Mund, walked off with First Check Is Paid honors at the Schleicher County 4-H Club livestock show here las Saturday when his calf, a junior wet lot Angus won the grand cham pionship in the No. 1 division of the boy's baby beef show, and also for his steer calf in the No. 2 division. A grand premium of \$20.0' each was received by Mund for his championship calves.

Chilling winds, and a 24 degree temperature did not dampen young Arthur's enthusiasm nor that of Jess Koy, Schleicher county ranch man, and breeder of Aberdeen Angus cattle from whose ranch came the calf and also the grand championship fat lamb, a Rambou illet-Corriedale crossbred shown by Stuart Williams, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Williams.

The lamb topped out a light weight shown by Sonny Stanford and also a Rambouillet-Corriedale crossbred shown by Willie Ivy.

Spurclips given for showmanship went to Ivy, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Ivy, of the Bailey Ranch community, and to Mund. addition to winning first place n crossbred lambs, Ivy won second in both lightweight fine wool lambs and heavy weight fine wools. His crossbred, reserve champion of the show, was bred by Stanford and matched ropings, and contests of Sons, breeders of the first eight various types, are urged to be pre placing crossbreds.

The election calls for a \$100,000 bond issue for paving over 5 miles of the city streets. A second proposition is issuance of revenue bond to provide funds for the extensior of the water and sewer systems.

We have a 34-degree vault in which to hold quarters until they are properly chilled

and aged before they are cut. We have a sharp freeze vault in which all products will be sharp frozen at minus 10 degrees before being stored in lockers. Finally, there is the locker room vault in which temperature of zero will be maintained.

We could have saved money by installing conventional, old style lockers. Instead, we paid more in order to provide the latest and most convenient kind—Safeway Broadview Lockers—wide and shallow for your convenience, and with real "baked-on" white enamel. Then we went further and ordered good spring locks for these lockers instead of the cheaper kind found in most plants.

When it came to machinery, we not only bought everything new but also of larger capacity than we now need. Also, it is fully automatic, which insures even temperatures necessary to avoid deterioration of frozen foods. All in all, we feel that the plant is one in which the community can justly take pride.

From the beginning, we expect to render complete processing service at Eldorado for Eldorado patrons. The idea of doing the processing at San Angelo was a war time expediency. 



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

Federal Program For Lunchrooms Is Endangered

June 30, 1946 may see the end of Federal aid for school lunches and the closing of many school unchrooms unless there is a determined, organized action by all groups and individuals concerned

the needed rule. In the Senate the companion bill has not been pushed for consideration.

The Federal Government first established school lunch projects under the WPA program in 1933 to provide relief employment. Starting about 1935, the Department of Agriculture began distributing surplus food to school lunch rooms in order to relieve the surplus. Early in 1943 the war situation brought the liquidation of WPA and disappearance of food surpluses, and at that time the Federal Gov't began its present program of aiding school lunch programs through cash re-imbursements paid by the Department of Agriculture.

Now is the time to establish once and for all that serving hot lunches in schools is not an emergency relief measure, not a device for disposal of surplus food, but a necessity for our children's health school lunch crisis from arising each year and will guarantee that increasing numbers of children wil' have an abundant supply of well school day. Congress needs immediate and continuous evidence of widespread public support for the school lunch program.

The Federal aid for lunchrooms has permitted the local school to reduce the price of lunches 60% in the face of higher food costs, increased the number of pupils eating in the lunchroom approximately 50% and provided for the purchase of several hundred dollars worth of new equipment The emergency rules provide for a subsidy of 7c Note: The above prices includes for each lunch served to a pupil and 612.53 has been received from Federal aid by the local school.




