Awarding of the Purple Hear posthumously has been made to Sgt. Raymond R. Reynolds, who died May 13, last, as the result of wounds received in action overseas.

Mrs. Mary M. Reynolds of the Rudd community, is in receipt of the following letter from Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson, written June 16.

"My dear Mrs. Reynolds:

"At the request of the President, I write to inform you that the Purple Heart has been awarded posthuomusly to your son, Sergeant Raymond R. Reynolds, Air Corps, who sacrificed his life in defense of his country.

"Little that we can do or say will console you for the death of your loved one. We profoundly appreciate the greatness of your loss, for in a very real sense the loss suffered by any of us in this battle for our country, is a loss shared by all of us. When the medal, which you will shortly receive, reaches you, I want you to know that with it goes my sincerest sympathy, and the hope that time and the victory of our cause will finally lighten the burden of your grief.

"Sincerely yours,

"Henry L. Stimson." Other awards made to Sergeant Reynolds after he arrived overseas included the Good Conduct Medal the Middle-East Campaign Ribbon and two Stars. He entered the service in July, 1942, and went overseas in February of 1943.
