## Schleicher Agent Back At Old Job

First Lieutenant W. G. Godwin has received his discharge from the Army and has returned to Eldorado to take over his old post as county agent.

Mr. Godwin left Eldorado four years ago to enter service after he had been county agent of Schleicher County six years. Serving with the infantry he was overseas two years, in Africa, Sicily, Italy, France and Germany. He received his discharge on the point system, having 85 points.

Two agents, A. E. Prugal and Jack Welch, have served the county since Mr. Godwin left this office to enter service. The place has been vacant several weeks, Mr. Welch having gone to Weatherford to accept a position in the Farm Security office there.

Mr. Godwin states that one of his immediate aims will be developing the 4-H program in the county.

During his four years absence any of his former club boys grown up and entered service, and his clubs will be composed of members who were young boys at that time. Muddy roads have prevented his carrying out work with farmers in the county this week.

During the past four years Mrs. Godwin and daughter have been making their home in Eldorado.

## Several Rains Total At Least 5 Inches

Another slow drizzle began Monday night after Schleicher County had begun to dry out following a 3 inch week end rain, and from 1 to 5 inches of precipitation during the preceding weekend.

The long late summer drouth was definitely broken on Sept. 29 when showers, ranging in amount from 1 to 5 inches, fell in Schleicher County. After skies had cleared and roads had begun to dry, rains started again Wednesday of last week, the amount being officially recorded as follows on the government rain gauges:

The rains stopped Sunday and warm, clear weather Monday morning brought false promise of continual clear weather. Lowering clouds Monday afternoon blew in a brisk norther, and another rain, the third prolonged downpour in two weeks, followed.

Officials reports on this last "spell of weather" have not yet been released. It is estimated that allowing for spotted reports from various sections of the county, all parts must have received at least five inches.

The usual hardships caused by impassable roads are reported throughout Schleicher county.

The two high candidates are to go into a runoff to end at noon October 27. The winner is to be crowned Talon Queen on the night of October 27 in the high school auditorium. Following the crowning of the queen an all school carnival is to be held in the school gym.

The students of the high school have used this method for several years to help finance the school yearbook. The cost of editing and publishing the book usually runs about \$4.50 per copy. The students have paid from \$1.00 to \$1.50 or the cost and the remainder is raised by student activity.

## Highway Election Set For Saturday

The fate of the proposed east & west highway will be decided by Schleicher County voters Saturday when they go to their nine voting boxes and cast their votes on the proposed \$50,000 bond issue.

It is stressed by county officials that the election is county wide, and includes all qualified voters from county line to county line.

Voting boxes are located at the courthouse and the schoolhouse in this city, and at Mayer school, Adams school, Finnegan ranch house, Mayer school No. 2, Alexander school, Cliff school and Reynolds school. Voting box No. 7, at Kaffir, has been discontinued and voters will go to the school house.

Passage of the bond issue will place responsibility for starting of construction in the hands of the

State Highway Commission, who will order construction as soon as vital materials have been released. As a heavy schedule of highway improvement is planned for the post war period, it is thought that the delay will not be long. Highway engineers have already approved this particular road which will eventually connect Eldorado and Menard.

The county long ago planned this road and had actually set Dec. 10, 1941, as the date for the bond election—an election which was called off because of the Pearl Harbor attack three days before. The coming of peace caused renewed agitation for the election which was ordered at the regular meeting of the Commissioner's court on Sept. 10th.

## Eldoradoans Thrill As Menard Smear 19 to 7

After an odd, rainy week the Eldoradoans turned out with a few hours of hot sun and saw their high school football team open their 1945 conference schedule by definitely defeating a larger Menard high school team 19-7. Time and again in the first quarter the hustling Eldoradoans missed chances to score by a hair. The half ended 0-0. But Coach Vance of Eldorado must have told his cohorts either what they had to do or what Menard lacked, because in the last half the large crowd saw his group score three touchdowns even if the field was muddy.

On a mad dash of 15 yards off his right tackle William Spurgers reeled off the first touchdown behind some smooth blocking of Captain Hal Whitten and co-captain Stuart Williams. But Menard came back strong and with sledge hammer-like licks picked up enough yardage to nearly cover the field. The ball soon got back in the hands of Eldorado and in the fourth quarter three touchdowns were run over.

This was a game in which fans really got their money's worth. At the start of the fourth quarter Jack Hodges, the sophomore 147 lb. jumping back that plays all over the backfield, ripped out a plain line buck for a 50 yard romp

that carried him over the goal line standing up, and six would-be tacklers lying on the ground. It was the best run of the day and something good for any West Texan to see.

Then Coach Vance gambled with a bunch of second stringers, whom he thought could hold the Menard boys, but in about 3 or 4 minutes the Menard team ran a few well executed plays over for a 13-7 score. With but a minute or two to go, the first stringers of Eldorado were put back in the fray and on the last play of the game, the tall, lank Bill Lewis Humphrey whipped over a 35 yard pass to Billy Harrison who scampered 40 yards without much trouble to another touchdown.

Defensively J. D. Yardley, the left end prospect of Coach Vance did well. Little 117 lb. Red Green at center got as many, if not more tackles, than his big 175 lb. team mate, Tackle Frank Doty got—and, that is saying a mouthful.

## Fire Prevention Week Now Under Way

This week—October 7-13, has been proclaimed Fire Prevention Week by the President. Safety is everybody's business; therefore each individual should check for fire hazards around his home and premises.

Statistics show that farm fires have killed 3500 people and destroyed property worth more than \$90,000,000. A farm home or building catches fire every 15 minutes during the day. This is a terrible record; we must take action to reduce these figures.

Stop and think; do not be caught "napping." Begin now to be more observing. The following is a list of Do's and Dont's we could use to help eliminate all possible fire hazards.

Don't throw cigarettes around the home, barn, pasture, or along the roadside.

Don't fill the tractor while motor is running.

Don't leave gasoline in open containers.

Don't use large gas or kerosene containers to start or replenish fires.

Don't leave matches in the reach of young children.

Do extinguish all outside fires after using.

Do check often the electric wiring for proper insulation.

Do keep waste paper, trash, etc. in safe containers away from stoves or heating units.

Do see that all matches are removed from clothing before storing.



**Instructions Given for Summer Mince Meat**

Texas homemakers who have never made summer mincemeat from late pears have a treat in store for them.

Few recipes issued by the Texas A. & M. College extension service ever have met with greater enthusiasm, according to Gwendolyn Jones, extension specialist in food preservation. The recipe calls for some sweetening, and either honey or corn syrup can be substituted for sugar. Corn syrup probably would be preferable, Miss Jones says.

Ripe pears should be used in the mincemeat. If homemakers have hard, green pears, these may be wrapped in newspaper and stored in a cool, dark place to mellow. A cool place is especially important, Miss Jones says, otherwise the pears may spoil quickly. Ventilated cellars or pantries would be excellent storage places.

Here is the recipe:

- Summer Mincemeat from Pears
  - 7 1-2 lbs pears, peeled or cored
  - 1 lemon, 1 apple, peel and all.
  - 1 cup grape juice or other fruit juice, not too sweet.
  - 1 tablespoon each ground cinnamon, cloves and all spice
  - 1 pound seedless raisins.
  - 6 cups sugar or 3 cups honey and 1 cup sugar or 6 cups of corn syrup.
  - 1 cup vinegar.
  - 1 teaspoon salt.
- Grind pears, lemon and apple. Mix all other ingredients and boil for two hours. Pack into hot jars. Seal while hot.

Another pear recipe Miss Jones recommends is for pear butter.

**Pear Butter**  
Peel and core one gallon of late ripe pears; put in kettle and add two cups water; boil slowly; when tender put through a ricer or colander. To every four cups of pulp add two cups of sugar (1 cup honey and 1-2 cup sugar may be used, or 2 1-2 cups corn syrup). Place on stove again and cook slowly until very thick. Stir to prevent sticking. A few minutes before removing, add juice of one lemon. Pack into hot sterilized jars. Leave no head space. Have lids and rubbers hot. Seal.

**Vegetable Storage Is Demonstrated**

"The successful storage of some vegetables is not at all difficult in the drier sections of the State," said Mrs. Pittman in giving her demonstration Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 19 in the home of Mrs. Fred Watson, to members of the Country Woman's Club.

Mrs. Pittman demonstrated by using bundles of feed, laying the stalks flat on the ground, then crosswise, after which came the stalks of feed shaped like a shock around the vegetables. The vegetable pile is then covered completely with dirt to make a mound. To keep rain from running in the vent pipe which was completed by the stalks, a wooden cap was made of two pieces of 1x8 lumber each about 12 to 18 inches long, nailed together. This cap is held in place by wire with rock weights to each end of it.


