

The litter on the surface of the land helps to slow down the water during heavy rains. Each straw serves as a tiny dam, holding the moisture and permitting much of it to soak into the soil. Evaporation caused by wind and sun action is also greatly reduced.

In addition, the decaying plant litter improves the physical condition of the soil. The soil is kept more porous and develops a mellow condition that lessens running together and cracking.

Soil fertilitf was originally developed in this area by large quantities of vegetation being produced and gradually decaying and enriching the soil, Keng pointed out. Many years of cropping, with only
