Gifts For Veterans Are to Be Collected

Continuing the program, "Gifts for the Yanks Who Gave," which opened last year, the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary will again sponsor the drive for gift packages to be sent to hospitals throughout the States where servicemen and women and ex-servicemen are hospitalized.

In the local campaign, boxes are being placed in Long's Variety Store and the Ratliff Store to receive gifts. A splendid job was done last year, and it is the earnest desire of the sponsors to do even better in 1945. All those who are interested are asked to place their gift in the boxes as soon as possible, as the program which opened October 1, will close Dec. 15, and boxes must be off by that time.

Suggested gift items in general include: Books, but no war stories pocket size best books; Stationery, including games, playing cards, writing sets; pens and pencils; smokes lighters, pipes and tobacco; toilet articles, shaving cream, lotions, toothpaste, etc.; miscellaneous articles including pocket knives, identification bracelets, good sun glasses, wash cloths, etc. Things to wear, sleeveless sweaters, tee shirts, socks house shoes.

For G. I. Janes, books and fancy writing paper; toiletries of all kinds; notions such as bobby pins skirt hangers, zippers, sewing equipment; articles to wear, including scarfs, chamois gloves, handkerchiefs, bedroom slippers, etc.

It is asked that the public not give perishables or food stuffs, and that each package should be carefully marked for G. I. Joe or G. I. Jane.

New Office Planned For Dial Equipment

J. J. Clay, construction foreman for the San Angelo telephone maintenance crews, was in Eldorado Monday to discuss with C. C. McLaughlin, local manager, problems pertaining to installation of the dial telephone system.

Within a week, it is announced work will start on a building about 20x30 in size, to house the dial equipment. It is not known today if it will be placed beside the present telephone building or on another location. It will be made of cement blocks. When the new system is in operation there

will be no operators, but during designated hours, probably from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., the McLaughlins will be on hand to receive trouble calls. The present building will be used exclusively as manager's residence.

One of the two telephone crews now at work in Schleicher County began work Monday on cables in the City of Eldorado. The other crew is working in rural areas this week.

It has not been decided whether the new system will be put in operation all at once or in units as completed.

Housing Situation Grows More Serious

With the arrival late last week of the Livermore oil crew in Eldorado, the housing situation became acute in Eldorado. Newcomers were finding their search for accommodations almost hopeless as they went through the business district to make inquiries. The majority of the men were looking for furnished apartments and furnished rooms.

Apartments and furnished and unfurnished houses have usually been spoken for well in advance of the date they are vacated. It is generally agreed that the town could use a number of rent houses and several have indicated their intention of building them as soon as material is available.

It is thought by those who study the housing problem that the situation will get worse before it gets better. When the State starts work on the new Menard road which may be soon, and when the city gets action on its proposed street paving project—all of which may be under way in 1946—many more families will need accommodations.

The Eldorado city fathers urge all who can accommodate newcomers to do so as soon as possible.

Fausts Move Friday To New Parsonage

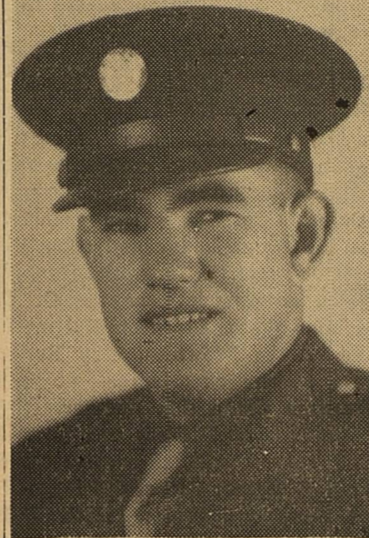

Albert McGinnis Gets His Discharge

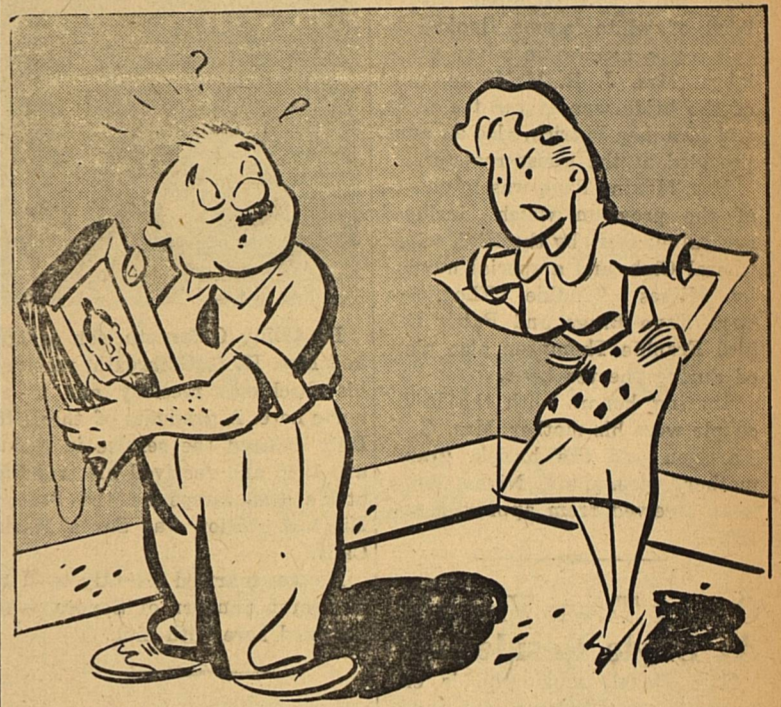

The Robert Lee High School football team, boasting 10 lettermen with 3 years experience and having had to use their first string but one quarter in 7 of 8 games this year, gave the overconfident Eldorado Hi club a real thrashing last Friday 46-0 at Robert Lee. Several years ago, according to the Robert Lee coach, an Eldorado team worked his green and inexperienced team over for a 100-0 score. (This must have been the reason he decided to keep his first stringers in for four full quarters.)
