, relatives and friends of the person concerned will feel that it is unnecessary; in it is suppressed, the scandal mongers will be dissappointed, and many will insinuate that the editor was "bought off."

These same scandal-mongers would howl the loudest, however, held up to public gaze.

So it's hard to please everybody and no editor of sense tries to please everybody. He must let his own judgement and his own conscience be his guide.

WILL CALICHE STREETS: AP-POINT DEFENSE IN SUIT FILED AGAINST CITY

A called meeting of the City Council was held last Monday night for the purpose of discussing several things which the city is undertaking.

It was decided at this meeting to sponsor the W. P. A. project of placing caliche on the principal streets of Eldorado. About \$9,000 or more will be spent in this work, it is believed, with \$8,200 being furnished by the government under the Works Progress Administration.



### Senator Connally Urges Senate Aid To U. S. Farmers

Washington, D. Many of these farmers will pay out. They are on the land, they are working, they are digging, they are trying to get out, and they are not on a relief roll in town. If we can give a billion and a quarter dollars to people to do nothing, I do not see how the Government will suffer much by giving \$40,000,-000 in the form of reduced interest rates to people who are at work establishing homes and increasing the value of those hom-

"The land banks will have to absorb some of the reduction for this period of extension; but it is justified aid, it is sound aid, given to people who are trying to pay for them, and who are out in the hot sun at work.'



#### How To Get The Money

When the special session be gins next month to wrestle with the problem of raising revenue to take up the \$10,000,000 general fund deficit, another effort will be made in both houses to do something about applying existing taxes equally and fairly. The effort has been made in many sessins, and has always failed. Rep. C. M. McFarland, of Wichita Falls, best-informed house tax expert, has fought ussuccessfully in many sessions for measures equalizing property assessment, and enforcing collection of celinquent taxes. Sen. Manley Head of Stephenville plans to sponsor the fight in the senate again. Head cites figures to show the state could pick up \$400,000 annually by merely ironing out the inequalities of automobile taxation. Last year, 1.532,169 motor cars were licensed, but only 948,741 of these cars were rendered for ac valorem property taxes. On those rendered, the valuations show wide variance, so that the average value of all the cars in Texas is less than \$100 each-while in some counties, the average valuation is over \$200. Galveston-Co's average is \$208. Live Oak-Co's is \$10. Upshur-co's average valuation on its 4250 cars is about \$6 each.

#### Great Inequality .....

Duval-Co lists only 81 autos on its tax records, but issued licenses to 2714. Andrews, Hall, Hill and Swisher counties failed to tax any automobile, altho 14,-960 licenses were issued in these four counties. Head points out passage of a simple statue, requiring automobile owners to snow they had rendered them cars for property taxation before a license is issued to them, would put nearly half a million collars annually into the state's treasury, without imposing any new taxes. anothers classic example of inequality of valuation is in two central Texas counties where mules are rendered in one county at \$25 a head, and just across the line in the neighboring county, at \$2.50.

McFarland estimates that 11 billion dollars of property that ought to be on the rolls is escaping taxation—and that the tax yield from this would give the state enough to wipe out the state's \$10,000,000 deficit and leave 10 to 12 million dollars additional for payment of oldage pensions, without imposing a cent of new taxes, or raising any existing tax rates.




