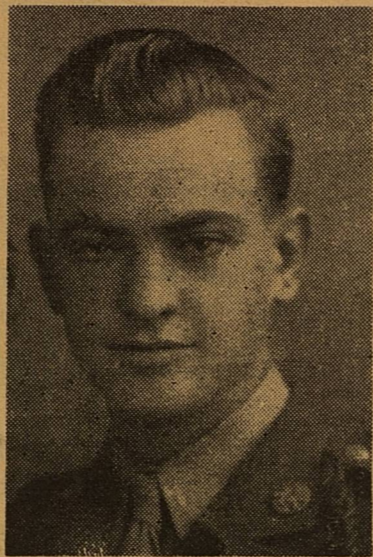

## Two Servicemen Serving Overseas Wounded; Purple Heart Awarded

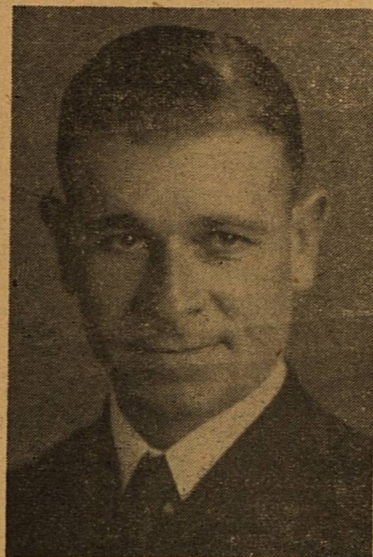

**Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District News**  
REPORTED BY DISTRICT SUPERVISORS

With the harvest of the small grain crop completed, many farmers will soon be preparing the land for another crop. Farmers should fully realize the importance of crop residue and its place in maintaining soil fertility and in aiding soil and moisture conservation, E. B. Keng, Soil Conservation Service pointed out this week.

Crop residue (grain stubble and straw) should not be turned completely under, but should be mixed in with the top soil in such a manner that much of it remains exposed. This method of soil preparation — often called stubble mulch — aids in a number of ways.

The stubble mulch serves to break the force of raindrops and prevents compaction of the surface layer of soil. By eliminating a compacted layer, rate of infiltration of water into the soil is greatly hastened, and runoff is reduced. The litter also makes many small air pockets in the surface soil and thus increases the capacity of the soil to store water.

The litter on the surface of the land helps to slow down the water during heavy rains. Each straw serves as a tiny dam, holding the moisture and permitting much of it to soak into the soil. Evaporation caused by wind and sun action is also greatly reduced.

In addition, the decaying plant litter improves the physical condition of the soil. The soil is kept more porous and develops a mellow condition that lessens running together and cracking.

Soil fertility was originally developed in this area by large quantities of vegetation being produced and gradually decaying and enriching the soil, Keng pointed out. Many years of cropping, with only

a very small proportion of the vegetative growth being returned to the soil—coupled with soil erosion—is being reflected by lower production of cultivated crops.

In order to reverse this trend and to restore and maintain the land for permanent high production, farmers must follow a constructive and continuous program of crop residue management. A good legume crop such as hubam clover, vetch, or bluebonnets, which will return large amounts of nitrogen to the soil, should become a part of every rotation.

The one-way plow and the lister are probably the implements best adapted to do stubble mulch work in this area at the present time. If sufficient litter is left on the ground these implements will do a good job of leaving part of it on the surface and mixing part with the topsoil.
