## SEVERAL RIGS BEING MOVED IN TO LOCAL FIELD

Western Drilling Co., are bringing in equipment to the Koy oil field, under contract made recently with Cooper Gas and Oil Co., and Parker Drilling Co., are moving out their machinery.

Western are rigging up a derrick on a location 1300 feet east of Cooper Koy 1, and drilling will proceed on this new test. A Campbell Drilling Co., spudder is preparing the surface for Cooper-Koy 1C, 1300 feet north of Koy 1.

Two Rigs at Tisdale's  
Will Holland notified interested Schleicher County parties Wednesday that he would be moving in equipment in the coming few days for going down with the Tisdale test, and drilling of a second 3,000 foot test on the same section to the east.

The first test is L. W. Elliott trustee No. 1 Virgil G. Tisdale 660 feet from the north and west lines of Sec. 16A HE&WT—and is located about 3 miles east of Eldorado.

Rhodes Drilling Co., sold the derrick in December, and all activity on this wildcat had ceased pending making of new plans for the test, in which a good oil showing was encountered late last fall. It is understood that the rigs will be brought in late this week or early next week.

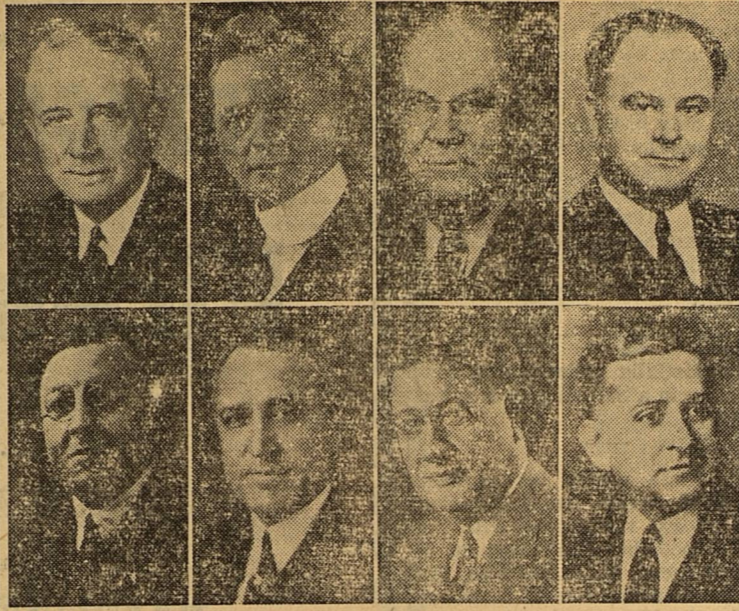

TEXANS HEAD SCOTTISH RITE HOSPITAL



Eight prominent Texans—all High Masons—will direct the policies of Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children in Dallas for the ensuing year. The new officers shown above were unanimously elected at the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees recently. A major portion of the funds received have come from the "general Texas territory," according to reports.

Co. Agent Explains Ear Tick Control

The ear tick is widely distributed in the U. S., more especially in the semi-arid portion of the Southwest where it is a major pest of livestock. It attacks cattle, horses, sheep, goats, deer, and occasionally man. The immature stages of the tick attach to the ears. When fully fed the nymph drops to the soil and molts to the adult stage.

As a result of studies conducted in the vicinity of Menard, a new method has been developed for controlling this tick.

Ear Ticks in Pastures

To learn the distribution of ear ticks in pastures, samples of soils and debris in around places frequented by animals were collected and examined. A No. 2 wash tub was considered a sample. The samples were examined by washing the soil and debris through a screen.

After repeated trials it was found that the ear ticks were concentrated around water troughs. The concentration of ticks around water troughs indicated that the ear ticks could be controlled by a treatment of salt troughs with a material which would kill ticks.

A mixture of equal parts of kerosene and used lubricating oil was found to be highly effective against all stages of the tick. This material also had the advantage of not being repellent to livestock.

The data shows that the combination treatment produced much better results than either treatment alone. Treatment 1029 is recommended, the treating of the ears of the stock and water troughs with kerosene and lubricating oil. Stock 1029 is a mixture of pyridine in an adhesive containing 45% rosin, 40% Herculyn, and 15% dibutyl phthalate.

Stock 1029 should be applied to the ears of livestock by means of a 1 inch paint brush. A brushful of the mixture should be inserted well down into the outer ear and rubbed about enough to insure a complete coverage of the deep convolutions and the inner surface of the outer ear. One gallon of stock 1029 will treat approximately 125 head of cattle.

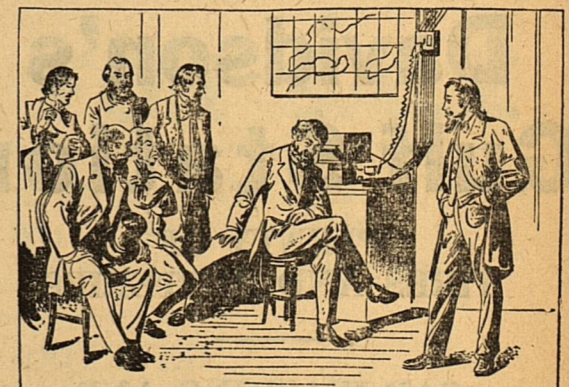

**Dr. Cox Reports Mental Disorders On The Increase**

Mental disorders today represent a real problem and it is estimated that more than fifty per cent of all hospital beds are filled by persons suffering from mental or nervous diseases, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

It thus appears that modern civilization is exacting a terrific toll. High speed living, with its cruel exactions upon nature, is responsible for a large part of the trouble. But improper personal conduct must also shoulder much of the blame. The fact is that nearly fifty per cent of the patients entering hospitals for mental disorders are

there because of organic or toxic causes.

For example, general paralysis is the direct cause of one-fifth of the mental troubles in males entering hospitals and one-tenth of the disorder for all groups. This condition is an organic disease of the brain due to the germ responsible for syphilis. It is a preventable disease. Early and effective treatment of acquired syphilis will block the end results of general paralysis in the insane.

The excessive use of alcohol is responsible for a number of mental disorders, at least in males. Alcohol and syphilis combined are responsible for approximately one-fifth of the hospitalized insanities. Nevertheless, improper living hab-

its continue to impair many brains. Insufficient sleep, neglect of bodily care and an over forcing of nervous energy are the pitfalls to avoid in this connection.

Nature demands that her fundamental laws be at least reasonably observed. A constant outraging of the physiological economy takes its toll not only in bodies but in minds also. Insanities and lesser nervous disorders could be spectacularly reduced if this fact was more generally respected. Training for mental health must be started in childhood as that is the time when corrections can be made to the best advantage.

**Washington News Letter**

Ruddy-faced Kenneth Romney, former Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Representatives has been the most talked-about man on Capitol Hill recently, while the Congress marks time for the legislative program to get under way.

A sergeant-at-arms doesn't sound like a very important officer, but this one has developed into at least a high priced one. For in this case he not only keeps the peace, but operates a sort of a bank for the House members. If desired, the members may have their monthly salary check deposited with the Sergeant-at-Arms, who maintains an office in the Capitol for that purpose. The members then draw checks on their respective accounts just as is done with ordinary commercial banks, and each month bank statements and cancelled checks are sent them. No other deposits are allowed other than salary checks of members.

This convenient arrangement has been going on for 140 years. For protection against improper handling of funds the Sergeant-at-Arms is kept under a \$50,000 surety bond.

For the first time 1890 that office has just been audited by the General Accounting Office. The results made Kenneth Romney a high priced man. The audit showed a deficit of \$125,000, with most of the shortage having occurred prior to 1930. A member of Congress from Florida, who served from 1919 to 1927, before Romney took over—was allowed to overdraw his account by \$64,000. A former employee in the office named Mahoney, fresh from Tammany Hall, took \$25,000 away with him several years ago. The grapevine around here is that he would have been prosecuted then but for the fact that Tammany Hall promised to repay the money, but never did.

Romney himself appears to have gotten away with \$22,000 by cashing for himself checks on banks where he had no funds. The audit has been turned over to the Justice Department for appropriate criminal and civil actions. It may be that those of us who have deposits there that have never been overdrawn will be called upon to take our pro rata loss from the deficit. That would be more appropriate than having the default made up out of the Treasury, as was done when a deficit occurred in 1890. In the future we are promised an audit every three months.

A West Texan who has missed a lot of headlines, but who has a most distinguished war record, is Colonel Douglas B. Smith of San Saba. When the Texans ate together last week at the Capitol, Colonel Smith was present as a guest and was commended by Lt. General J. L. Devers, present chief of the Army Ground Forces. The latter spoke briefly to the group and noticing Colonel Smith's presence, told of his valiant service with the 75th Division in Europe where, he recalled, some of the bloodiest fighting of the entire war occurred.

Colonel Smith, son of Postmaster and Mrs. W. A. Smith of San Saba, in 1919 drew with others for a chance to attend West Point—and won. After serving in Africa in 1943 he was attached to the 75th Division in Europe, took a prominent part in the Battle of the Bulge, and moved into Germany with the 9th Army under command of General W. H. Simpson. Immediately following V-J Day, Col. Smith was chosen to serve as American Military Attache in Yugoslavia. However, before assuming his duties he developed a trouble with one of his knees which necessitated an operation and a slow recovery. He is now about well and will likely receive another important foreign assignment in the near future.
