## Schleicher Votes Yes On Bonds

Passing of the \$50,000 road bond election and announcement of re-routing of the proposed Eldorado-Menard road to bring it to the Eldorado business district were important week-end events in the county's highway improvement campaign.

The vote was 303 for, and 15 against the bonds. Shortly before voters went to the polls Saturday, word came from the highway department that the blue-print routing of the highway in town had been changed to bring the road to the main part of Eldorado.

The advantage to the city is two-fold; it brings the road to the business district and gives the city about three additional blocks of paving. Saving of a good sum of money was assigned as the reason for the change. The original survey had called for building of the road bed through the lake site, which would have been expensive, and for juncture of this highway with 277 through the Eldorado Gin, which would have necessitated purchasing of that property.

The new route will follow Murcheson street, passing the Primitive Baptist Church and stopping at the West Texas Utility corner. Some of the property which it will pass will be lots owned by Mrs. Ora Davis, Miss Dora Riley, Mrs. Jess Thompson, Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Hoover (passing at the side), Postmaster Brooks (a rent house), and Bert Page and Mrs. J. A. Whitten (passing at the rear). Upon entering Murcheson it will slice off parts of several lots, to allow for a wide curve which will fulfill safety requirements.

### Vote is Light

The vote in Saturday's election was surprisingly light, considering the fact that an issue involving money usually brings out most of the qualified voters. Though some of Schleicher's eight or nine hundred voters were not property owners and were therefore disqualified in this election, the 318 who voted were probably less than half of those qualified to vote.

### Now What?

The procedure from now on will be as follows: County court will estimate the cost of right-of-way then will issue and sell bonds as needed, the amount not to exceed \$50,000.00.

The State Highway Department were notified immediately after the election that the bond issue had carried. Schleicher County has done all that it can do for the time—the next move must come from the State, with actual moving in of equipment. At least five miles of right-of-way has been secured or could be secured at once if the state should wish to start work tomorrow; this includes 100

feet of right-of-way to the depot locality, and other sections along the proposed route through the county.

Assurance that this strip of road will be built, probably in the near future, is welcome news to Schleicherites, who have been inconvenienced countless times by the impassable condition of the roads in wet weather. It is generally conceded that there is no mud like Schleicher County mud; in rainy season farms and ranches have been isolated units on which no business could be conducted involving use of the public roads.

### Future Procedure

With settling of the question of the Menard-Eldorado road, Schleicherites are discussing a problem of the future: where will the road go from here? There are three possible routes: straight west to the Ozona-Barnhart road, (2) northwest to Barnhart and (3) more nearly north to Mertzon. Of these three the Barnhart route might give Schleicher the most paving. It is probable that before long the state will give attention to this new stretch, which would connect Eldorado with paving to the west.

The chief burden of financing road building, it is pointed out, falls on the state. The county funds voted in the election are used only for purchase of right-of-way and for other similar expenses.

## Fred Watson Hurt In Roundup Accident At Davidson Ranch

Fred Watson is undergoing treatment at a San Angelo hospital for injuries sustained when a horse fell on him while he was helping with a roundup on the Roy Davidson ranch Tuesday morning.

His injuries were at first thought to be serious, but by Wednesday he was reported to resting well and not as seriously hurt as at first feared. He will probably remain in the hospital a week or ten days unless he takes a turn for the worse.

## War Chest Drive Now Under Way

The Schleicher County goal in the War Chest drive has not yet been reached, but little soliciting has as yet been done. About 40 per cent of the quota has been raised by voluntary donations, to date. All who have not contributed are urged to do so at once.

## Victim of Iwo Jima Home on Furlough

"Cap" Owen Abner Fry, 46, badly crippled veteran of the Iwo Jima campaign, is at home on a 36-day furlough after months of hospitalization which resulted two weeks ago in fitting of an artificial leg.

"Cap" was shot ten feet into the air in the campaign on April 19, and lost his foot and sustained temporary loss of vision. He was helping to bury dead Japs when he was hit. The leg was amputated on the field where he was wounded, and again at Pearl Harbor, after which he was removed to Mare Island where he is now located.

Two weeks ago he was fitted up with an artificial leg. His other leg is also badly injured, and he walks with crutches. Upon his return to Mare Island doctors will give attention to his teeth and eyes. He hopes to receive his discharge by Christmas.

Weeks of preparation on the part of pastor and church workers will culminate Sunday in the opening of the autumn revival at the First Baptist Church of Eldorado.

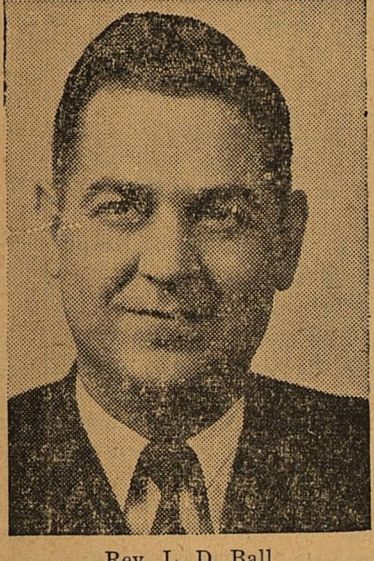

## WHITTEN BOOTS EXTRA POINT TO TOP SONORA 7-6 FOR 28th STRAIGHT

With but four lettermen and seven other scrappy youngsters the Eldorado high school Eagles defeated Sonora high school Broncos 7-6 for the 28th straight time in just that same number of years. Bewildered at first by the peculiar line shifting tactics employed by the Sonorans, the Eldorado boys were held scoreless the first half. But the Eagles came back and Wm. Spurgers took advantage of the weak spot left on the line due to shifting, and ran a touch down over standing up. The game was a sell-out with one of the biggest crowds present ever to see such a game.

The Eldoradoans were out-passed and out-maneuvered most of the game by Sonora, but showed they knew how to stop a try-for-point when the chips were down as was evidenced by Ray Long's block in the middle of the placement which saved the game from a 7-7 tie, and instead made it only 6 points for Sonora.

The mentioning of the game would be incomplete if one failed to show another point that Eldorado had banked on. It was their rivals' weakness in getting off safe punts. Co-captain Stuart Williams playing at guard, out-smarted Sonora's highly touted "Nasty" Taylor at his respective position and ran pell-mell into a

ball that was being punted and blocked it. This punt was blocked in pay dirt, deep in Sonora's territory, and took place at the opportune place and time of the game which set up a quick touch-down by Eldorado and spelled the difference of a defeat or a win.

Captain Hall Whitten's trusted left toe smacked the pigskin between the uprights of the goal for the muchly needed extra point.

A few well executed pass plays by Sonora followed and the game ended 7-6 in Eldorado's favor. This was the 28th straight win of Eldorado over Sonora in 28 years. Incidentally it is their second straight win in the 4-B conference.

### WILLIAMS SELLS RAM TO TEXAS TECH

Lubbock.—The Texas Tech Agricultural division has added a Rambouillet ram purchased from John L. Williams of Eldorado, and an Angora buck donated by B. M. Halbert, Jr., of Sonora to its flocks. The Rambouillet is the second purchased from Williams. Halbert has furnished bucks regularly to the college since 1939.

The Eldorado City Council in session Thursday night, authorized an engineer from Beaver and Lodal of San Antonio, to make a survey of the streets of Eldorado and outlying districts which need water and sewer service and bring back an estimate of the cost of paving the city streets. This action was taken in response to public interest in doing something about the mud problem in Eldorado.

Representatives of two companies were present at the meeting. The engineer arrives here this week to start making the survey. Eventually he will present blue prints of his recommendations, with estimated costs. If the project seems practical the council will order an election.

Various plans will be studied, such as 20-foot surfacing and 30-foot surfacing over the entire city, consisting of 10 miles of city streets. It was suggested that the 10 miles of 20-foot surfacing would probably cost \$103,000, but that is only a tentative figure.

Water and sewer extensions must be made before streets are surfaced, as it is expensive to make them after paving is laid.

It is hoped to handle the project in 1946, starting if possible by Jan. 1. Before work could be started an election would be ordered at which residents of the city could register their choice.

The entire project is still in the planning stage. Many preliminaries must be disposed of before Mayor Baker and his councilmen have definite figures which they can present to the public for consideration.

**J. T. Jackson, Jr. Now In Japan**

Tokyo Bay.—It is "Last Stop, Tokyo" for J. T. Jackson, Jr., 39, GM2e, USNR, of Eldorado, Texas, and here in Tokyo Bay as he participates in the crowning event of almost four years of naval warfare in the Pacific—the American occupation of Japan—he can look forward to early return to the States for discharge under the Navy's point system.

One of the first group of 58 enlisted men serving on the USS Colorado who have the necessary 44 points for release from active duty, his combat record contains a list of impressive amphibious operations that have supported seizure of island stepping stones, carving out an invasion route that led to Japan's surrender.

He can count a total of 53 points based on length of service, age and dependency, and has had 42 months of duty in the Pacific, taking part as a member of the Colorado's fighting crew in the invasion and occupation of Tarawa in the Gilbert Islands; Kwajalein and Eniwetok in the Marshalls; Saipan, Guam and Tinian in the Marianas; Leyte, Mindoro and Lingayen Gulf in the Philippines; Okinawa in the Ryukus, and now the occupation of the Tokyo area.

The Colorado, on which he has served for the last 43 months, was among the first group of warships to enter Sagami Bay preliminary to moving into Tokyo Bay to support the landing of occupation forces in that area, helping to make up the greatest array of naval fighting strength ever before assembled.

His wife lives at Eldorado, Tex. also his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Jackson.

### AAA News

The local Agricultural Conservation Association Committee has received the necessary drafts for issuance of subsidy on sheep and lambs sold directly to the slaughterers. Wednesday, the Committee issued ten drafts to local producers which amounted to \$5490.67. The subsidy was begun August 5, 1945 and producers have until Nov. 1, 1945 to make application for payment on all eligible sheep and lambs sold prior to that date. After November 1st application must be made within 60 days after date of sale.

Applications for the Dairy Production Payment subsidy on milk, cream and butter sold are being taken at the local AAA office for sales made during July, August and September. The payment rate for this period is 13c per hundred pounds on butterfat and 55c per hundred pound on whole milk. Application must be made for this period by the last of November 1945.

### Offer Inducements For Army Enlistments

The Army offers the following inducements for enlistment:

1 year enlistment is open to any member of the AUS who has served therein for a period of not less than six months, such one-year period to begin upon the completion of any furlough granted for such reenlistment.

18 months enlistments—Is open to any applicant whether he has previous service or not.

2 year enlistment—Is open to any applicant whether he has previous service or not.

Exception—No one who has enlisted on or after June 1, 1945 may be discharged for the purpose of reenlisting for a shorter period.

Age—Any male person between the ages of 17 and 34 may be enlisted, providing otherwise qualified, except that no person under eighteen years of age may be enlisted without the written consent of his parents or guardian.

Promotion—Any person who enlists or reenlists in Grade 7 will, upon the expiration of six months service, be promoted to Grade 6 (if he has not already been promoted), providing he is otherwise qualified. Vacancy need not exist.

Reenlistment in Grade.—Men who have been honorably discharged and who enlist within 20 days

of discharge, will be enlisted in the highest permanent or temporary grade at time of discharge provided such enlistment is made prior to February 1, 1946.

Men discharged under the provisions of RRI-1, since 12 May 1945 and prior to receipt of this radio, will also be enlisted in the highest permanent or temporary grade, held at the time of discharge provided they re-enlist prior to 25 October 1945.

Re-Enlistment Furloughs.—All men re-enlisting within twenty days of discharge will be granted re-enlistment furloughs on the basis of thirty days for each year of service. However, no furlough will exceed ninety days.
