The Annual Schleicher County Livestock, Food and Craft Show will get underway today at the 4-H Exhibit Building.

Entries in the Art Show and Women's Division will be accepted on Thursday, January 13th until 2:00 p.m. Judging will begin at this time. The Rabbit Show will begin at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday afternoon.

The show will resume at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, January 14th, with Range Ewe Judging followed by Range Angora Goats, Finewool Lambs, Medium Wool Lambs and Meat Goats.

The Dog Show will be held at 5:00 p.m. Any child in the community is welcome to exhibit their dog in this show. There are 2 divisions - one for groomed dogs and one for dogs dressed in costume. All dogs

must be on a leash and should be clean. Ribbons will be awarded to all participants. The Swine Show will start at 6:00 p.m. following the dog show.

On Saturday, January 15th, Crossbred Lambs will show at 8:30 a.m. followed by the judging for Champion Lambs. All Youth Food Show entries should be brought to the showbarn by 9:00 a.m. for judging at 10:00 a.m. Breeding cattle and steers will show at 10:00 a.m. A Barbecue lunch will be served at 12 noon. Presentation of awards and the sale will start at 1:30 p.m.

A dance will be held at the Showbarn at 8:00 p.m. Saturday night with music provided by Redline.

ECA Class Offered

The Schleicher County Volunteer Emergency Medical Service needs "a few good people."

An Emergency Care Attendant (ECA) training course will begin on Tuesday evening, February 1st. This provides state certification for four years and is recognized anywhere in Texas. To obtain state certification the course must be completed with a passing grade and the Texas Department of Health administers a skills test and a written test. The student must pass both tests before certification is issued.

Classes for this training

course will meet on Tuesday and Thursday evening beginning on February 1st and continuing through March 10th from 6:00-9:00 p.m. One Saturday will also be required during the course. The cost is \$35.00.

The class will meet in the High School Library. Class time will include both lecture and skills practice. Fred Barnett, an experienced paramedic from San Angelo, will be teaching this course.

Dr. Gene W. Rogers

Dr. Gene Warren Rogers, 72, died on Tuesday, January 4, 1994. Services were held on Saturday, January 8, 1994 at 1:00 p.m. at St. John's Episcopal Church in Sonora with the Rev. Monte Jones officiating.

Dr. Rogers was born on April 26, 1921 in Cleves, Ohio.

He had practiced medicine in Sonora since November of 1991. He was loved and respected by his many patients and friends.

Dr. Rogers was a veteran of the Armed Forces of the United States and served honorably in the U.S. Navy.

He received his medical training at the University of Cincinnati, interned at St. Luke's Hospital in Denver, Colorado, and completed his surgical residency in Los Angeles, California and Methodist Hospital of Dallas, Texas.

Dr. Rogers has served in the community and service oriented organizations including the Downtown Lions Club. He was Chief of Staff at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital. He is the past president of the Oak Cliff Country Club, the Private Clinics Hospital Association of Texas, the Federation of American Hospitals, the Board of Trustees of Midway Park Hospital, and the North Texas Clinic Association.

At the time of his death he was the president of the Society of Insurance Medical Directors of Texas, having been elected to this post by reason of his position of Medical Director of the Bankers Commercial Life and Provident American Insurance companies of Dallas.

Dr. Rogers is survived by his loving wife, Brigitte Rogers; his six children, Susan Smith of

Lancaster, Texas, James Rogers, M.D. of Dallas, Texas, Joyce Taylor, D.V.M. of Austin, Texas, Gary Rogers of Garland, Texas, Patrick Rogers of Garland, Texas and Heidi Rogers of Sonora, Texas; and eight grandchildren.

A scholarship has been established in memory of Dr.

Rogers. The Gene W. Rogers, M.D. Medical Scholarship will provide assistance for the medical education of a medical student from Sutton County. Donations to this scholarship may be made at the First National Bank, Sonora, Texas. Donations in lieu of flowers would be appreciated.

Have you ever wondered who are the people who respond to your aid when you find yourself in a state of emergency? Who are these people, trained in CPR and first aid, administering to your loved one in a time of need. They are the cornerstone in a system known as EMS.

Emergency Medical Service, called EMS, includes everyone and everything that an injured or ill person comes into contact with when that person receives emergency care, from the citizen who puts a compress on a bleeding injury, to the emergency care attendants who stabilize and transport the injured person, to the ambulance and its equipment that the victim is transported in, to the hospital itself and the physicians and nurses who specialize in emergency department medicine.

A medical emergency is sudden. It's frightening. And what happens in the first critical minutes can mean the difference between life and death. A blocked airway, careless movement of a fractured spine, unchecked bleeding, an apparently lifeless heart - all can

bring further injury or death. That's why emergency medical services systems exist throughout Texas to help victims survive those first critical minutes.

Eldorado and Schleicher County provide you with an EMS system capable of Basic Life Support. This means that Emergency Care Attendants and Emergency Medical Technicians are trained to help you in the following ways: airway management, bleeding control, splinting, extrication, and transportation. What makes your system unique is that volunteers staff your ambulance. They receive no compensation for their efforts.

All across Texas, hospitals and clinics are closing due to the high cost of medical care and the burden it puts on the local taxpayer. In many

instances, ambulance personnel have become the "family doctor." But just as hospitals and clinics are disappearing, so are many of the volunteer EMS personnel. What can you do to help?

An EMS system includes law enforcement organizations, fire services, funding agencies, regulatory bodies, and public education programs. But most of all, it includes you. EMS needs you to make the first vital emergency call that swings the components of an EMS system

into action. Because without that call, there is no EMS.

Your local EMS system is working hard to provide an Emergency Care Attendant course for all those interested in making a commitment to the community through EMS. Please watch for details and you decide who that person is administering first aid to a victim in a time of need.
