First Bale Is Ginned Here

Schleicher County's first bale of cotton came in Tuesday from the Phluger place, rented by A. J. Holbert. The bale weighed 1560 pounds of lint cotton and ginned out 570 pounds. Ginning was done free at the Eldorado Gin Co. This bale comes in unusually early, as it was planted in April. Because of lack of rain some of the late cotton will probably not produce, growers report.

Wool Price Discussed As War Comes to End

Wool growers of Schleicher Co., interested in price trends in the wool market, are reading with interest reports concerning controversy over continuation of the government's price control, and there is much speculation in ranch homes concerning proper government procedure. The wool program will be under the direction of H. E. Reed, director of the livestock branch of the department's production and marketing administration. The National Wool Growers' Association has been meeting to determine the public's wishes in the matter.

Many wool authorities believe that the commodity has come thru the war in good shape and state it might be safely turned back to private enterprise. Others hold it would be good judgement to stay under the federal protection for a time longer.

Schleicher county residents seem not to be alone in thinking new tires will be available soon. Government officials, however, offer little immediate relief from the rubber shortage.

Rubber industry officials expect tire rationing to be abolished by the end of the year, but they don't think you'll be able to step up and buy a complete set of new tires. You may get a tire if you really need it but the supply won't be sufficient to meet demands.

Clocks Soon to Be Moved Back 1 Hour

War time soon will be on the way out!

When Congress reconvenes Sept. 6 it is expected to expedite passage of a joint resolution restoring pre-war standard time.

Wartime "daylight saving" will end when the President signs the resolution and clocks will be put back one hour.

Clocks were advanced one hour by Congress to lengthen daylight working hours and to save electric power.

County Rationing Board Still Operates

How the local Schleicher county rationing board will be effected by the end of some of the rationing regulations is not known at this time, as officials have received no word from the district office. Restrictions having been lifted on gasoline and canned goods, some of the work of the local board will be much lighter, and there is possibility that rationing of meats and fats will also be discontinued soon. It is probable that the board will be maintained for some time, because of continued shortage of tires and sugar.

The Schleicher County board was set up in 1942. J. E. Hill is chairman of the rationing board, with Mrs. Dorothy Evans, chief clerk and Cleone Dabney, clerk. Serving under APO they have been in charge of rationing of tires, sugar, shoes, gasoline, boots and stoves, and have managed price control for the county. Radio reports indicate that APO and WPB will be the last of the government war agencies to be discontinued.

Negro Building Improved

Work has begun to enlarge and repair the Negro school building. It is being made larger to accommodate an increased enrollment. The inside of the building is being sheet-rocked and painted. The outside of the building is being painted and repaired.

In accordance with recommendations made by the State Department of Education and health officers, new equipment has been purchased with money received from the federal government as subsidy to the hot lunch program.

An all metal Thurma-Duke, a device for keeping food hot, is being installed, as well as a sterilization sink for dish washing. An electric dring and milk cooler has also been added. A new cafeteria type stove is to be added as soon as it can be secured.

The school has been cooperating with the War Food Administration for two years whereby hot lunches have been made available to all students able to pay at small cost and to those unable to pay at no cost. The War Food Administration has made available 7c per lunch as subsidy and many agricultural products declared surplus by the government. The Parent Teacher Assn., has been instrumental in canning many of the vegetables and fruits

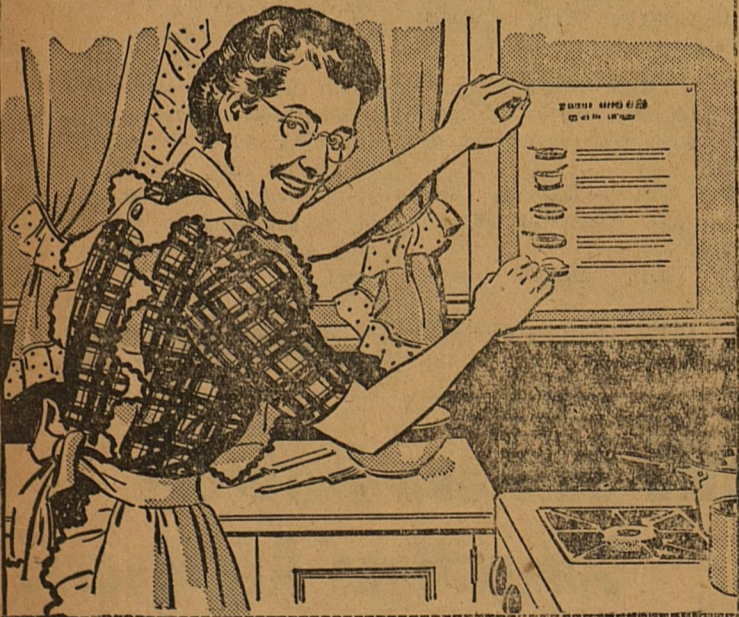

5 Good Country Tricks for Saving More Used Fats

THIS year our domestic supply of fats and oils will be approximately one and one-half billion pounds less than last year. Right now, we are facing our worst fat shortage since the war began. To make up for this staggering loss, the government is depending on the women of America—and particularly women on farms and in smaller cities.

Every spoonful, every drop of fat is needed to help make battlefield and homefront essentials. So roll up your sleeves and do an all-out job, won't you? Clip this checklist and pin it up in your kitchen as a reminder.



1. **FRIED SALT PORK**—with milk gravy. Salt pork yields so much grease, you won't need it all for gravy. Pour the rest into the salvage can.
2. **DEEP FAT FRYING**—use the fat over and over, but when it's too dark and smelly to use any more, don't forget Uncle Sam wants it!
3. **ROASTS AND CHOPS**—save all trimmings (scraps from plates, too.) Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down.
4. **SAUSAGES**—they're better if you parboil them first. Skim the fat off the cooking water—scrape the fat from the frying pan.
5. **CHICKEN SOUP**—chill it before you use it. Scoop off the hardened grease (soup tastes better, too!)

When the salvage can is full, take it to your butcher promptly. He will give you 2 red points and up to 4c for every pound of used fat you turn in.

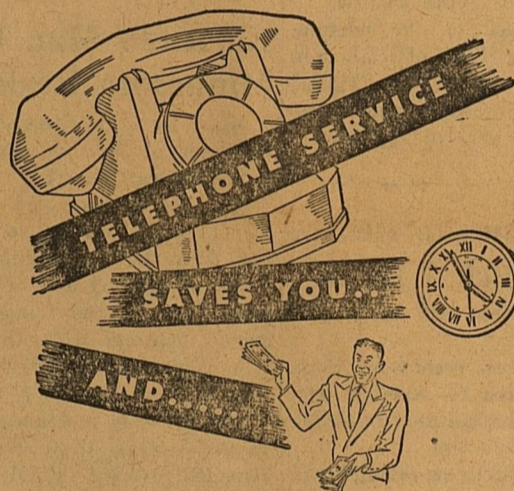

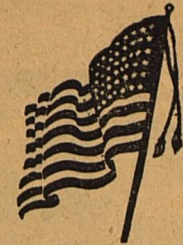

TO THE VOTERS OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY

As appears from interview with Judge B. W. Smith, president of the Tom Green County Bar Association appearing in a recent Sunday's Standard-Times, the Association has unanimously endorsed the proposed constitutional amendment setting up a nine judge Supreme Court for Texas.

As a committee named for the purpose of presenting the matter to the voters of our two judicial districts through the local papers we earnestly request their support for what we and nearly if not all the lawyers in West Texas consider not only a decidedly forward step in Texas jurisprudence but a necessary one, in order to secure a satisfactory tribunal for the final decision of Texas cases. The amendment does not increase the cost of the Supreme Court nor the number of judges constituting it. It simply enlarges the powers of the present Commissioners and gives them a vote in the decision of every case. Under the present setup any two judges of the Supreme Court can set aside the action of any three judges of our several Courts of Civil Appeals as well as decide a case adversely to the opinion not only of the other Supreme Court judge but the six Commissioners named to aid the court in disposing of its large docket by the Legislature. Under the nine judge court, litigants will have the benefit of the combined opinion of nine competent judges, five of whom must concur before any decision is rendered.

There are only three states, Arizona, Nevada and Wyoming which still have the three judge Supreme Court, and all three have much less population than Texas. Under the amendment the present Supreme Court and the six judges of the judicial commission will constitute the new nine judge court, all of whom will be subject to election by the people at future times and all of whom are men of wide judicial experience and residents of widely different sections of the state as a whole. VOTE AT ELECTION AUGUST 25, 1945.
