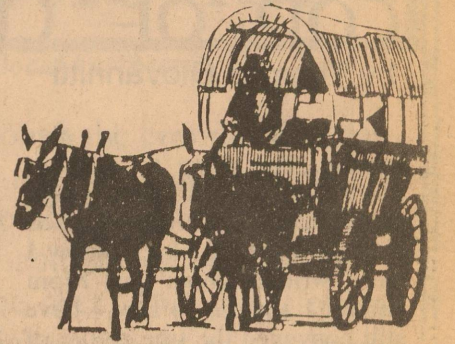

### Headlines From Around The World

#### Yorba Linda, California

Richard Milhous Nixon, 37th President of the United States was buried on the grounds of the Nixon Presidential Library in Yorba Linda, California Wednesday, April 27, 1994. Nixon, 81 had been in a coma for three days after suffering a stroke last week. Nixon won election to the Presidency in 1968 and re-election in 1972 before resigning in the midst of the Watergate scandal. The funeral was attended by President Clinton and former Presidents Bush, Reagan, Carter and Ford.

#### Cape Town, South Africa

Nelson Mandela was elected President of South Africa in the first ever multi-racial elections in that country. The election was made possible by reforms enacted by the government of President F.W. de Klerk. The election brings to an end the system of racial separation in South Africa known as apartheid.

#### Seoul, South Korea

South Korean defense forces remain on a heightened state of alert this week as tensions continued between North and South Korea. The North Korean government has refused to allow international inspection of its alleged nuclear facilities. American troops from Fort Bliss near El Paso have been deployed to the Korean peninsula along with several batteries of Patriot missiles made famous during the Persian Gulf War. The Clinton administration insists that it will not allow North Korea to develop a nuclear capability. CIA spokesmen disclosed last week however, that the spy agency suspects North Korea already has as many as three nuclear devices and could have twelve by years end.

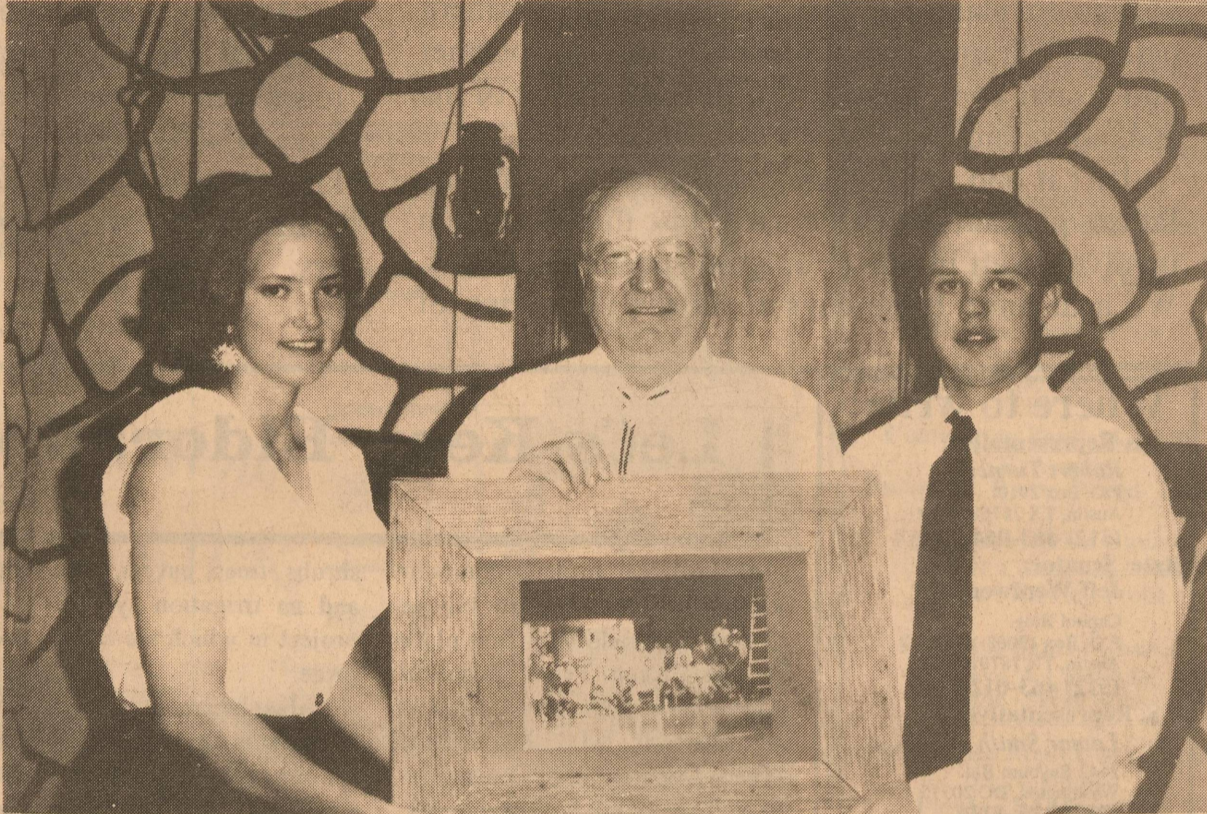
#### Gorazde, Bosnia

Under pressure from United Nations peacekeeping forces, Bosnian Serb armies withdrew from positions around the Bosnian town of Gorazde this week. United Nations commanders had threatened the Serbs with more air-strikes if they had not complied with UN demands. The siege of Gorazde had lasted for three weeks.

#### Lancaster, Texas

Tornadoes ripped through north Texas, last week bringing death and destruction to several cities in and around the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex. One tornado in Lancaster devastated an area 14 blocks long and 12 blocks wide in the downtown business district. Governor Ricahards has requested President Clinton declare the region a federal disaster area. Authorities attribute seven deaths to the three nights of storms.

## Shannon Harber Relays

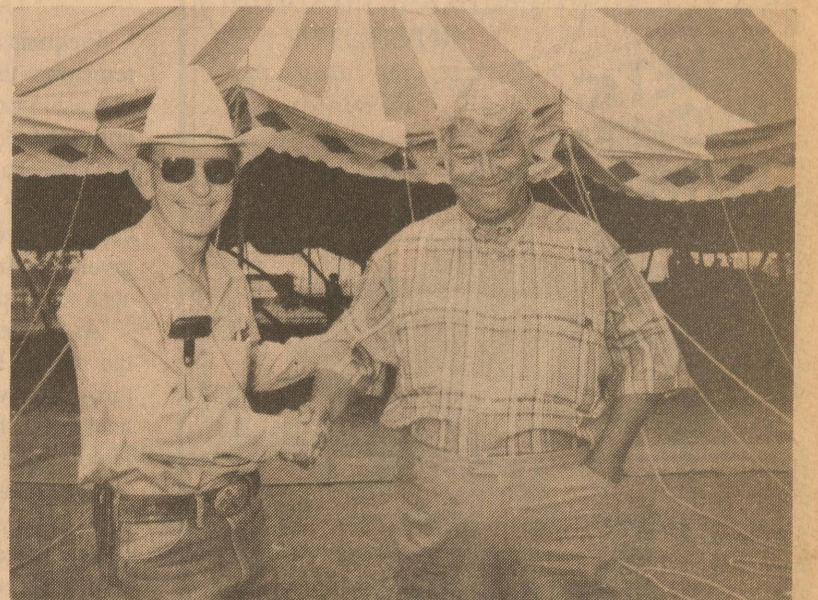
The Eldorado Elementary School held its sixth annual Shannon Harber Relays Thursday, April 28, 1994 for elementary students in second, third and fourth grades.

# Eldorado Almost Named Wallick

In 1995, Eldorado will celebrate its 100th year. Plans are being made to honor our towns centennial. The Schleicher County Historical Society is having a special calendar printed. Included in the 1995 calendar will be early-day photos, local events and a little history. The calendars will be on sale at local businesses on completion.

In anticipation of this special year a few "little known" early

day stories will be printed in the Success in the following months.

Eldorado almost became Wallick! The first name given to the new town of Eldorado in 1895 was Wallick. Samuel Wallick was a loved and respected man from Ft. McKavett. The town organizers decided to name the new town in his honor. The name was sent to the Post Office Department for confirmation, but the postal department suggested a change in the name because another town

had the name Wallace. hey felt the two names were so similar that it would be confusing.

Town organizers and W.B. Silliman then decided the town's name would be Eldorado.

August 3, 1895 - Devil's River News (Tom Meador Vol. IV)

"The Postal authorities have changed the name of the new town in Schleicher County from Wallick to Eldorado."

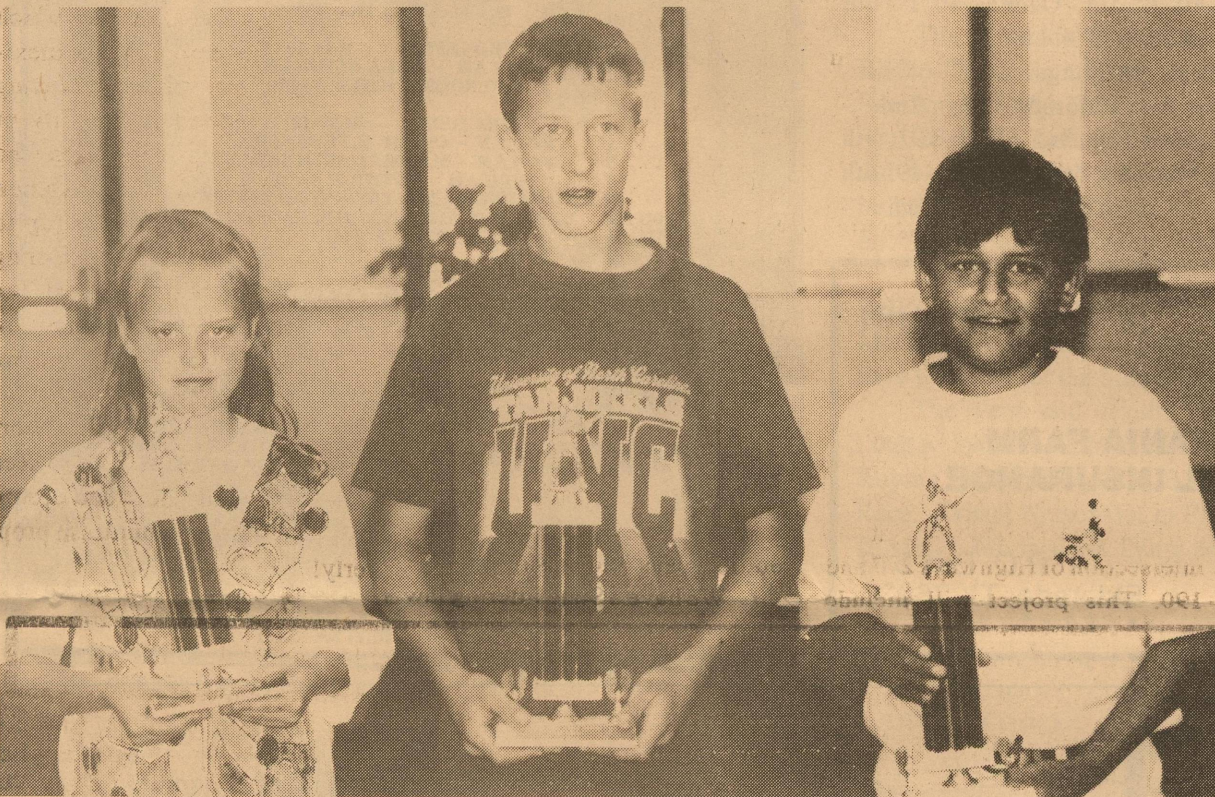

## St. Jude's Bike-A-Thon Scheduled

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital has announced plans for the Eldorado "Wheels For Life" Bike-A-Thon. Mrs. Thelma Bosmans will serve as coordinator of the event on May 15, 1994 and encourages all residents to support this important community effort.

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, founded in 1962 by the late entertainer Danny Thomas, is the largest childhood cancer research center in America in terms of the number of patients treated and treatment success. Funding for the treatment and research programs conducted at St. Jude Hospital comes primarily from public support of events such as the Bike-A-Thon.

This year's Bike-A-Thon poster child, seven-year-old Shauna Richters, represents all of the patients treated at this

world-renowned pediatric research and treatment facility. Shauna was diagnosed with Wilms' tumor, a malignant growth on her left kidney, in December 1990. Shauna is in remission from her cancer and completed her chemotherapy (anti-cancer drugs) in June 1991. She is doing well and returns to St. Jude Hospital ever six months for checkups. Shauna celebrated her last chemotherapy treatment with a present she had eagerly looked forward to: a new bike.

All residents and businesses are encouraged to lend their support to the hospital by making a contribution or by becoming a rider.

## Book Notes

I have always enjoyed books about true crimes, therefore, I was delighted to see Ann Rule's latest book, *Everything She Ever Wanted, A True Story of Obsessive Love, Murder & Betrayal*, in the crime and criminals section of our library.

This is the true story of Pat Taylor and Tom Allanson, their story book romance and the destruction that followed. From their marriage to the murder of his parents and his conviction of that murder, all in less than one year, this book shows how one person can harm so many simply because they want what they want when they want it.

There is the adoption of Tom's children without his knowledge, the murder of his parents, the attempted poisoning of his grandparents, the suicide of pat's brother, the financial ruin of her parents, the emotional crippling of her children, the vendetta against some of her grandchildren, the questionable death of James Crist.

When all is over, two proud Southern families lie in ruins. Some of the members are gone forever, the ones who are left will never be the same.

Through it all, Ms. Rule fine tunes her characters until you feel you would recognize them if you passed them on the street.

The story revolves around Pat Taylor, her desires and how she satisfies those desires. A

beautiful, soft spoken, fragile woman, Pat hides her true nature behind helplessness and poor health, until all is ripped away to reveal her as she truly is, a psychopathic liar, capable of unconscionable manipulation stopping not even at self mutilation.

The question arises, was Pat Taylor mentally ill? It would be comforting to say that she was, that a sane person would not, could not, do the things she did. However, no psychological testing results were ever found in her prison records so no one will ever know. Sane or not, Pat Taylor certainly is not normal. The author believes she definitely suffered from personally disorders in that "she did not view the world or her relationship to it the way most people do. She knew the difference between right and wrong, but it didn't matter ... she had been raised to believe that rules were for other people and what mattered was that she got what she wanted."

This is a fascinating book and no one is better qualified to write it than Ann Rule. Ms. Rule is a former policewoman from Seattle, who now lectures, between writings, to law enforcement professionals, on serial killers and in particular women who kill. Her books are products of endless hours of research and meticulous detail. A former book, *Small Sacrifices*, has recently been seen on television.

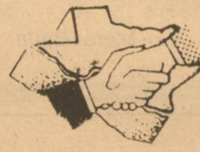

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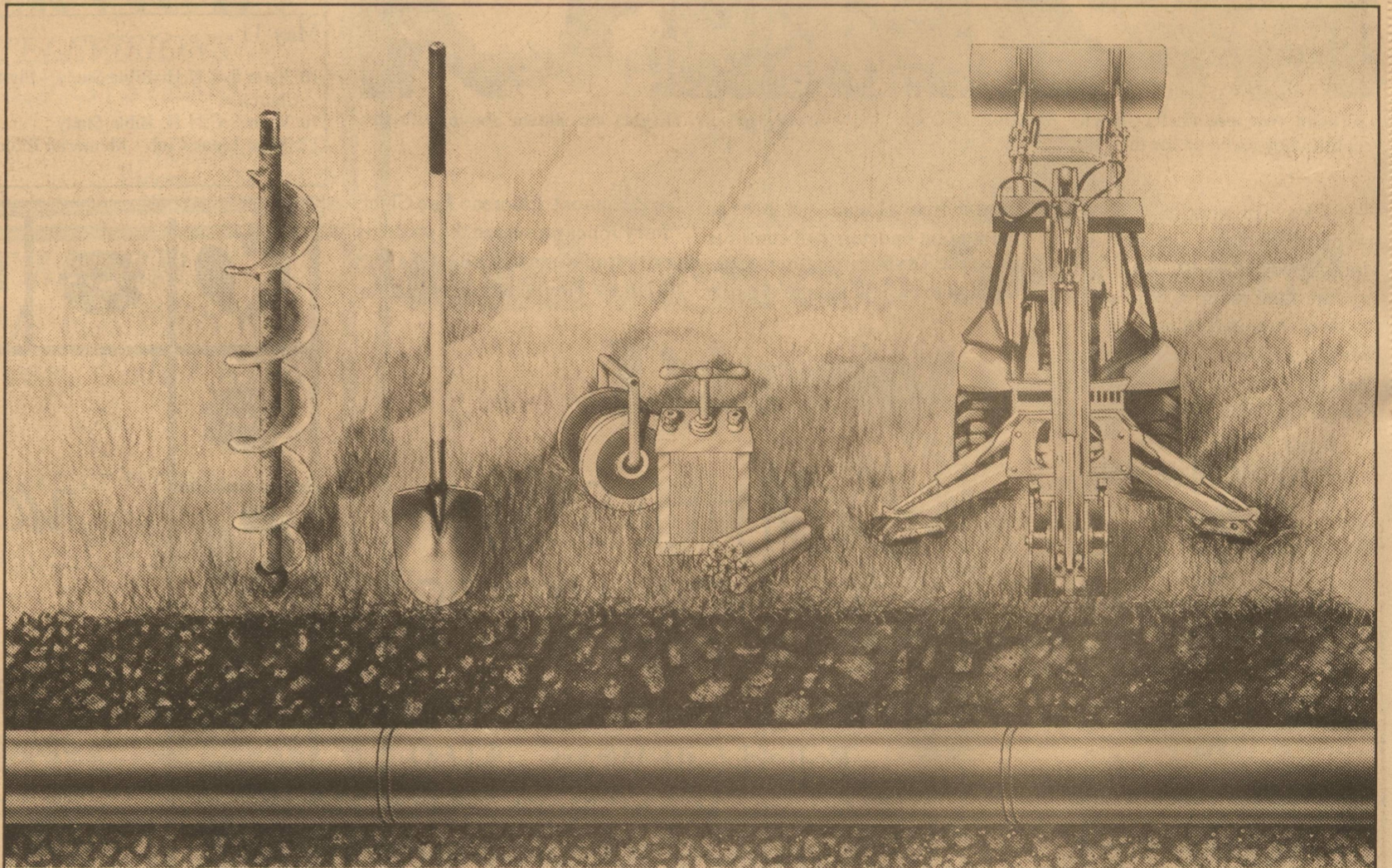

## Dorothy's Movie Review

I have two movies for your consideration this week, one is a family comedy and the other is an adult action drama.

First is the **Beverly Hillbillies**. This is rated "PG-13" due to adult themes but has no bad language that anyone would object to. ## Cellular Service Update

Recent dialing changes in telephone land lines has caused Plateau Cellular Network, formerly Cellular 3, to implement 10 Digit Dialing for all their customers. The dialing change causes all phone numbers dialed by PCN customers to include an area code. Phone Numbers that have been previously dialed with 7 digits must now begin with the appropriate Area Code. (505 for calls in New Mexico, 806 for calls in Texas RSA 3, 915 for calls Texas RSA 12,13, and 14). Also, all long distance calls placed in these areas must be dialed 1 + the area code + the 7 digit phone number. The dialing change will take effect on May 1 and will not effect current billing rates. It is simply a change in the way cellular calls are dialed.

New Mexico PCN customers (area code 505) are in Chaves, Colfax, Curry, De Baca, Eddy,

Guadalupe, Harding, Lincoln, Mora, Ouay, Roosevelt, San Miguel, Torrence and Union counties. Texas RSA 3 (area code 806) counties are Bailey, Castro, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Pamer, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum. Counties in Texas RSA 12, 13, & 14 (area code 915) are Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Culberson, Hudspeth, Irion, Jeff Davis, Loving, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Reeves, Schliecher, Sutton, Terrell, Upton, Ward and Winkler.

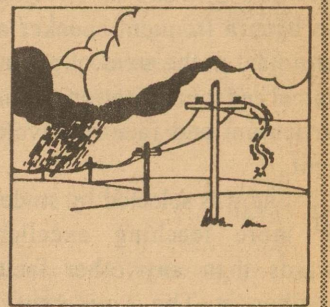
### DOWNED POWER LINES — THE LOADED GUN

When an overhead power line is downed by accident or weather, it's not necessarily dead — but you might be unless you stay away from it! An electrical power line is due the same respect as a firearm. Just as there is no such thing as an unloaded gun, there are no dead power lines.

A downed line that seems dead may be reenergized by a lightning strike on the line, contact with other power lines or interaction with another source of electricity somewhere back down the line. This may happen without warning or opportunity to break contact.

High voltages may be transmitted through materials other than metals. A wooden pole, a fiber rope or other normally non-conducting materials may carry an electrical current if they become wet or soiled. The loose ends of the conductor may also energize the wiring, plumbing or steel supports of structures, metal fences, telephone or cable television systems, and vehicles. Green tree limbs will conduct electricity.

Given the wrong set of circumstances, a current will go to ground in you. Don't give it the chance! Handle it safely by not handling it at all. Keep others away and give your electrical utility a call.

## Blaylock Hall of Fame Inductee

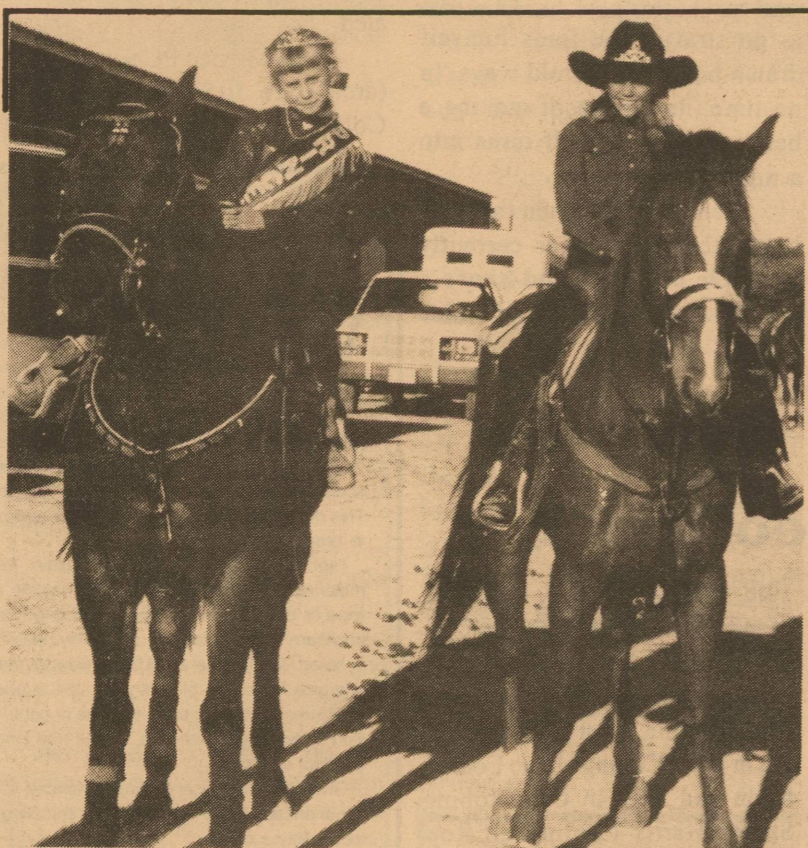

They dragged her through the corridor that day. She was barely clothed and the look on her face was one of panic. She knew what these men intended to do with her and surely by the end of the day her life would be over. They burst out of the corridor into the bright sunlight of the courtyard and began to make their way across the crowded area. Soon a crowd of curious onlookers began to follow - wondering what was about to take place. Finally they rounded the corner and with one last shove sent the woman sprawling on the ground before a simple man, a man who was sitting and quietly talking with a few friends.

The leader of the group snarled, "Teacher, this woman was caught in adultery. The law says we should stone her, but we want to know what you say we should do with her." Jesus simply remained in his stooped position, writing in the dirt as the men taunted him. Finally He rose and said, "Let the one of you who has never sinned throw the first stone." One by one the men began to leave until they were all gone. Jesus look at the woman who had somehow gotten to her feet and asked her where were the ones who had condemned her. Where were the ones who had already decided that her life was to come to an end. She said, "There is no one here to condemn me." Jesus responded, "Neither do I condemn you. Go and sin no more."

"Neither do I condemn you." What a wonderful balance to her from God. On the one hand Jesus demonstrates complete understanding of our human tendency to fall short of the standards of god. He did not scold or berate the woman for her sin. He simply forgave her. The after making sure she understood that she was forgiven (not condemned) he challenged her to live up to the highest standards when he said to her, "Go and sin no more."

This beautiful story from the eighth chapter of the Gospel of John reminds us that God loves us just as we are. He knows we will fail to live up to his standards, yet we are not condemned for our failures. That is security, and from that secure position God expects us to move toward the highest standards of living as we attempt to live lives totally free of sin. Will we fail? Probably, but we never need fear that our failure will cause God to love us any less. God is truly a great God!
