





The letter reads in part:

" Icannot tell you just what we are doing now, nor any definite place or time, but to answer your question of what our duties are is easy. The Seabees are Navy Construction Battalion men with experience in every trade known to construction. Many are learning trades which will be of use to them in the future. Some are working that have not learned what the work meant. On every job, I learn something which is of use to me in my line of work. It is one of the best places known committee to help. They were: for a young fellow to be taught a trade that he wishes to learn. If he does not want to work, this is no

"Over the period of time that I have been in we have built bridges, docks, airfields, hospitals, our branch of service is doing.

"It is also, as you know, a new branch of the Navy. Born the 28th of December, 1941, and I might add if I ever were to join again in the future it would be the Seabees.

"We have seen our work projects in use after they were completed. It brings to one a proud feeling to know that he has helped complete some job, which helps the boys make and keep the loss of lives as low as possible. We do our fighting mostly with tools, which can be as near as the front itself.

"I have heard the blast of both naval guns and batteries on land in actual combat; seen plans come down in flames, and in dog fights, felt the concussion of bombs that landed nearby. We have no picnic as some migh say, for we hope to be as skilled with our tools as they with their guns, and it takes both to win a war. We have built ourselves a name; the Fighting Seabees, and every man and boy will help keep it so."


