



The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended (Wool Act) extended through December 31,1995, by the Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990. However, P.L. 103=130 provides for a phase out of the wool and mohair programs over the 1994 and 1995 marketing years and repeals the Wool Act effective December 31,1995. For the 1994 marketing year, producers will receive only 75 percent of their calculated payment, and for the 1995 marketing year, only 50 percent.

Payments are based on the percentage needed to bring the average return (market price plus payment) received by all wool and mohair producers up to the announced support level. payment encourages the production and efficient marketing of quality wool and mohair because the higher the price received in the market, the higher the direct payment received. However, payments are made on that portion of the sales proceeds received by a producer for eligible wool and mohair which is based on sales prices in

excess of a maximum sales price for wool and mohair as prog
