The San Angelo Telephone Company has started work on rebuilding of the telephone lines for the Eldorado exchange, a crew from San Angelo having begun work on the remodelling project this week. The company will install new poles and wire, and in Eldorado will lay cables.

The company serves about 375 patrons through the Eldorado exchange, having bought the business from Albert Bailey many years ago. After a destructive ice storm in 1923 the lines were rebuilt, this being the last extensive rebuilding project conducted by the company until this month, when the San Angelo crew began work
