Date in Dec. Is Set For Sofge Trial

Another step has been taken in what may be a long legal procedure in the trial of Carl Sofge, charged with the murder of his brother Clem, 43, on the streets of Eldorado October 22.

The trial of Carl Sofge was set for Dec. 17, a venire of 85 men was called, and Sofge was free under \$15,000 bond as the result of a habeas corpus hearing in the Schleicher courthouse Monday.

Through the hearing an indication of the line of defense to be taken by the accused could be gleaned from the parade of witnesses who were presented.

Question of whether the deceased was carrying a gun was raised Mrs. Riley, a sister, testifying for the defense, stated that Clem had threatened Carl on several occasions. Details of the shooting were brought out by witnesses. Cramer, a brother who had witnessed the shooting, answered a defense question to the effect that he had not heard threats against Carl, but that Clem had not liked Carl's handling of the family's \$50,000 estate, in litigation since 1941.

Lawyers representing the defense are Will A. Morris of San Antonio, M. E. Blackburn of Junction and B. W. Smith of San Angelo.

About half as many series E bonds have been sold to date as were assigned to Schleicher Co., in the current Victory Loan drive, leaving about \$24,000 yet to be raised. A total of \$73,617.75 in bonds of all kinds has been sold here to date out of our over-all quota of \$115,000.

Meanwhile those who have not bought are urged to see the committee members and do at once. The drive will close December 8th, but Schleicher County should raise its quota long before then.

Eldorado Wins District By Defeating Junction 12-2

Hampered all season by a lack of experienced lettermen, too light a team, and with a much talked against "T" system that would not go, the cream of Eldorado's younger manhood came out on top of the district football heap as proud winners — unscathed, unheralded, and still modest as ever.

They beat all comers in the high school district competition with each one, except Mason, out-weighting them or having nearly twice as many dependable, experienced lettermen to make up their starting eleven.

Last Saturday, Nov. 10th, at Junction the Eldoradians ran into a well coached team that out-passed and out-charged them the first half so bad that the Schleicher boys were lucky to get off with a 2-0 score hanging over them. Surely, this could not go on.

Then, in the last half Schleicher County had stood enough of such rot, and systematically went about whipping their rivals' ears down. This half Eldoradians cheered lustily as meek, dark eyed William Spurgers was slipped back into fullback position, after being kept out practically all the first half due to an injury the first play of the game. He seemed to be the needed life blood of the Schleicher group. He reeled off previous gains time after time in his ripping twisting fashion to bring Eldorado down close to pay dirt. Then, the Junction lads stopped the spree. They somehow gouged out enough to make a few inches over ten yards in the next three plays. Following this, the same Junction team was held for downs and had to punt. But the combination of McAngus, Williams, Green, Long and Doty of Eldorado was far too much for the supposed-to-be-smarter Junction linemen: the punt was blocked by all five men from tackle to tackle of the Eldorado front wall. Now, the stage was set as per "the doctor's orders." But the third quarter ended at this point and the ball changed sides of the field but not to different teams. Eldorado had possession with but some 15 yards

to score. A couple of plunges by Jack Hodges and Billy Harrison; then William Spurgers faked to run off tackle, tore out over the center, and went over standing up.

The conversion from placement by Captain Hal Whitten was a few feet short. Score: Eldorado 6; Junction 2.

Then, Eldorado kicked off to Junction and Junction was stopped at her 32 yard stripe. A few well timed passes and tackle smashes and Junction had come up two first downs better off. At the middle of the field the Schleicher County Eagles held them in check so tight that they had to punt. They got off a beautiful one however, and they went on their wistful way—only, to have this punt carried back 80 yards for a touchdown by the fleet footed, newly married man, Billy Harrison. It really was the most spectacular play of the fray, since he ran over standing up, paced by Sonny Stanford, Frank Doty, and Bill Lewis Humphrey; all looking wild-eyed-like around for a would-be Junction tackler. The game ended with the Junction team trying to find a man open to pass to. Score: Eldorado 12, Junction 2. This game had all the suspense, hilarity, hard hitting, and clean sportsmanship that made one feel he got his money's worth.

For bi-district honors the Eldorado team is going to play the McCamey high school team, winners of district 3-B.

A spudder and a cable tool crew of four men moved in Monday to the oil test on the Tom Henderson place, in preparation for rotary operations which will be after the depth of about 750 feet has been reached. The cable crew will drill through the surface formations with 7 1/2 inch pipe after which the rotary rig will take hold.

It is not known how long the spudder will be required, but drilling started Tuesday, and it will possibly continue for a week or

two before required spud-in depth is reached.

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Taylor Starts Work On Cafe Building

Walter L. Taylor started work Monday morning on the foundation of a 30x24 foot building on lot No. 5, block E, Main street. The lot adjoins the Eldorado Feed store at the north. It was bought recently by Mr. Taylor for \$750 from Mrs. Sarah Shipp, former Eldorado resident.

The building will be frame covered with tin and stuccoed at the front. A room facing the street will be used for a cafe which Mr. and Mrs. Taylor will operate. They will occupy living quarters in the rear of the building.

Road Bond Sale Made on Monday

The road bonds voted at a recent county election were sold Monday at the session of Commissioners Court to R. K. Dunbar Co. of Austin, who were represented at the meeting by Jack Brown of San Angelo and W. M. Lance of Dallas.

The \$50,000 voted by Schleicher County to purchase right-of-way for the Menard road is to yield 2 1/2 per cent interest for the first 15 years and 2 3/4 per cent after that, the maturity date to be in 20 years.

Necessary details in making this sale occupied the attention of the commissioners all day Monday but by 5:00 p. m. the entire deal had been completed.

Locating of caliche beds, changing of the highway survey, and moving of fences are other preliminaries which must be completed before the State Highway Department can let contract for the new Menard road.

The county is using road bond money recently voted by Schleicher to move the fences, in accordance with the county's promise to furnish right-of-way. The fencing contract was let to A. T. Smith Jr., of Eldorado, who is moving two miles of fencing on one side of the road and three miles on the other.

It is not known when the contract for the road will be let, but it is hoped that it will be about the first of the year.

HODGES INJURED

Norman Hodges, commissioners road employee, is suffering with a broken shoulder in an Angelo hospital as the result of an accident in which the "cat" he was driving overturned. The broken bones were set last week, but yesterday, Wednesday, had to be broken over and re-set when they were found not to be healing properly. Mrs. Hodges has been with him.

The original committee of three, composed of Don McCormick, Will Whitten and the Rev. J. A. Carraker, met last week and as instructed at the mass meeting, held for the purpose of organization, five new members were added. These were carefully selected for very special qualifications: Mrs. Ruth Harper, who lost a brother in service; W. G. Godwin who represents the veterans of World War II; T. P. Robinson, from the City of Eldorado; Mrs. Luke Robinson of the Eastern part of the county; and J. F. Oglesby, of the West part of Schleicher.

The committee will eventually make their decision as to the nature of the memorial after they have canvassed the county. They announce their plans early in regard to this proposed canvass to enable every resident to give the question sufficient thought before hand to give the committee a definite answer when the time comes.

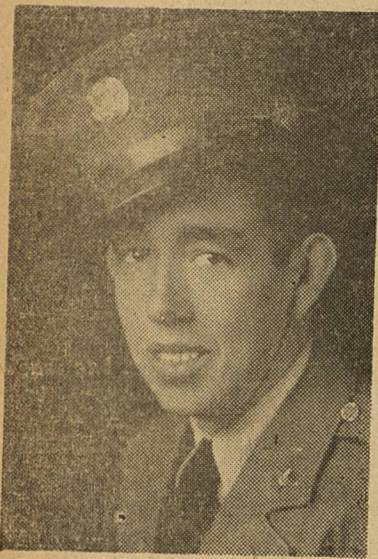

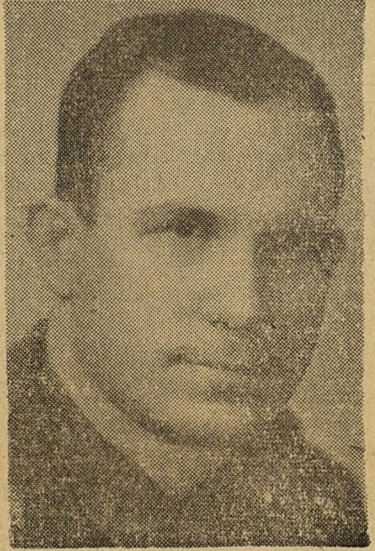

Sgt. Robert Wilson Is Discharged

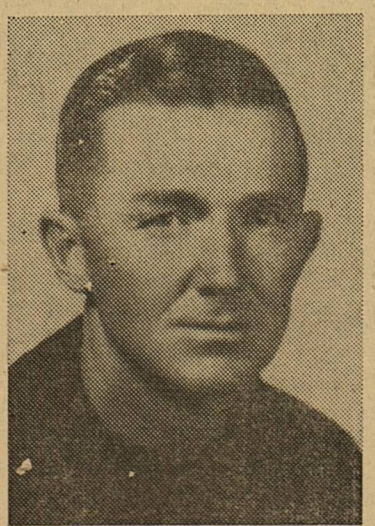

Washington News Letter

The National Labor - Management Conference opened in Washington last week to figure out how to settle industrial disputes without strikes. Ironically, some of the conferees had to walk to the opening session when 4200 AFL bus and street car operators walked out on a two-day strike.

It was the first street car strike in the Capital since 1917 and occurred when the strikers, who now receive up to \$1.02 an hour, demanded 30 cents an hour more. The walk-out was in violation of a contract between the union and the Transit Company, providing there would be no interruption to service during the life of the written agreement. The contract expires next June.

The shut-down created a field day for hitch-hikers. Everybody wanted to give everybody a ride and everybody wanted to ride with everybody. So except for a 50 per cent reduction in school attendance folks seemed to get along very well. About 500,000 Washingtonians ride the 1800 buses and street cars. Normally the Transit Company takes in about a million and a half fares a day here.

President Truman recently said that he was perturbed by the fact that 90 percent of his mail is leftist.

His remark caused me to watch my mail—that is, from pressure groups—for a week just to see how much came in from left-wing organizations. Here is a list of a week's receipts from the CIO and its Political Action Committee (PAC):

1. A letter from Philip Murray president of CIO, demanding immediate passage of a bill to create a permanent Fair Employment Practice Commission.

2. Another letter from Murray denouncing as "vicious un-American" a bill reported favorably by the House Military Affairs Committee on the subject of union responsibility in regard to strikes.

3. A 22-page pamphlet signed by Murray and Russian-born Sidney Hillman of the PAC demanding passage of the Full Employment bill. This bill would commit the Federal government to add millions of people to the public payroll in the future at a cost estimated by government officials up to 40 million dollars a year.

4. Another PAC pamphlet from Hillman calling for passage of a bill to raise the minimum wage from 40 cents an hour to 75 cents.

5. An issue of the weekly CIO News.

6. Another pamphlet by Murray on the subject of peace and security.

7. A copy of a letter to President Truman from C. B. Baldwin executive Vice president of the PAC, denouncing congressmen who had not voted with the CIO.

8. A monthly publication entitled "Economic Outlook" from the CIO, dealing with the demand for 52 hours of pay for 40 hours of work.

9. "Ammunition," another regular CIO publication, giving voting records of members of Congress and calling on all CIO members to take heed.

10. "Washington Close Up," by PAC, dealing with demands for more social security.

11. A letter from CIO opposing a one-year limitation period for actions against employers under the Wage and Hour law.

With England going Socialist and recent French elections almost giving Communists control there the Left-wing pressure in this country, as indicated by President Truman's remark, is becoming more persistent. But there was some assurance to be had from the Mayor's race in Detroit last week when the CIO-PAC candidate, R. T. Frankenstein, took a licking at the polls in the Nation's strongest CIO center.

Carroll Discharged



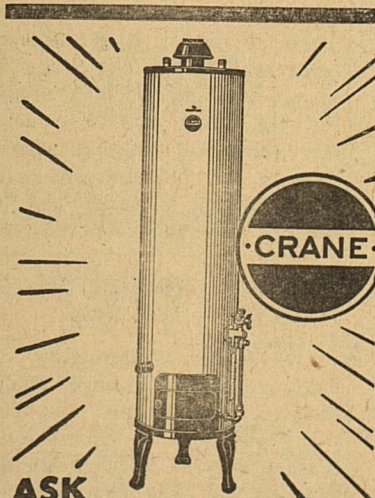

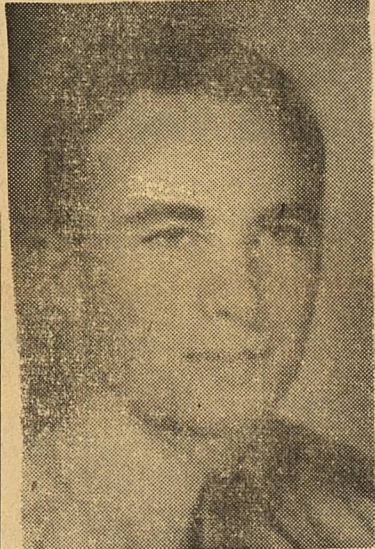
Jim Simpson Here With Discharge

Henderson, a graduate of the Eldorado High School, entered the service in January 1942, and was stationed most of the time in Alaska.

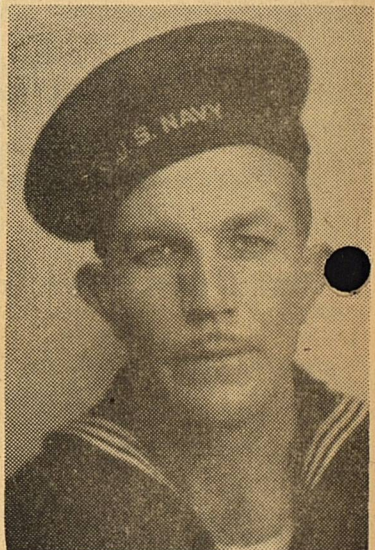
Luedecke Discharged

Plaintiff alleges that the Commissioner of the General Land Office exceeded his authority when he included in said lease the lands described in Paragraph 5 of plaintiff's petition since none of said tracts are contiguous to tracts producing oil and gas; plaintiff alleges that the Commissioner of the General Land Office was not authorized to include in said lease the lands described in Paragraph 5 of plaintiff's petition since the permits that included said tracts had expired before the lease was granted and that the Commissioner of the General Land Office was only authorized to issue a lease based upon the land that was included in the permit upon which oil and gas in paying quantities were secured; plaintiff alleges that the defendants have been requested by plaintiff to properly develop said tracts for oil and gas but that said defendants have failed and refused to do so, and that said acts constitute an abandonment of their interest in said tracts; plaintiff alleges that the defendants have failed and refused to properly develop said tracts for oil and gas and have thereby failed and refused to comply with the terms, conditions and covenants of said lease contract; that the above acts and allegation makes said lease in so far as it includes the tracts described in plaintiff's petition subject to cancellation and forfeiture; in the alternative, plaintiff alleges that defendants have failed and refused to properly develop said tracts for oil and gas as contemplated by the terms of said lease, and that plaintiff has no adequate remedy at law for damages caused by defendants' failure and refusal to develop said tracts, since said damages are speculative and incapable of measurement, and by reason of said facts, plaintiff is entitled to conditional decree for specific performance requiring defendants to proceed to properly develop said tracts and in the event of continuous failure and refusal to develop, that said Lease in so far as it includes said tracts be forfeited and cancelled by this court. Plaintiff prays that defendants be cited to appear and answer, and upon trial plaintiff have judgment forfeited and cancelling University of Texas Lease No. 15,485 insofar as it includes the tracts described in Paragraph 5 of plaintiff's petition, and in the alternative, the court enter its conditional decree of specific performance requiring said tracts to be properly developed for oil and

gas and upon defendants' failure to properly develop, that said tracts be forfeited and cancelled.

The defendants sought to be served by this citation are claiming and asserting title to the hereinafter described tracts set opposite their names, and the plaintiff is seeking to forfeit and cancel same based upon the above allegations:

November Deadline For Re-Enlistment

Deadline of November 21st has been set for re-enlistment in the regular Army of all men who were discharged between May 12, 1945 and November 1, 1945, who desire to maintain their former ratings. They will also receive the re-enlistment bonus of \$50 per year for every year of service if the enlistment becomes effective within ninety days after discharge.

Men discharged from the Army after November 1st will have a period of 20 days from date of discharge to re-enlist and receive their ratings and re-enlistment allowances.

Men enlisting for three years do not have to take their 90-days re-enlistment furlough at the beginning of the enlistment. A man re-enlisting may sign a waiver as to when he desires to take his re-enlistment furlough.

Discharged servicemen: To retain your rating re-enlist in the regular Army before November 21st. Remember that date. See the Army recruiters at the San Angelo Federal Building, Room 320, for further details.

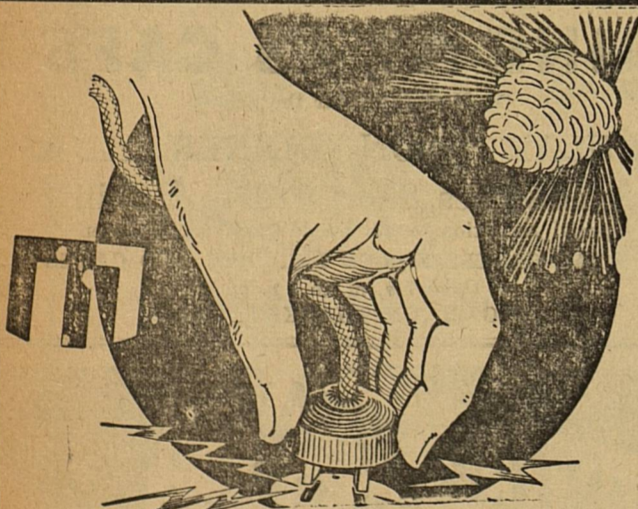

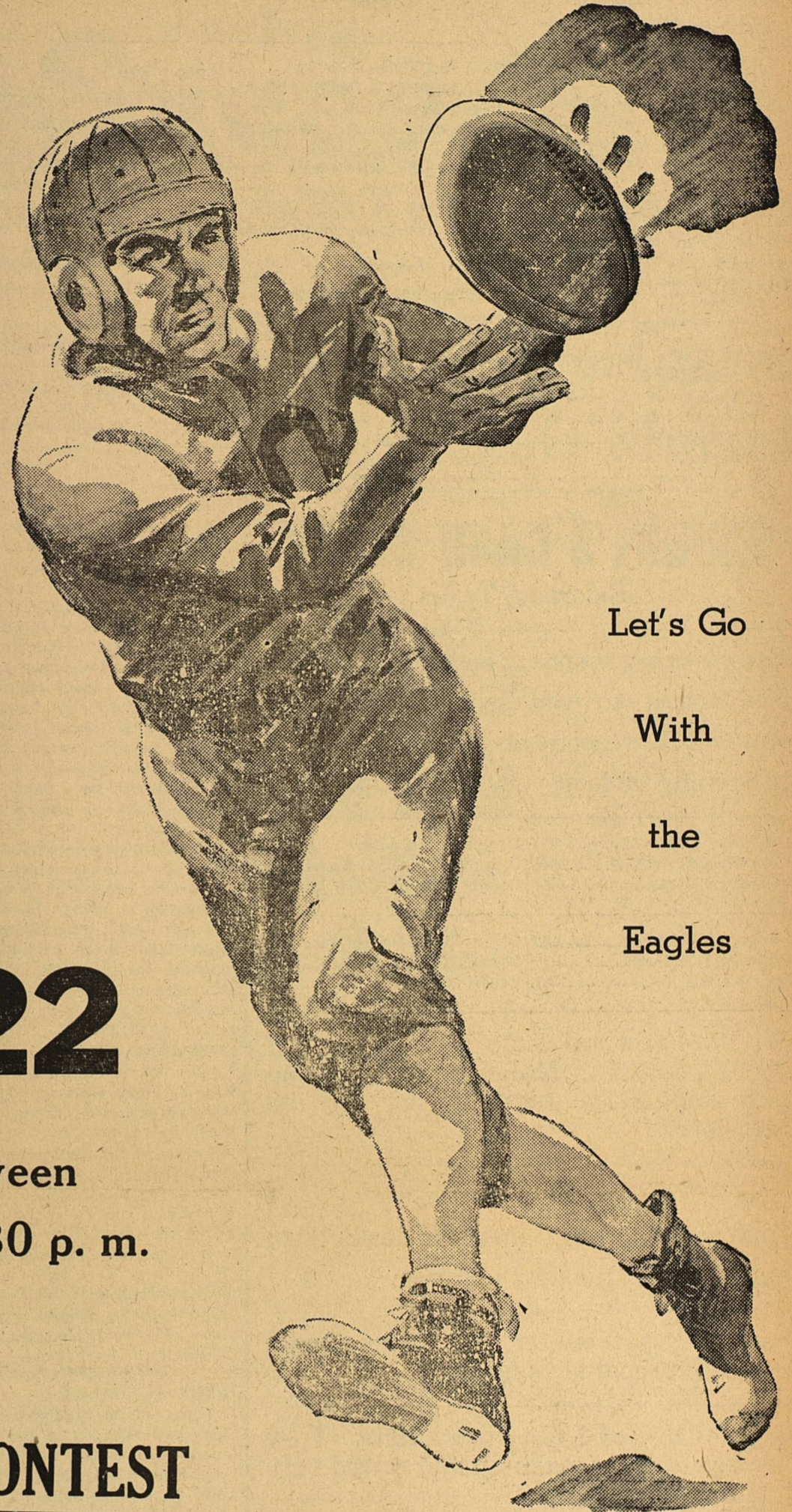

Kill Peach and Plum Tree Borers

The time of year has come to treat peach and plum trees for control of borers. If gum with brass or saw dust is noticed coming from a tree just below or above the ground line, the borer is at work.

The true borer, or base borer is a lad to watch for. It works underneath the bark of the tree just above or below the ground line. If it is not controlled it will weaken a tree and prepare it for attack by other destructive parasites.

Control may be obtained by applying PDB crystals around a tree after removing grass and weeds for a distance of 18 inches from the trunk. Dosages are 1-2 oz. of crystals for a tree under 3 years old, 3-4 oz. for a tree coming into bearing, 1 oz. for a mature or bearing tree, and 1 1-2 oz. for old or large trees.

The crystals are applied in a circle one inch wide and one and one-half or two inches from the tree trunk. If the borers entrance is above the ground build a dirt mound around the tree so the crystals may be placed above it. After crystals are applied cover with a few shovelful of dirt and pack. Remove the crystals at the end of 30 days to prevent damage to the tree.

If the borers are working in the branches of the tree they can be controlled by painting entrance holes lightly with 1 lb. of PDB crystals dissolved in 1-2 gallon of raw cottonseed oil, or linseed oil. Remove the gum and bark from around the hole to prevent injury to the tree.

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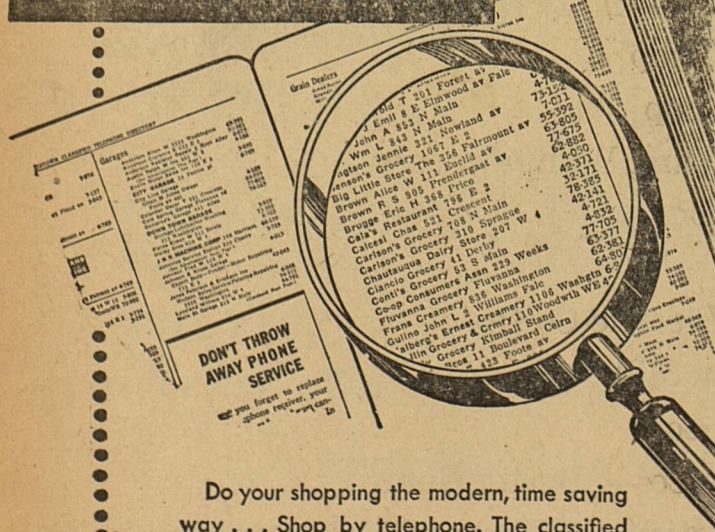
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
