





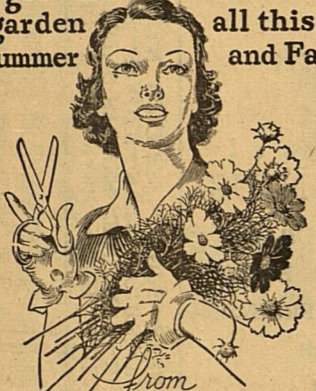
# School Chalks up Good Record at Recent Interscholastic Meet

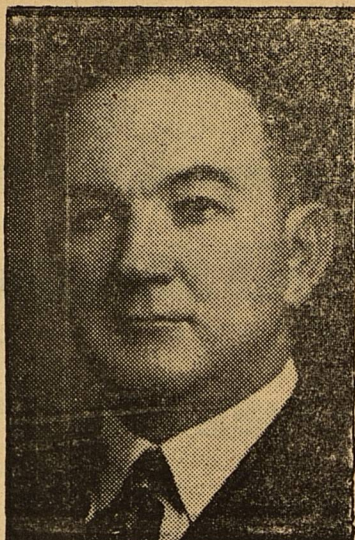

### Fire Tiles

Glazed wall tiles used in kitchens and baths are usually fired twice during production, the first time at temperatures exceeding 2,100 degrees. Glazes make the tile surface impervious to water and are produced in a great variety of colors and shades. The first firing of tile may require three to four days in the kiln. The second, at lower temperatures, usually takes two to three days.

### Statue of Freedom

The 19-foot bronze female figure which surmounts the capitol of the United States is the "Statue of Freedom." Originally named "Armed Liberty" it was modeled in Italy by Thomas Crawford from plans approved by Jefferson Davis, who was chairman of the committee on public buildings in 1850. The plaster model was shipped to this country where it was cast in bronze. At the base of the statue a wide circular band is inscribed: "E pluribus unum" (from many, one). The statue was set in place on December 2, 1863.

### High Crop Yields

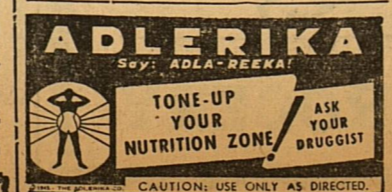

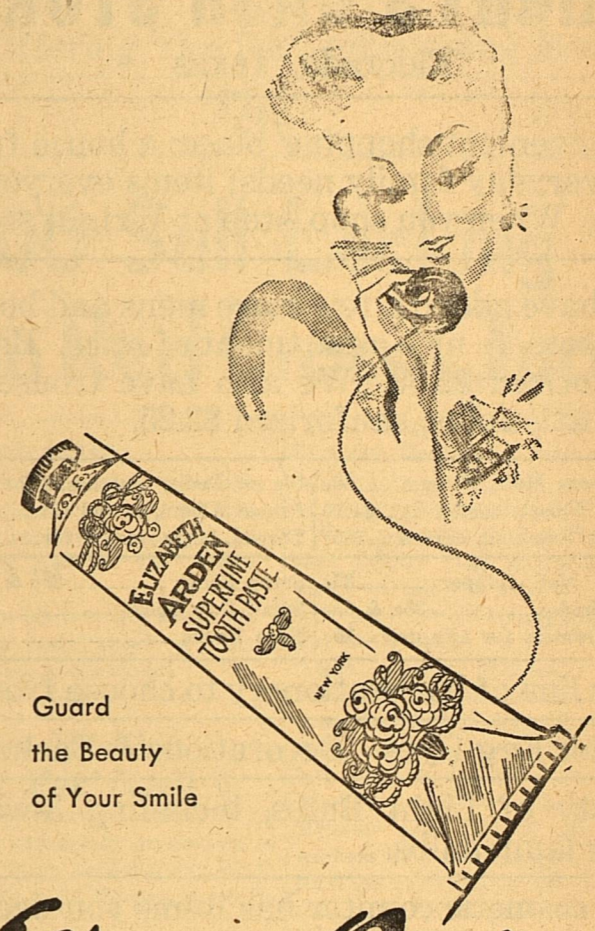

### Straw Vote

Steps whereby a bond election may be called, are outlined today by Edwin Jackson, chairman of a committee appointed by Don McCormick as a result of last Saturday's mass meeting on the memorial project.

Mr. Jackson explains that there is only one legal method of voting—that the bond election must be called to vote for or against ONE PROPOSAL. To determine consensus of opinion in Schleicher Co.

he states that there will be a "straw vote"—to be taken by use of cards which will be mailed out within the coming week or two. The cards will convey a ballot on two proposals—a memorial park (community center), and a county hospital. These will go to all voters in Schleicher County and are to be marked like a ballot and mailed back to the committee at once, to enable them to contact the commissioners at their regular meeting a week from Monday. Each voter is urged to cast his "vote" so that the committee will get a representative expression of opinion.

It is stressed that this is only a "straw vote"—but that it will enable the committee to narrow the field down to one preferred project for which they will petition the commissioners to call a bond election.

#### The Projects

Sentiment seems to favor two types of memorial, a recreational community center to be known as a memorial park, and a hospital. At the mass meeting Saturday, W. O. Alexander presented his committee's findings concerning the hospital, and Edwin Jackson represented the community center committee when he made a detailed report on their findings. Estimated cost of the hospital would be \$5,000 per bed, and of the recreational center \$45,000 to \$50,000, the committee heads reported.

The American Legion at first had considered the memorial as a Legion project, and had secured permission of the commissioners court to build on county property. Later, when popular demand indicated that a county project might be practical, the Legion returned funds to donors, and voted to assist the county 100 per cent.

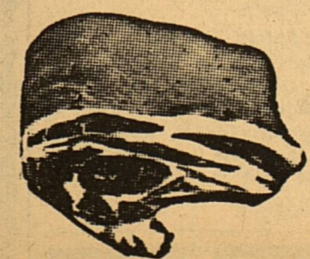
