EAGLES SMOTHER ROCKSPRINGS IN GAME LAST WEEK

The Eldorado Eagles, sparked by Arthur Mund, downed Rocksprings 32-9 here in Eldorado Stadium last Friday night.

Co. Agent Describes Weevil Destruction

Killing cotton stalks immediately after the cotton harvest will reduce the boll weevils that the producer will have to combat next

Boll weevils destroyed in the fall by stalk destruction will reduce the number of over-winter weevils thus reducing the number of boll weevil poisoning applications the following cotton season. It is cheaper to control weevils by stalk destruction than by poisoning.

Weevils feed on green cotton. No feed means starving weevils that will die during winter. The longer the time between willing the stalks and frost, the more dead weevils before spring.
