

#### Little Spiced Cakes Are Tempting Dessert



Little spiced cakes provide tempting variety for the dessert bill-offare, says the Home Cooking editor of Capper's Farmer, a publication of national circulation.

These cakes require only 1/2 cup of sugar and are topped with a toothsome frosting that uses no sugar at

1/4 c. shortening 1/4 c. sugar 2 eggs, beaten 1 c. molasses 3 c. flour 1 tsp. soda 1/4 tsp. cloves

½ tsp.cinnamon ½ tsp. nutmeg 1 c. sour milk

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs and molasses. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with milk. Add lemon rind and raisins. Bake in greased cup cake tins for 20-25 minutes or a 2-pound loaf pan, for 40 minutes, in moderate oven (350°). Makes 3 dozen cup cakes. Frost with Fluffy Frosting:

2 egg whites 1 c. light corn sirup 1/4 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Beat egg whites and salt until frothy. Add corn sirup in fourths, beating until frosting is thick and holds a peak. Beat in flavoring. The stiffness can be controlled by adding more or less sirub.

With the Republican convention set for late June and the Democratic convention three weeks later, the recess is scheduled to last till about August 1, but subject to call in case of an emergency.


