First REA Wire Being Strung Here

The first lap in Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op will be energized soon as a result of receipt of enough wire for 65 miles of line. Workmen have run wire west on line two to the Crockett County line; lines 8 and 9, running south from a point west of town, and going west to the Edgar Spencer ranch and back east and south to Willoughby, Thompson Bros. and Lawhon ranches, are other units which will be wired with material received in the recent shipment. These lines will take 51 miles of wire, including taps, leaving 15 miles of wire to use on another unit.

The wire strung from this shipment will furnish service for only about 1-3 of the first section, but officials hope that more will be received at intervals through the early winter months.

Football Lighting Nearly Completed

The major part of the work in installing of football field lights for night games has been done, with receipt of wire and stringing it to poles erected for that purpose. The new reflectors and lights have not yet arrived, but as soon as these are installed the system will be ready for use.

If the Eldorado Eagles should win the district football championship, and IF the bi-district game should be held here, it is hoped the event will be the first game here on a lighted gridiron.

New Barn Built On Wagley Ranch

A large barn, made of tiled brick, is being built on the J. H. Wagley place. Mr. Wagley, who owns a herd of registered Herefords, bought the place from the Nicks family. It is located on the Angelo highway near town.

McClary, who have spent a great deal of time on their ranch near Marathon during the past year, have moved their household goods there and will make their home on the ranch in the future. Mr. and Mrs. McClary have been residents of Eldorado for a number of years, formerly operating a cafe, and later being managers of a butane gas company here.

GETS DISCHARGE

Thomas Baker has received his discharge from the armed forces and is at home here with his wife and daughter, Doris. Mr. Baker a farmer before enlisting, has served as a mechanic with the ground forces of the Air Corps and was last stationed at San Antonio.

Lt. Sproul Unharmed By Plane Accident at Sonora Racetrack

The Aeronca plane owned and operated by two local men, Louis Whitten and Chester Wheeler, was badly damaged in an accident at Sonora Friday afternoon, but the pilot, Lt. Robert Sproul, escaped unharmed.

Lt. Sproul, a flight officer, stationed at Romulus, Mich., was here last week to attend the funeral of an uncle, Lt. Billy Farrington and to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Sproul. He had taken the plane to Sonora and was expecting to make a landing at the race track when the accident occurred. Facing the sun, he brought the plane down too low, struck a high line which knocked off the landing gear, and was forced to make a landing flat on the plane body, wheels being missing.

Mechanics came from the North Concho airport Sunday for the plane and have been awaiting insurance adjustment before starting on the repairs. The heavy damage is covered by insurance.

Lt. Sproul, who escaped completely unharmed by the accident has been piloting Liberators and Flying Fortresses in the war.

Gas Company Moves Three Miles of Pipe Along Menard Road

The local gas company moved three miles of pipe east of town Sunday, to give necessary right of way to the new Menard highway. The pipe line had followed the fence along the old 100-foot road, and had to be moved back to allow for the 120-foot right-of-way required by the new survey. Much of the work was done on the J. B. Christian place.

While the change was being made, gas was turned off most of the day Sunday.

Some of the east crew are staying in Menard, which at present is nearer their work, and most of the others are at the Eldo Hotel; all are Angelo men.

Spurgers Leads Eldorado in 6 to 0 Ozona Victory

Ozona high school's blue and grey football team, the usual winners in this district for many seasons heretofore, were practically vanquished Saturday from this 4-B district honors by a lighter, more inexperienced Eldorado high school eleven. When the Ozona club invaded the Eldorado city limits with twice as many lettermen on their starting lineup, most of the Schleicher county populace knew the chips were down and few thought or guessed that the Sikes-coached Ozonans would really take a 6-0 drubbing.

The first quarter was dismal for Eldorado. Ozona, led by "Speedy" Read at half back, ripped off gain after gain around our ends. Then "Big Boy" Wilkins, the former all-district tackle who has graduated to a halfback post for Ozona, would pick up other needed yardage over our line. Eldorado's chances seemed far-fetched.

Then, the first punt that Ozona tried somehow changed the aspect of the whole fray. Billy Dan McAngus, a green sophomore tackle from the remote hills of Schleicher county, slashed in and outsmarted some good Sikes-coached men to block a punt. The Eldorado club took heart and with a few bad breaks against them turned tables from this point on out.

Between the halves William Spurgers, the 140 lb. dynamic full back, gripped to Coach Al Vance of Eldorado about the fact that he had not carried the ball but three times and he did not even have up a sweat. Vance must have given Hal Whitten, the field general, the green light for Spurgers because he did enough to get up the sweat in the next two quarters. He was so consistent in his evasive off-tackle smashes, that before the game ended he could have been justly dubbed "3-yard Willie."

In the third quarter the Eldorado backers saw their proteges lose costly ground a few times on

fumbles. Then, they would go back and try to regain it. The fourth quarter Eldorado really came to life and definitely dominated the whole thing to outrun out hit, and out gain their rivals by some beautiful end runs, featuring Jack Hodges and Billy Harrison, plus the off tackle gains by Spurgers, with an occasional jab over center by the 115 pound quarterback Arthur Mund, Jr.

Result: one touchdown in a 2 1-2 yard rip over tackle by Spurgers. The game would not be complete if we failed to mention how stubbornly the Eldorado boys cut down the supposed-to-be unstoppable end runs of Ozona. Little 117 lb. Tom Green looking up at that big Ozona center (Smith) and taking him for a cleaning, was the outstanding defense man of the day. Bill Lewis Humphrey, the lanky Eldorado left end taking injured J. D. Yardley's place, realizing his one ambition of taking the usual sure-touchdown pass out of the paws of Ozona's famous "Speedy" Read; and last, but not least, that of Hal Whitten who found the weak spot in the Ozona right side, and had it pounded to pieces finally.

The 51st grand jury today (noon Thursday) indicted Carl Sofge for the murder of his brother, Clem Sofge, and remanded him to jail without bond pending further investigation. The jury then recessed subject to call.

Clem Sofge died at 1:30 October 21, in the Eldorado business district, of gunshot wounds. His brother, Carl, was arrested and charged with the shooting and has been out on \$10,000 bail.

J. L. Ratliff To Open New Store in Ozona

J. L. Ratliff has made a deal with Steve Perner of Ozona for a building on the west side of the Ozona business district and will open a new dry goods store there not later than December 1st. Management of the store has not been announced but the new business will carry a general line of dry goods, as do the other Ratliff stores.

This is the fourth Ratliff store others operating in Eldorado, Sonora and Rocksprings.

New Locker Building To Be Ready Soon

Next week will bring completion of the new locker building, though strikes in the electric industry are delaying delivery of electrical equipment, which will delay formal opening of the business.

Cementing of the main locker room, 27x20 feet in size, has occupied attention of workmen, who had previously covered the walls with cork insulating blocks.

The entire interior will be painted white, and the awning and outside building surfaces will also be painted.

Two Tests For Oil To Be Made

Preliminary work on the Tom Henderson oil test location is under way this week. Mgr. Guber Ferguson was in Eldorado Monday looking for a surveyor. It is understood that the rig will arrive soon.

The wildcat will go down to 6500 feet, on a location 5 miles northeast of a former test. The test is called the Geo. P. Livermore wildcat.

Manager Ferguson states that rooms and apartments for his men and their families will be needed.

Shell Oil Company's Tankersley No. 2 has been spudded in and drilling is under way, at a site located in Irion Co., on the Mertzon road, just over the Schleicher county line. This well, an offset of No. 1 Tankersley, a producer, will be one-half mile north of the first test. For use in operating the rotary rig 200 sacks of aquagel was bought recently in Eldorado.

The oil from the No. 1 producer is being trucked to the Shell Camp where it is used as crude oil.

Mrs. L. D. Ochsner Has Major Operation

Mrs. L. D. Ochsner sustained a major operation at an Angelo hospital Tuesday, after several weeks treatment. Her husband and children have been at her bedside this week; Clara Lloyd, TSCW student, arrived here Sunday. Two blood transfusions preceded the operation, and another was given yesterday. Her condition is reported to be satisfactory.

Topliffe Installs Big Butane Tank

E. H. Topliffe has been installing cement foundations for a large butane gas tank near the depot. The tank, which is near a railroad siding, will be kept filled through tank car service, and will enable Wholesaler Topliffe to give prompt service to his customers and to sell butane to neighboring distributors who may need such service.

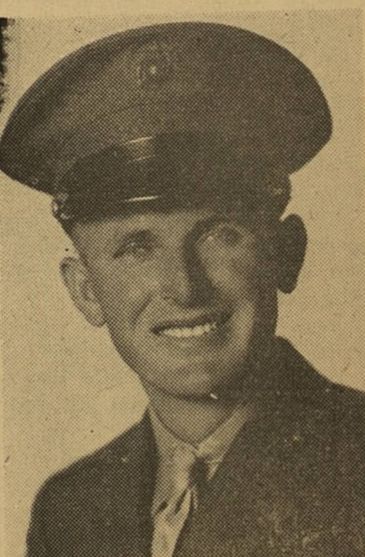
Clarence Rampy Gets His Discharge

AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK

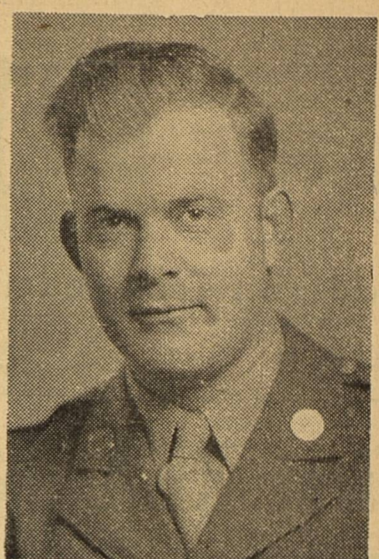

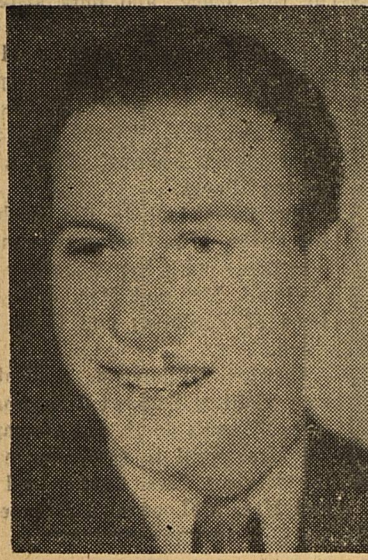

NOV. 21, 1945

AN IMPORTANT DATE FOR THOUSANDS OF ARMY VETERANS NOW IN CIVILIAN LIFE

Between now and November 21, thousands of Army veterans will reenlist in Uncle Sam's new volunteer peacetime Army. Because men who have been discharged between May 12 and November 1 of this year and reenlist on or before November 21 will be able to return to the Army with the same grade as they held when discharged.

Men with six months of satisfactory service discharged as privates will, on reenlistment before November 21, be given the grade of private first class.

Men now in the Army who apply for discharge after NOVEMBER 1 for the purpose of reenlisting in the Regular Army will also retain their present grades, if they enlist within 20 days after discharge and before FEBRUARY 1, 1946.

Can you think of any other job that would give you good pay, your food, clothing, quarters, free medical and dental care, world-wide travel, 30 days' furlough every year, education and training in any of nearly 200 skills or trades, and enable you to retire with a life income any time after 20 years' service? HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NEW ENLISTMENT PROGRAM

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (1-year enlistments permitted for men with 6 months' service.)
2. Men reenlisting retain their present grades, if they reenlist within 20 days after discharge and before Feb. 1, 1946. The same applies to men discharged between May 12 and Nov. 1, 1945, who reenlist before Nov. 21, 1945.
3. An increase in the reenlistment bonus to \$50 for each year of active service since the bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service.
4. 20% extra pay when overseas.
5. Paid furlough, up to 90 days, depending on length of service, with furlough travel paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who enlist.
6. Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to reenlist.
7. Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service — or three-quarters pay after 30 years. (Retirement income in grade of Master or First Sergeant up to \$155.25 per month for life.) All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
8. Benefits of GI Bill of Rights.
9. Family allowances for the term of enlistment for dependents of men who enlist or reenlist before July 1, 1946.
10. Choice of branch of service and overseas theater in Air, Ground or Service Forces on 3-year enlistments.

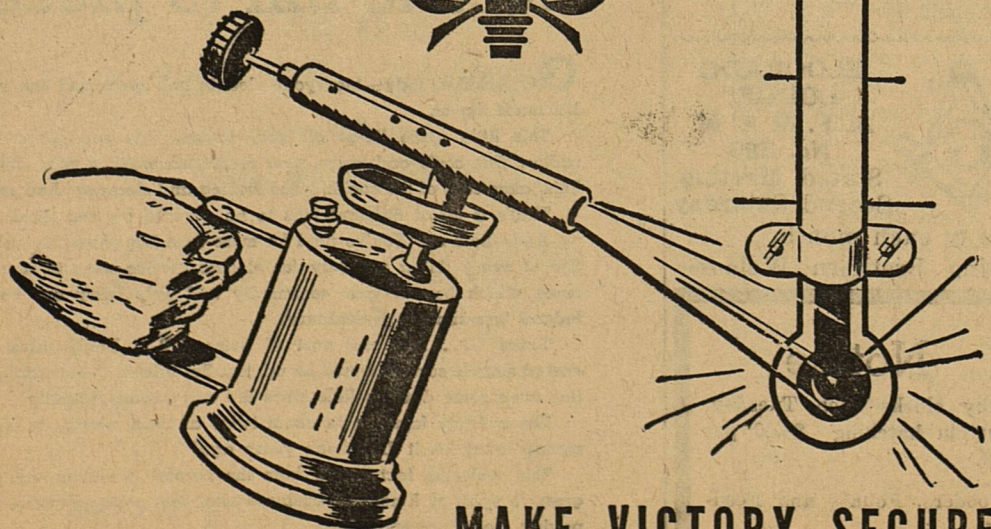
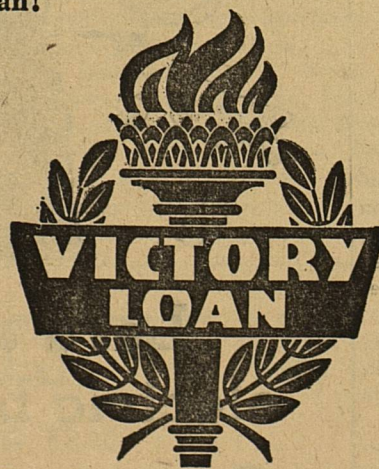

Plaintiff sues to forfeit and cancel University of Texas Lease No. 15,485 in so far as it includes 40 tracts of undeveloped University of Texas land located in Pecos, Crane, Crockett, Schleicher and Reagan Counties, Texas. Said lease was purportedly issued under the following Acts of the Legislature of the State of Texas Chapter 83, Acts 1917; Chapter 81, Acts 1919; Chapter 6, Acts 1921; Section 14, Chapter 71, Acts 1925; and Chapter 143, Acts 1925
