Schleicher County Sheriff's Office Now Dispatching For EMS

On February 7, 1994 the Schleicher County Sheriff's Office began dispatching for the Emergency Medical Service. Before that date the ambulance service was dispatched from the nurse's station at Schleicher County Medical Center. Since all 911 emergency calls are answered at the Sheriff's office the change in dispatching will result in faster response time when an ambulance is needed. The old system required the dispatcher at the Sheriff's office to call the hospital by a special telephone connection when a 911 call was received for an ambulance. The nurses at the hospital then had to take the time to page the ambulance attendants. The new system eliminates the time needed for the extra telephone call before ambulance crews are paged for an emergency.

Residents of Schleicher County are reminded that all calls for an emergency ambulance should be made by dialing 911. The dispatcher at the Sheriff's office will answer the 911 call and dispatch the ambulance from his/her console. The old number that has been used for calling ambulances through the hospital is no longer

valid for emergencies requiring an ambulance. Please change 853-3061 to 911 on or near your telephones. If the old number is now called when an ambulance is needed it will reverse the process that is eliminated with the new system by requiring the nurses station to call the Sheriff's office when an ambulance is requested with the old number.

The Schleicher County E.M.S. expresses sincere thanks to the nurses and staff of Schleicher County Medical Center for the many years of dedicated service they provided by paging ambulance crews in addition to all their other responsibilities in the hospital. The change over in paging ambulance crews was not the result of any problems with the hospital. The nurses station will still provide vital communications with ambulances in the field concerning patient information needed before the arrival of the ambulances at the hospital. The E.M.S. and the Schleicher County Medical Center have always had a positive working relationship and continues to do so.

Please remember - call 911 for an ambulance instead of 853-3061.

TxDOT Continues Conditional Grant Program

The Texas Department Of Transportation is continuing its Conditional Grant Program for minority students (American Indian, Asian, Black, Hispanic, Pacific Islander) who are interested in becoming civil engineers.

Who can participate? A graduating high school student who is a Texas resident, has an overall high school GPA of 3.00 on a 4.00 scale, or a minimum score of 850 on the SAT or 21 on the ACT, and receives a grade of at least "B" in no fewer than three laboratory science or higher mathematics courses. Or a College/university student

who meets all the requirements above, has an overall GPA of 2.50 on a 4.00 scale, maintains a minimum of twelve hours per semester, attends an accredited 4 year state College/University, and has declared or intends to declare a major in civil engineering.

I know there have been no formal charges against Harding but just look at her practices since the accusations have started. She has fallen down more times in the last week than she has her whole career. Nancy has been pronounced fit and ready to compete even having her own pre-olympics special. The poor Harding kid has not only had no major endorsements but she almost had her truck towed away for being illegally parked. About the only thing that could be worse for Tonya is if she had to practice in Serajevo.

By the way one of the singles competitors didn't have to practice under fire but she has had to practice next to the burned out nuclear power plant in Russia. This little Ukrainian is actually considered the favorite or she was until the attack on Kerrigan. Of course all of this cutting up on the ice pales in importance to the problems in Bosnia and other devastated places around the world. I guess ice skating is more important than most of us first thought.

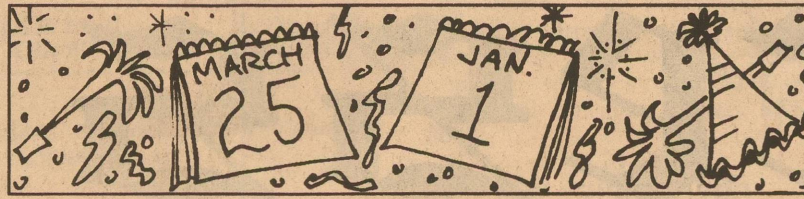

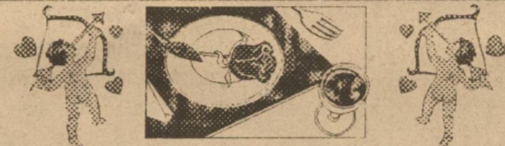

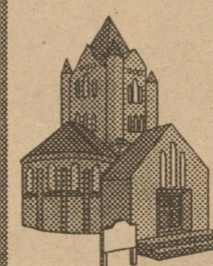

The Texas Department of Human Services encourages regular medical and dental exams for children under the EPSDT Program. This stands for Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment. The purpose is to find and treat health problems early, before they become serious, by frequent visits to the pediatrician and dentist. Infants and toddlers are allowed several free visits yearly, and older

children may get checkups every one to two years.

The medical checkups include a review of the child's physical and mental development and nutrition, a complete examination, vision and hearing evaluation, lab tests (Anemia screening and levels of lead, a cause of physical illness and mental impairment), TB testing, and immunizations. Treatment is done for any problems found or referral made to a specialist if necessary.

Free dental exams and

treatment are offered yearly. To find out which exams your child needs, look for a "Y" in the small boxes below "EPSDT Dental" and "EPSDT Medical" on the right of your monthly Medicaid form. Your child needs a checkup every time a "Y" appears. See example.

These checkups are offered by appointment at the clinics of most pediatricians and children's dentists. If you need help making an appointment, you may call Dr. Peaslee's Office at 853-3153.

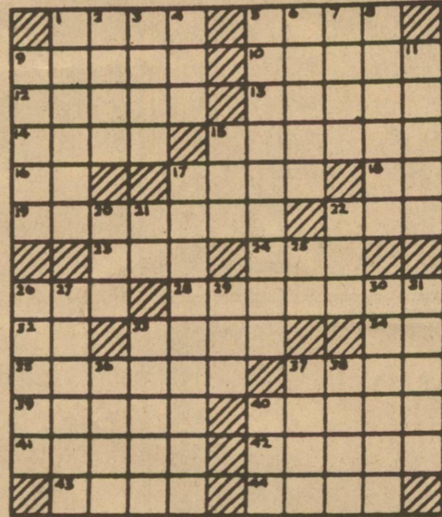

ASCS News

The Schleicher County ASCS Office requested all producers to turn in their 1993 receipts of mohair, wool and unshorn lambs by January 31, 1994 so that these figures would be used in the national average. March 1, 1994 is the last day to turn in these receipts to be eligible for payment.

The 1993 shorn wool support price is \$2.04 per pound and mohair is \$4.738 per pound. These prices will be used to determine the incentive payment rate which will be announced in April.

The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended (Wool Act) was extended through December 31, 1995, by the Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990. However, P.L. 103-130 provides for a phase out of the wool and mohair programs over the 1994 and 1995 marketing years and repeals the Wool Act effective December 31, 1995. For the 1994 marketing year, producers will receive only 75 percent of their calculated payment, and for the 1995 marketing year, only 50 percent.

Payments are based on the percentage needed to bring the average return (market price plus payment) received by all wool and mohair producers up to the announced support level. This payment method encourages the production and efficient marketing of quality wool and mohair because the higher the price received in the market, the higher the direct payment received. However, payments are made on that portion of the sales proceeds received by a producer for eligible wool and mohair which is based on sales prices in

excess of a maximum sales price for wool and mohair as determined by the Deputy Administrator, State and County Operations.

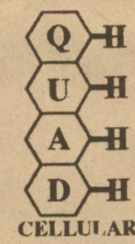

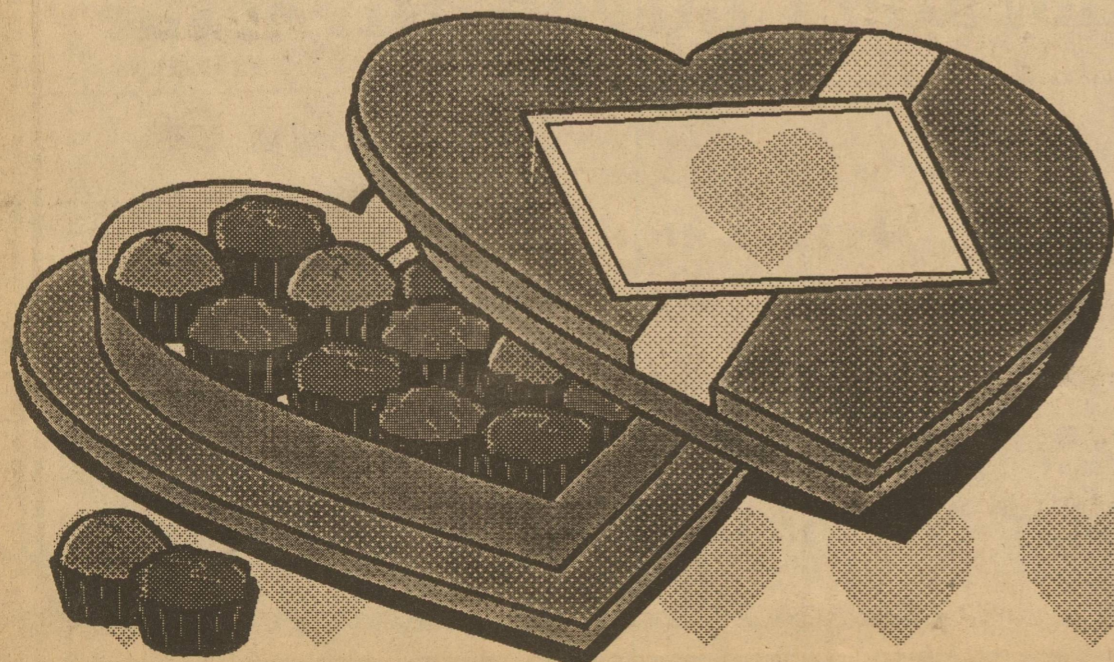

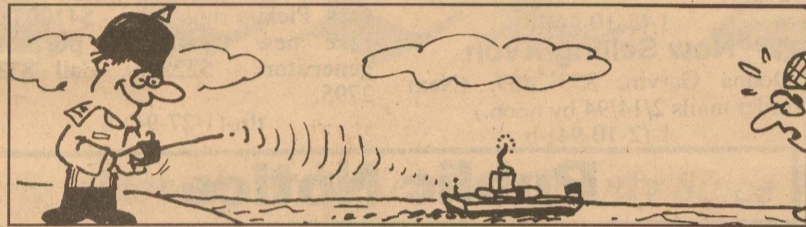

STRENGTH TRAINING

Researchers Find A New Key To Weight Loss

(NU) - New research shows that strength training, which builds muscle mass, can play an important role in weight management and loss. In fact, it may be even more effective than aerobics, since muscles burn calories both during activity and at rest.

The larger the muscle mass, researchers say, the more calories are burned.

Accordingly, the American Council on Exercise (ACE) now recommends a weight-loss and maintenance program that combines strength training with aerobics.

Such aerobic activities as swimming, cycling and rowing elevate the metabolism during the activity and for some time after exercise, turning the body into a "fat burning factory."

ACE says both strength training and aerobic programs should begin with exercises that are comfortable for you, because consistency is the key.

If you start by doing too much too soon, you risk injury.

Begin your strength training with comfortable weights and repetitions. The best program exercises your legs, arms, chest and upper back with a weight that allows from eight to 12 complete repetitions.

And set a goal to get 15 minutes of aerobic exercise three times a week, gradually working up to 30 minutes or more four times a week.

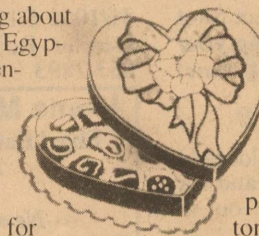

MICROWAVES are for COOKING

FAST, ELEGANT MICROWAVE SALMON

The microwave lends itself beautifully to preparing fish. Any conventional recipe that calls for fish to be baked, boiled or poached is ideal for microwaving. General cooking time is 3 - 4 mins. per pound, but varies per thickness of fillet. Fold thin ends of fillet under so the ends won't dry out; very thin fillets work best rolled. Here's a recipe for fish that is fast and elegant, too!

SALMON FILLETS WITH YOGURT AND DILL SAUCE

- 4 Alaska salmon fillets, (4-8 oz. each)
- 2 tablespoons dry dill weed, or a bed of fresh dill
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 1 cup plain yogurt (or sour cream)

Place salmon in covered microwave-safe dish folding thin ends of fillets under, if needed. Pour wine over fillets. Sprinkle dry dill on salmon, and place fresh dill in dish with salmon arranged on top. Cover and cook at MEDIUM-HIGH (70%) for 3 - 4 mins. per fillet, or until flakes of fish separate easily. Drain juices into yogurt and pour over salmon.
