Grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Nixon of this place and Mrs. Mable Cochran of Austin.

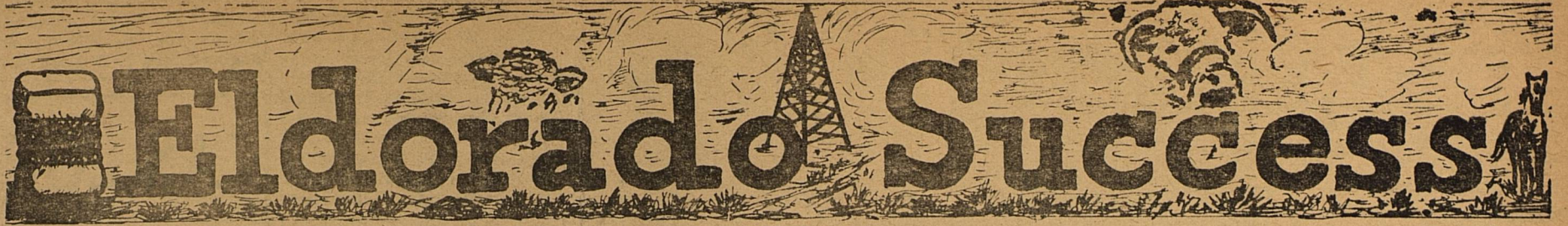

"We are satisfied with the quality but not the quantity of used clothing brought in during the past few weeks", stated Fred Watson, local chairman of the United National Clothing Collection.

Every man, woman and child is urged to bring in at least five pounds per person, he stated, and again the fact is stressed that clothing must be clean and at least one-third wear left in it.

Completion of the drive will be made by this Saturday, April 28, and a final house to house canvass will be made Saturday. Girl Scouts will pick up the clothing and Boy Scouts will gather scrap paper.

Torn clothing, whether patched or not, will be accepted, as sewing centers under the direction of the Red Cross will be set up in foreign countries, and peasant women of those places will be glad to mend these garments. Bed clothing is urgently needed and, if you have any that you can spare, please donate it to those less fortunate than you, it is asked.

Please have your scrap paper tied with a heavy cord, Watson stated, as it is much easier to handle and will save much extra work by those receiving and packing the donations.

The local committee asks that you call telephone No. 177 and leave your name Saturday afternoon, and someone will pick up your donation.

Kin of Deceased Service Men Entitled To Free Insurance Adjustments, Other Claims

H. T. Finley is calling the attention of relatives of service men to the fact that any service as to claims of insurance and other claims Service Men will be handled free of charge by Mr. Finley who is Veteran Service Officer for Post No. 257.

Some relatives have been known to pay large sums to various lawyers to make these investigations and settlement when it could have been handled locally and free of charge. The following article was sent into Mr. Finley from The American Legion, National Rehabilitation Committee, 1608 K. St., N. W., Washington 6, D. C.

Under Section 201, Public Law 844, 74th Congress, the Administrator of Veterans Affairs is given authority to recognize agents and attorneys in the preparation, presentation and prosecution of claims under statutes administered by the Veterans Administration. He also has power to prescribe rules and regulations by which these agents and attorneys are to qualify and function. The law provides further that payment of fees for services rendered by these individual agents shall not exceed \$10 in any one claim, and that the fee shall be deducted from the amount of monetary benefits allowed.

Fees for prosecution of insurance suits under another provision of the are not subject to this restriction.

It has come to the notice of this office that a few of the so-called "pension attorneys" practicing in Washington, D. C. and recognized by the Veterans Administration have sent out announcements of their services to the widows and dependent parents of deceased veterans. In one such instance the printed note indicates that the information regarding the death of service man has been obtained from the casualty lists. The approach is made in a way to encourage the widow or claimant to designate the attorney as her agent in prosecuting the claims for death pension and insurance.

The American Legion is frank in disapproving of such practice. It is not necessary for dependents to pay anyone for services of this nature. Service officers of The American Legion and other veterans' organizations are available in practically every community, and they are willing and eager to assist those who are entitled to file claims with the Veterans Administration. Moreover, there is no charge or cost attached to service rendered by these service officers.

It is earnestly suggested that an appropriate notice on this subject be circulated among Post and Departments, and that the public be informed as to the availability of claims service through the channels of the American Legion.

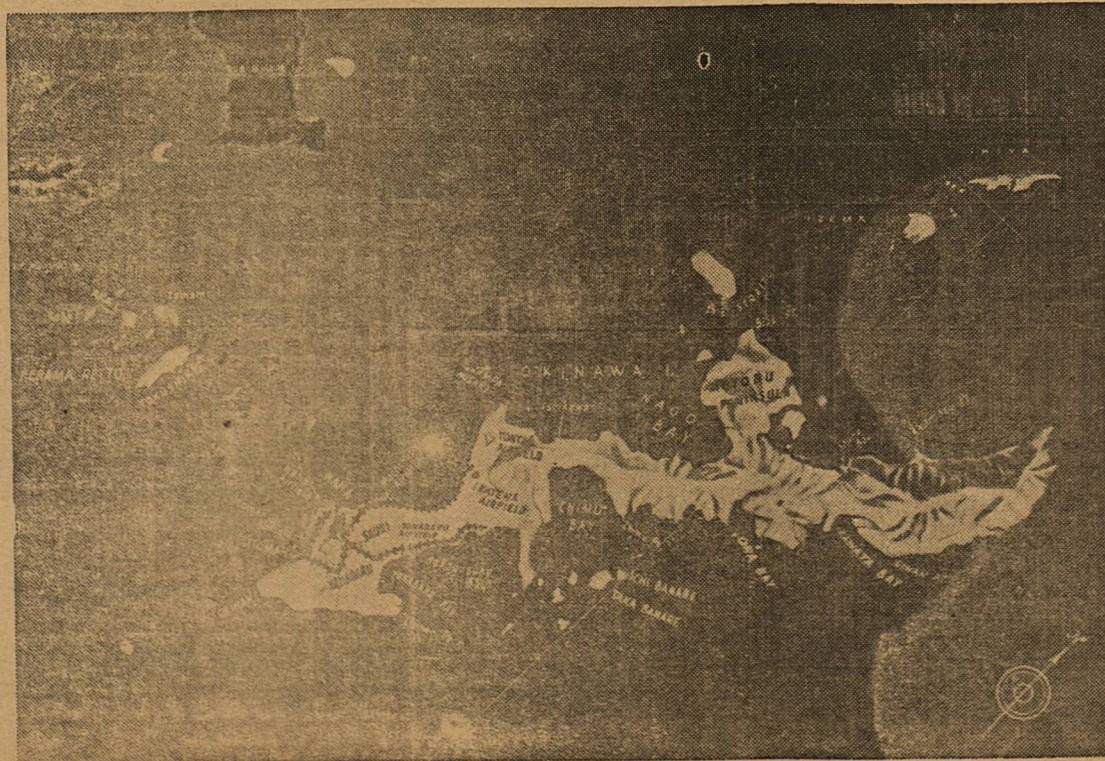
Eldorado School Of Music To Give Scholarship In May

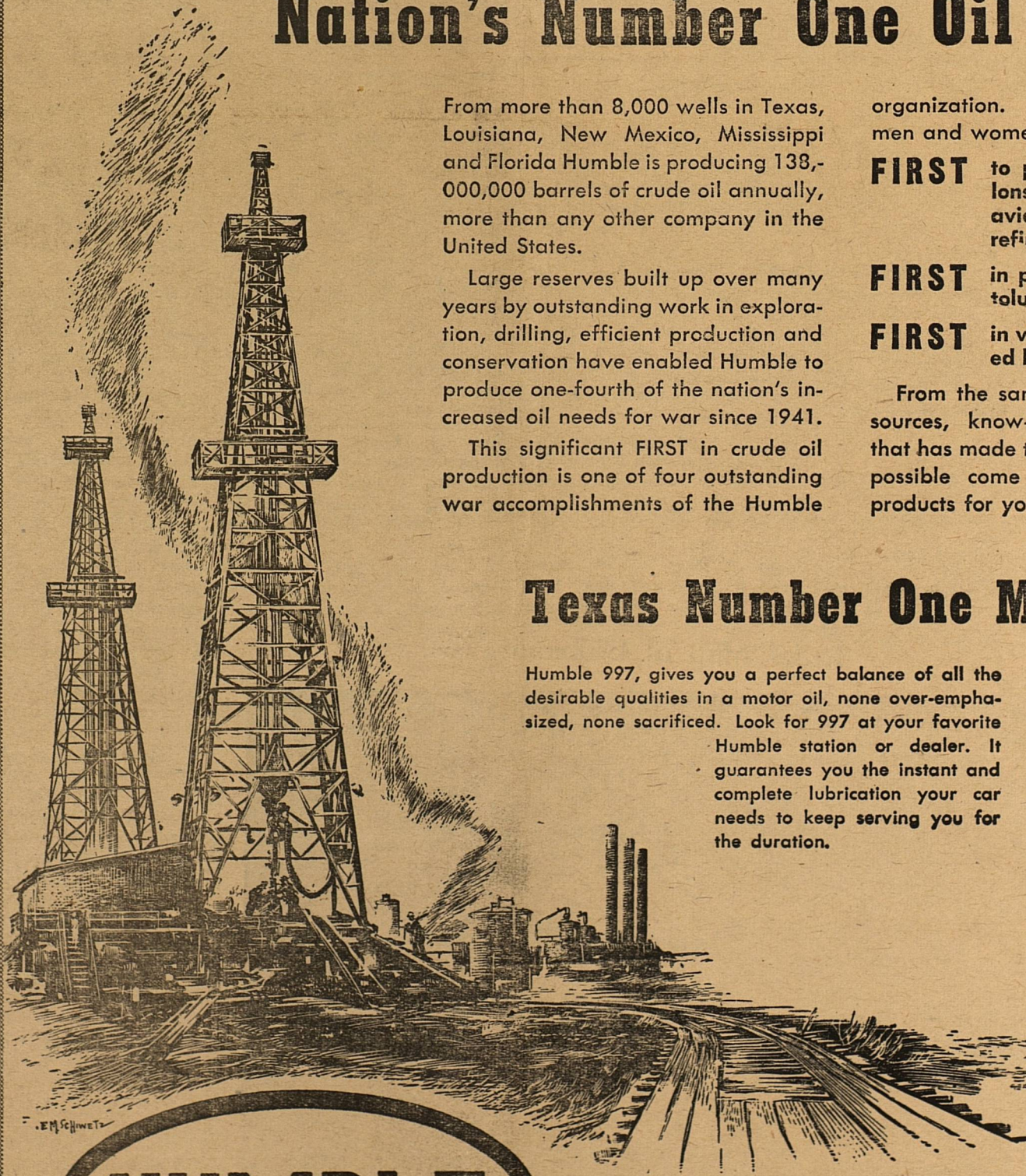

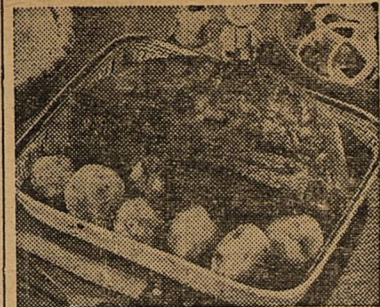
Mrs. F. B. Faust was leader for the study "Southeast Asia" when the Women's Society of Christian Service met last Monday afternoon at the Methodist Church.

Glorify the stand-by pot-roast in a south-of-the-border way, advises the Country Cooking editor of Capper's Farmer. Juicy Mexican steak is lean round of beef braised in spicy tomato sauce.

"Surround it with oven-browned potatoes and serve with crisp relishes and fruit pie for dessert," she adds. "A bright-colored cloth on the table puts the whole meal in a gay mood."

Mexican Steak

4 lbs. round steak 1 tsp. Worcester-shire sauce
 3/4 c. flour 1 green pepper, chopped
 1/2 tsp. pepper 1 c. celery, chopped
 2 tsp. salt 1 onion, sliced
 3 tbsp. bacon drippings
 2 1/2 c. tomatoes

Have steak cut 3 inches thick. Season flour with salt and pepper and pound it into meat. Brown steak on both sides in hot drippings. Add remaining ingredients. Cover. Bake at 300 F. for 3 hours. Serves 6.

"Travel Light" Is Advice to Girls On Wartime Trips

IF YOU must travel these wartime days—maybe to sweetheart, husband, brothers, who can't come to you—arm yourself with a sense of humor, more patience than Job and very little baggage, writes Holly Miller in Capper's Farmer to girls who are going some place farther from home than they've ever been before.

"The primary problem, even before what to wear, is how to get there when you want to," she adds in her column in the nationally-circulated farm magazine. "For short distances, a bus is fine. But for longer jaunts, the train is faster and more comfortable."

"With passage seen to, the more fascinating issue of what to wear comes up. Save pretty frills for when you arrive. They'll look as tired as you feel if you wear them several days on the train. A suit is ideal for train wear; so are comfortable shoes."

"Don't take more than one suitcase and a small dressing case with you. Save a corner in the suitcase for field rations. Dining cars serve only two meals a day. Don't be afraid of being 'backwoods.' These days the wise carry lunch; others wish they had."

"On long trips it is hazardous to carry large sums of cash with you. Buy travelers' checks at your local bank or express office and have enough cash with you to see you to your destination."

"When you're hopelessly confused about a problem, take it to the Information Desk, the conductor or ticket agent—not to fellow travelers. One successful trip and you have a feeling of know-how about traveling."

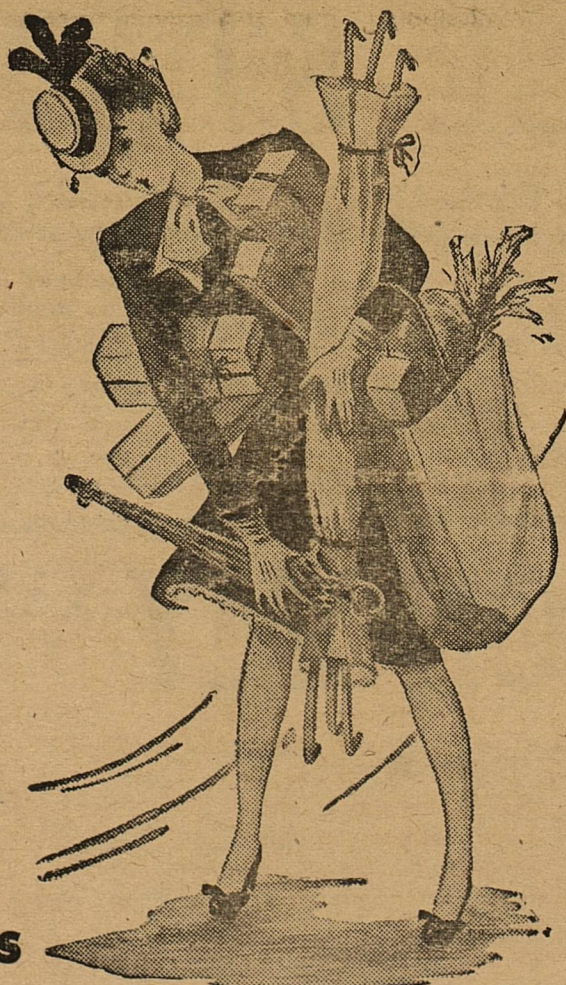

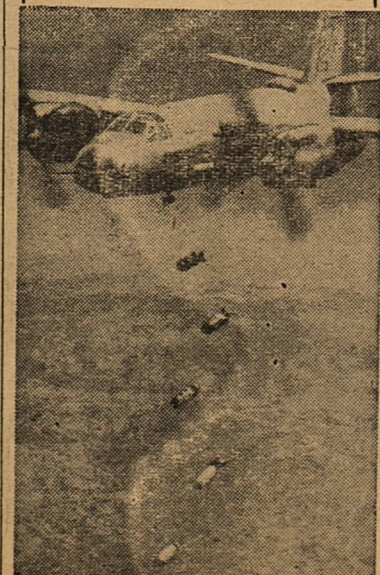

Among the nearly 400 survivors of the hard-hitting U. S. Navy escort carrier, Bismarck Sea, which was sunk by enemy aerial attack off Iwo Jima on February 21, was Jose Remero, Seaman First Class, who is now on leave with his family in Eldorado.

A release from the Eighth Naval District Branch Public Relations Office in Houston states: "The Bluejackets and officers had struggled helplessly for two to four hours in mountainous, icy waters before they were rescued by Naval vessels. Nearly 100 of their shipmates were killed, as Jap machine gunners strafed them in the heavy seas.

"Loss of the Bismarck Sea with more than 300 casualties, including those shot in the water, resulted from two mortal hits 30 miles off shore."

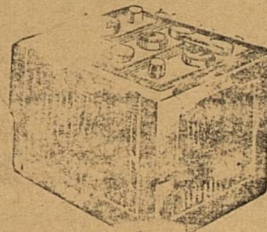
