

A Message to Our Eldorado Locker Patrons

We wish to thank all of you for your patience and to announce that our Eldorado locker plant is practically complete. We especially wish to express our thanks to the Eldorado Lions Club. Without the backing of this organization, it would have been much more difficult to have started the ball rolling. But most of all, we want to thank the members of the committee appointed to rent the required number of lockers and who did what they were appointed to do without pay in order that Eldorado might have a frozen foods locker plant. We promised the citizens of Eldorado a first class locker plant—one in which every member of the community could take pride. We have kept our promise.

First, we bought a good building, well located and larger than we now need, in order to be able to take care of the future needs of the community. When it comes to insulation, cork board is recognized as the standard of excellence. So we used cork board instead of some cheaper insulating material. We have a 34-degree vault in which to hold quarters until they are properly chilled

and aged before they are cut. We have a sharp freeze vault in which all products will be sharp frozen at minus 10 degrees before being stored in lockers. Finally, there is the locker room vault in which temperature of zero will be maintained.

We could have saved money by installing conventional, old style lockers. Instead, we paid more in order to provide the latest and most convenient kind—Safeway Broadview Lockers—wide and shallow for your convenience, and with real “baked-on” white enamel. Then we went further and ordered good spring locks for these lockers instead of the cheaper kind found in most plants.

When it came to machinery, we not only bought everything new but also of larger capacity than we now need. Also, it is fully automatic, which insures even temperatures necessary to avoid deterioration of frozen foods. All in all, we feel that the plant is one in which the community can justly take pride.

Complete Processing Service at Eldorado

From the beginning, we expect to render complete processing service at Eldorado for Eldorado patrons. The idea of doing the processing at San Angelo was a war time expediency. The war is over, so that idea has been abandoned. We are now installing the necessary processing equipment. Also, we will have our own slaughterhouse—so we can handle the job all the way from the live animal to your locker, cut and packaged just like you want it.

Formal Opening February 16

On Saturday, February 16, we will have our formal opening. Various experts will be on hand to aid us in explaining the benefits to be derived from a frozen foods locker plant. By that time, we will have assigned lockers by lot and will be ready to receive key deposit of \$1.00 on two keys to each locker.

Scattered through the lockers will be found prizes consisting of frozen foods—a turkey in one, a smoked ham in another, a one-pound package of sliced bacon in each of ten lockers, and a quart container of frozen whole cling peaches in each of ten others. Also, we will serve free coffee and doughnuts to all.

So come in and sign locker rental contract, get your keys, search your locker for a prize, and look the plant over.

Ready for Business February 18

We will be ready for business on Monday, Feb. 18.

We realize you have waited a long time and wish we could say “come on everybody.” But if we did, you would bring us more than we could handle, and somebody's meat might spoil. So, until the first rush is over, volume must be limited. Beginning at 8:00 a. m. on Saturday, February 16, you are invited to register with us if you want to have one (one only) animal slaughtered and-or processed for storage in your locker. We will receive and process animals so registered with us as fast as we can handle them in the same order in which they are registered with us, and will notify each registrant in advance as to when we can accept his animal or carcass.

After the first rush is over, all restrictions will be removed.

John's Personal Message

Since I first considered building a frozen foods locker plant at Eldorado, I have had in mind selling an interest in it if and when I could find a young man who lived there and whom I considered properly qualified to run it.

For the past two months, Jack Hext has been working with me at our plant in San Angelo, during which time he was shifted from one department to another in order to give him an opportunity to learn something of all phases of the business.

I found Jack to be careful, capable, ambitious, a willing worker and I believe in his honesty. Therefore, I have sold him a half interest in the Eldorado locker plant. It will be operated as a partnership under the name shown below. I believe Jack can and will operate our business efficiently and that you will be pleased with the service he renders.

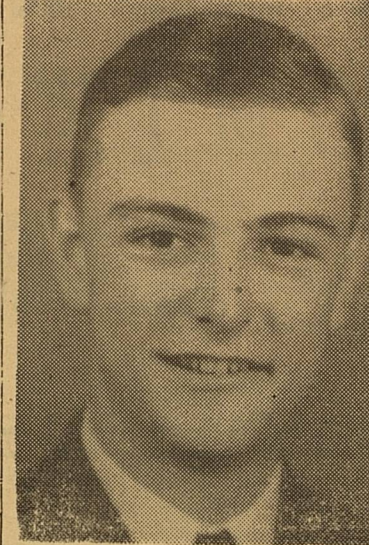

24 WOMEN TO RECEIVE KNITTING CERTIFICATES

Twenty-four Schleicher County women who have done over 100 hours in Red Cross knitting will receive certificates from the Red Cross, according to announcement made by Red Cross officials this week.

Two women made outstanding records, Miss Tom Pearl Smith running up a grand total of over 1000 hours, and Mrs. J. A. Whitten ranking a close second.

In Schleicher County, as elsewhere, there were few good knitters when the war opened. Many wanted to learn, and through practice became expert knitters. Some who had never held knitting needles in their hands before eventually learned to turn out beautifully finished garments.

Some of the younger set joined the knitters. Emily Ann Harper, Joan Bearce and Mildred Mund were Girl Scouts who learned.

In the county set-up, Mrs. Luke Robinson was chairman and Mrs. S. D. Harper, co-chairman. These directed the knitting of the garments, which fell under these heads:

Army: v-neck, sleeveless khaki sweaters; sleeved khaki sweater; khaki gloves, mufflers and helmets.

Navy: Long sleeved turtle-necked sweaters, watch caps, Navy helmets, scarfs, gloves, long white boot sox.

Refugee: Mens, womens and childrens long-sleeved sweaters, children's two-piece suits.

It is probable that because of the fact that certificates are to be issued, there will be no more knitting. A complete list of Schleicher knitters follows:

Ladies with 100 hours or more, to receive certificates:
