

The visiting Scouter asked the local club's support in the scouting program and Lion President E. W. Brooks assured her that the club would lend assistance.



Avoid Farm Fires: Protect Our Soil ed.

Burning has no place in conservation farming because it increases soil erosion and water losses, soil improvement, causes loss of nitrogen, and increases losses of other plant nutrients by leaching or by rainfall run-off.


The above statement was made this week by Chairman J. Forrest Runge of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District when he discussed Fire Prevention Week now being observed here.

Besides destroying valuable trees and needed grasses and legumes, a pasture fire leaves the soil unprotected and subject to erosion's destructive forces, explained Hugo Mika, work unit conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in this district. Additional loss is occasioned by the burning of organic matter which should be returned to the soil, and the important element nitrogen actually 'goes up in smoke."

Soil conservation experiment stations have shown that soil losses are increased 12 times and water losses are increased 31 times by annual burning of farm pastures. When a good pasture, with a heavy crop of grass is burned, the nitrogen loss probably will average \$2.50 an acre at current prices for nitrogen fertilizer, the soil conservationist declared.

"Returning crop residues to the soil in cultivated fields is essential to maintaining fertiity," the destroys organic matter needed for conservationist explained. "Crop residues should be returned to the soil rather than burned."

"Every one should use caution in using fire around the farm, because a small fire starting around the hiuse or barnyard may spread to adjoining pastures," Mika emphasized.

Due to the heavy cover of vegetation produced by early September rains, much crop and gross residue will be left on the ground, making a fire hazard after frost. Everyone should be careful a-

bout tossing out lighted matches or cigarettes when traveling along public roads or through pastures. Be Sure That Match Is Out!

Lunches To Be Served During 1944-45 Term States District Rep.

Vitamin-rich lunches will be served children attending Eldorado High and Grammar Schools during the 1944-45 term, C. B. Hodges, WFA's Acting District Representative, Austin, has re-

The Eldorado High and Grammar Schools in cooperation with the War Food Administration, is completing arrangements for serving school children a nutritious and adequate lunch each day.

Under the local plan, the Eldorado Independent School Board through C. A. Reynolds, supenintendent, has agreed to purchase the food, pay part of the cost, obtain labor, and provide necessary space for serving daily lunches. WFA will reimburse local schiols for part of the cost of food served, and in addition may contribute foods which have been purchased from farmers to fulfill price support commitments.

The school lunch program this year enters its tenth year of service in which school children are provided the right amounts and the right kinds of foods at the noon-day meal, thereby contributing to the health and strength of future citizens.

Locally operated lunch rooms also provide outlets for agricultural commodities, especially seasonally abundant foods which otherwise would result in market gluts and low prices, Hodges said.

Most of the foods to be used in the Eldorado High and Grammar Schools lunch room this year will be bought direct from farmers or from local merchants, Hodges ex-


