Yorba Linda, California

Richard Milhous Nixon, 37th President of the United States was buried on the grounds of the Nixon Presidential Library in Yorba Linda, California Wednesday, April 27, 1994. Nixon, 81 had been in a coma for three days after suffering a stroke last week. Nixon won election to the Presidency in 1968 and re-election in 1972 before resigning in the midst of the Watergate scandal. The funeral was attended by President Clinton and former Presidents Bush, Reagan, Carter and Ford.

Cape Town, South A frica

Nelson Mandela was elected President of South Africa in the first ever multi-racial elections in that country. The election was made possible by reforms enacted by the government of President F.W. de Klerk. The election brings to an end the system of racial separation in South Africa known as apartheid.

Seoul, South Korea

South Korean defense forces remain on a heightened state of alert this week as tensions continued between North and South Korea. The North Korean government has refused to allow international inspection of it's alleged nuclear facilities. American troops from Fort Bliss near El Paso have been deployed to the Korean peninsula along with several batteries of Patriot missiles made famous during the Persian Gulf War. The Clinton administration insists that it will not allow North Korea to develop a nuclear capability. CIA spokesmen disclosed last week however, that the spy agency suspects North Korea already has as many as three nuclear devices and could have twelve by years end.





a hilarious Spanish Matador who displayed his Bull(dog) fighting prowess.



The Cost of Federal Mandates Hits Home

Frequent readers of this column may remember that one of my top priorities in Washington is to reduce the burden of unfunded federal mandates on industry and state and local governments.

Now the city of Fredericksburg, a community of 6,800 in my district, has given me a fresh reminder of why this is such a pressing issue.

As budget constraints have reduced the money available for Congress to throw its weight around, the liberal leadership has increasingly taken to looking elsewhere for resources.

Can't raise taxes any higher to pay for a new social program and a big federal bureaucracy to go along with it? The solution they have found is as simple as it is unfair: just order someone else to raise their taxes and do it for you.

That approach has led Congress to pass sweeping mandates that often force cash-strapped local communities to spend millions of dollars on, for example, unreasonable environmental standards.

In effect, Congress is now in the business of raising local taxes. In fact, Congress is also in the business of rais-




drive small businesses under.

The Rochester Institute of Technology estimates that these invisible taxes cost our economy a staggering \$580 billion in 1992. That translates to \$6,500 a year for the average family.

But sometimes the problem hits home even more starkly.

Fredericksburg recently had to spend more than \$1 million for a new landfill because of new regulations issued by the Environmental Protection Agency. That's almost \$150 for every person in town.

That exorbitant cost prompted the city to pass a resolution seeking relief from federal meddling. The resolution makes several compelling points:



• "Federal mandates are too often inflexible, one-size-fits-all requirements that impose unrealistic time frames and specify procedures or facilities when less-costly alternatives might be just as effective.'

• "Excessive federal burdens on cities force upon citizens and taxpayers either higher local taxes and fees, reduced local services, or both."

Fredericksburg, I hear you.

That's why in November I introduced legislation designed to reduce the burden of federal mandates on state and local governments by almost half over seven years. My bill would also require that their costs be tabulated and 'budgeted' thereafter, within strict limits.

Imperially handing down unfunded edicts is the height of legislative irresponsibility and must be brought to a halt.



THE LOADED GUN

hen an overhead power line is downed by accident or weather, it's not necessarily dead -- but you might be unless you stay away from it! An electrical power line is due the same respect as a firearm. Just as there is no such thing as an unloaded gun, there are no dead power lines.

A downed line that seems dead may be reenergized by a lightning strike on the line, contact with other power lines or interaction with another source of electricity somewhere back down the line. This may happen without warning or opportunity to break contact.

High voltages may be transmitted through materials other than metals. A wooden pole, a fiber rope or other normally non-conducting materials may carry an electrical current if they become wet or soiled. The loose ends of the conductor may also energize the wiring, plumbing or steel supports of structures, metal fences, telephone or cable television systems, and vehicles. Green tree limbs will conduct electricity.

Given the wrong set of circumstances, a current will go to ground in you. Don't give it the chance! Handle it safely by not handling it at all. Keep others away and give your elec trical utility a call





He did not scold or berate the woman for her sin. He simply forgave her. The after making sure she understood that she was forgiven (not condemned) he challenged her to live up to the highest standards when he said to her, "Go and sin no more."
