## Paving Bond Election Takes Place Saturday

With 328 qualified voters on record and a number of exemptions to be counted, at least 350 Eldorado residents are eligible to vote on the proposed \$100,000 paving project and an additional amount in revenue bonds for water and sewer extensions, Saturday at the City Hall. A large vote is anticipated. The paving project calls for paving of the following sections, a total of over 5 miles.

**West of Highway**  
All of Glendale, Ben Isaacs to highway, Ashmores to highway, Dr. Wiedenmann's to highway, Jess Walston's to highway, Loop around Eldorado school, Ellington corner to highway, L. L. Baker to highway, Kenneth Cheek to highway. With connecting block of paving from Church of Christ to A. H. Greens.

Highway to Chris Enochs intersection and on north to Dameron's Humble Service station to L. W. McWhorters, with two connecting blocks: Christian Church block, and Geo. Long to Joe Christian corners. Texaco Filling station to E. W. Brooks. Calcote's Eldorado Motor Co. to Frozen Foods. Christian Church intersection to Blaylocks.

J's Cafe to Mrs. G. W. Sofgee's. Irwin Mundt's to City water well Loop, 3 blocks, Ernest Hill to Van McCormick's to Dr. Pennington's and on back to highway. Utility Extension Revenue bonds will also be voted on, to provide 6410 additional feet of 6 in. water mains, with 5 fire hydrants, and considerably more sewer lines. The plan provides for water and sewer facilities for practically all property owners in the city who had not been previously served.

All who are eligible to vote are urged to go to the polls Saturday and vote their convictions.

## OGLESBY GETS FIRST VEHICLE LICENSE PLATES

Sam Oglesby received the first two license plates issued from the Schleicher Co. tax collector's office—No. FE1400 for his passenger car and RM 2650 for his farm vehicle.

Twenty-five had been issued up to Saturday afternoon. Owners of vehicles subject to registration in this county are urged to get their plates early and avoid the last-minute rush.

The Motor Vehicle division of the Texas Highway Department this week urged all Texas motor vehicle owners to see that the titles for vehicles to be registered in 1946 are in order. The law provides that before a vehicle may be registered, the owner must present to the Tax Collector the prior year's registration receipt and must have a title.

Many people do not understand the importance and value of the Title Act and do not realize that the Certificate of Title Act was passed to improve the validity of titles on motor vehicles thereby making such title comparable to an abstract on real estate.

Motor vehicle owners who have acquired used vehicles, and who have received assigned titles from the previous owners, are urged to apply at once for their titles in order that the transactions may be recorded and the new owners shown on the title records of the Department. Motor vehicle owners are also urged to register their equipment by purchasing the 1946 license plates as soon as possible. It is a common practice throughout the State for owners to wait until the last week in March, thereby creating congested conditions and long lines of applicants in the various tax collector's offices. The county tax collectors are experiencing difficulty in obtaining temporary help, and you will be helping them and yourselves by obtaining 1946 license plates during February or in the first part of March and not waiting until the last day or days.

There are some persons operating motor vehicles who may legally operate under 1946 out-of-state license plates, and these persons are cautioned to obtain such 1946 plates and apply same on or before the expiration of their present plates. There are others operating motor vehicles with out-of-state license plates who must legally re-register in Texas, and these persons are advised to purchase Texas plates immediately to avoid having to pay a penalty in addition to the registration fee.

Particular attention of the owners of trucks, truck-tractors, trailers, semi-trailers and busses was called to the fact that they must be prepared to furnish the tax collector with a complete description as to the size, type and serial number, et cetera, of equipment to be registered, and must be prepared to register for the actual weight of the empty vehicle plus the heaviest load to be carried, which under the law cannot be less than the manufacturer's rated carrying capacity. If in doubt as to the actual weight, the owners of commercial vehicles should have them weighed and present the weight certificate at the time of registration.

Lt. Montgomery, on terminal leave from the Army Air Forces, was reared in Schleicher County, and is a graduate of the EHS. He entered the service in Dec. 1942 and received his commission as a first lieutenant at Victorville, Calif. While serving overseas as a bombardier on a B-24 he was taken prisoner by the Germans after his plane went down in a raid over Germany Feb. 22. Lt. and Mrs. Montgomery are making their home here.

## STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION HAS HEARING TODAY

County Judge C. L. Meador, Jr. of Schleicher Co. and County Judge Adams of Irion are in Austin attending a hearing before the State Highway Commission on a farm to market road between Mertzson and Eldorado. The men left Monday for Austin.

The proposed road would connect Mertzson and Eldorado, both of which are county seats, with an all-weather highway. As the question has come up often for discussion, no promise can be made that the trip will result in immediate action—but the fact that the hearing was granted is interpreted as a favorable sign by Schleicher and Irion residents.

Six hundred people passed through the doors of the new Frozen Food Locker Co., last Saturday, when proprietors John Stribling of San Angelo and Jack Hext of Eldorado held Open House.

Visitors were shown through the plant, and were served doughnuts and coffee and received instructions in the use of frozen food locker facilities by two West Texas Utility specialists. The company will later announce the date for showing of a movie, an educational picture in use of the lockers.

The frozen foods crew are at work this week preparing meat for locker customers. The complete crew is as follows:

Meat cutter: Jack Whitten. Slaughterer: Noel Jones.

When the locker plant reaches its capacity production, it will turn out 2,000 pounds of meat per day. Maximum production, however, will not be reached immediately, due to unavoidable slow-downs in its first weeks of operation.

The lobby is not yet completely finished. It is planned to complete interior painting and to install office equipment soon.

### East Schleicher Co. Has Good Rain

A good rain fell in the east part of Schleicher County Sunday night, extending as far as the Sam Jones place. A rain was also reported at Sonora and locality, and east to Temple.

A general rain would be welcomed by Schleicher Co. ranchers who report that their pastures are bone dry, and that several inches of rain would be needed to give the soil the drizzling it requires for spring grazing and planting.

### Eldorado At Top in Dist Basketball Honor

Putting two boys, Bill Lewis Humphrey and Albert "Sonny" Stanford, on the first all-district basketball team and going into the finals in the district tournament at Mason last Friday and Saturday showed that the Eldorado High School Eagles cage team was something to talk about. The Eagles defeated Mason 49-19 in the preliminaries, then whipped Junction 25-11 in the semi-finals; giving them a shot at the finals with Ozona.

Ozona had beaten London 35-9 to get to play Sonora in their semi-final 19-17 in Ozona's favor. But one of Ozona's boys were found to be plainly ineligible and had to forfeit to Sonora. That meant that Sonora and Eldorado played off the final game. It resulted in a 25-32 score for Sonora.

## BEAUTIFICATION PROJECT PLANS ARE ANNOUNCED

The Beautification Committee, in session Tuesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Mattie Cozzens, will solicit funds for planting Schleicher's tree and shrub, the red bud and sage, in public places and along the highway, and home owners are urged to buy these at nurseries according to plans made by the committee members.

Present at the meeting were Mrs. Cozzens, chairman, Mrs. Louis Ballew, of DAR, Mrs. Robt. Milligan, of Home Dem. Co. Council, Mrs. B. K. Cheek, and Mrs. Jack Ratliff of PTA. Other organizations are urged to send representatives to the next meeting, which will be March 1 at 2:30, at the Cozzens home.

Cooperating with the state project, the committee plan to plant redbud and sage in profusion in public places and along the highway—thus causing visitors to identify Schleicher as a redbud and sage county. Home owners must make their own plans for the purchasing of the tree and shrub.

It is time to plant now, committee members state, and urge all home owners in Schleicher to cooperate with the project.

The following Governor's proclamation explains this state-wide movement:

Whereas, the Texas Roadside Development Program, a citizen organization sponsored and advised by the State Highway Department has for the past several years undertaken to encourage the improvement of properties adjacent to the highways, and

Whereas, the State Highway Department of the State of Texas has in the past undertaken to improve and beautify the roadsides of the highway system and has had unstinted public approval and support in such effort, and

Whereas, when peace is restored and Texas men and women in the service return home we hope to make our peace time state more attractive to them and to ourselves now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that we urge the cities and towns of Texas, through their Chambers of Commerce, garden clubs and various civic organizations, to inaugurate the planting and propagation of a county selected indigenous tree and/or flowering shrub in the yards of homes in towns and along the highways, or public building grounds, and entrances to towns and cities, so that each town and each county may be identified as a city or county of oleander, redbud, wisteria etc., depending upon its choice, and thus reflect a uniform and pleasing planting motif as a living honor to Texas men and women in the service.

When I finally consented to run, I did so with the determination that if elected I would give the office everything I had, and would make as good a sheriff as I possibly could. That is my promise to Schleicher voters.

"I have been away from home a long time. Schleicher County looks good to me and I appreciate my old friends more than I can say. This is the only place in the world I want to live. 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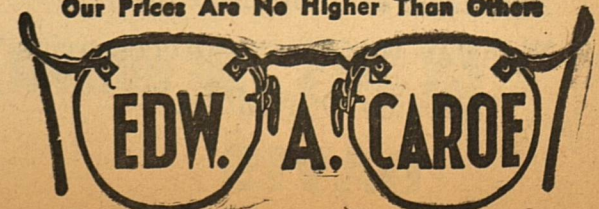

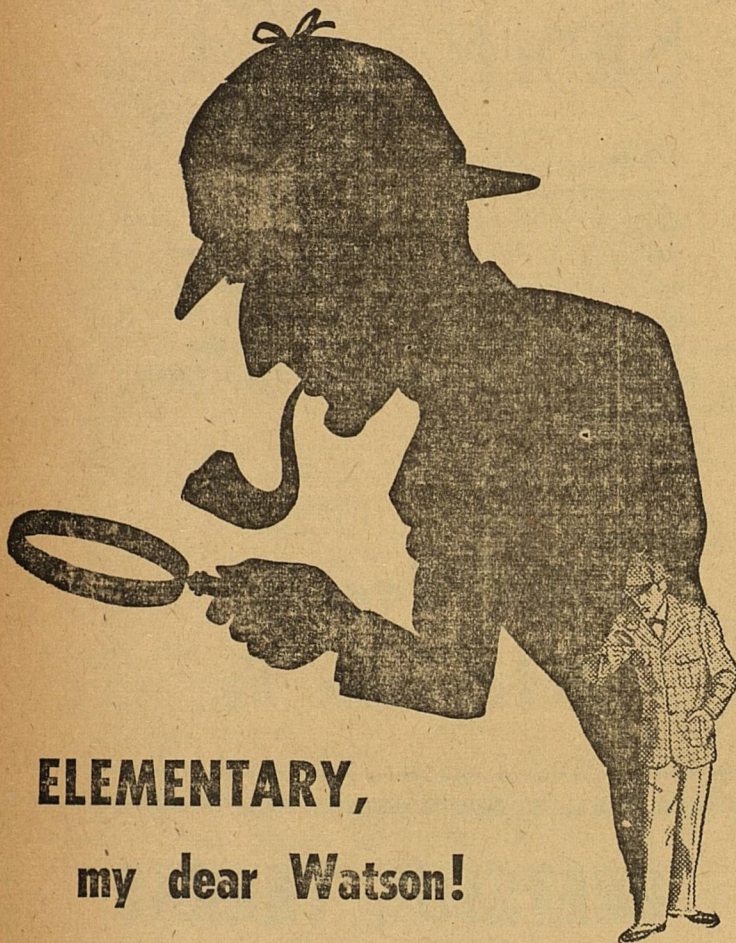
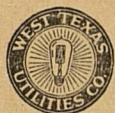

### Spraying Helps Peach Production

In order to obtain the best production from your peach trees they should be treated with chemical sprays in the springs to protect against disease and pests, says W. G. Godwin, Schleicher Co. Agent.

Maybe you weren't able to put on a dormant spray of oil to control San Jose scale. But there is still a chance for another crack at the pest this season.

A delayed dormant, or pink spray for scale control can be applied up to the time the buds begin to burst and show a slightly pinkish color. This treatment is conducted against scale and brown rot. This spray is made up of four pounds of lime-sulfur in ten gallons of water. Spray until the liquid drops from the branches.

There is a companion spray called Petal Fall. It is applied when about seventy-five per cent of the petals have fallen, or when the first curculio is found. Use three pounds of wettable sulfur, and one pound of lead arsenate to each 50 gallons of water. When arsenate is used in the spray be sure and use about two pounds of hydrodied lime to prevent damage to foliage and twigs.

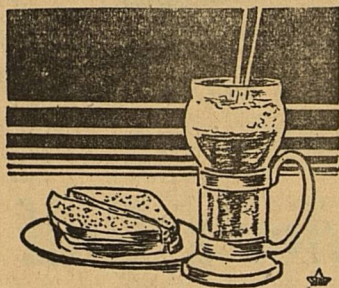

## CONTROLLING HORNFLIES AND CATTLE LICE WITH DDT

From the office of W. G. Godwin, Schleicher County Agent. The hornfly is a grayish insect about one-half the size of the house or stable fly. They are blood suckers that feed principally on cattle and to some extent on sheep, goats, horses, mules and dogs. The fly remains on the cattle throughout the day and night and usually feeds twice a day. It is not uncommon to see as many as 4,000 on a single animal throughout the spring, summer and fall months. Fly populations usually decrease during hot, dry weather in July and August. The female flies leave the animal a very short time to lay their eggs in fresh cattle droppings. The eggs are laid under the droppings and hatch into tiny white maggots within 16 hours. In about ten days these maggots change to flies which feed and live on cattle for about seven weeks.

#### Damage to Cattle

Large numbers of flies feeding on an animal causes endless misery. Hornflies are responsible either indirectly or directly for the following losses to cattle: A herd of 500 cattle loses about one gallon of blood daily to hornflies during the hornfly season (approximately 8 months). Raw places caused by hornflies feeding are often infested with screwworms. Animals cannot make normal gains when fighting flies and there is even a loss in weight, and reduction in milk.

A group of feeder steers in the feed lot treated for hornfly control gained 30 pounds more per animal than an untreated group during the same feeding period which was about 60 days.

#### Cattle Lice

There are three kinds or species of lice that attack cattle in Texas. Two are blood suckers, namely: the blue louse, or long nosed louse, and the ox louse, or short nosed louse. The other is a biting louse and is commonly called the red louse. All three species cannot live but a short time if not on the animal. The eggs of red lice hatch in about 7 days, while the blood sucking lice eggs hatch in 6 to 16 days. Lice are more abundant during winter and spring months when the hair is long on the cattle. In the summer when the hair is short few lice are present.

#### Damage

Heavily infested adult animals lose weight while calves make slower growth. Cattle on feed do not make normal gains and are unthrifty. The hair is rough and has a mangy appearance. Fences and corrals are often torn down while cattle are rubbing themselves. Lousy animals make poor showings at fairs and shows.

#### Combination Treatment

Until DDT was available the only practical method of hornfly control was hornfly traps. These traps are screen wire cages with flaps hanging from the ceiling to brush the flies from the animal as it walked through the trap. Previous control recommendations for cattle lice control consisted of two dipping: 18 to 21 days apart in the fall or winter in a mixture consisting of 100 pounds of wettable sulphur 10 pounds of 5% rotenone per 100 gallons of water.

Even though both of the above recommendations for hornfly and cattle lice control have given satisfactory results, a better treatment is now available. DDT gives excellent control of both hornflies and all three species of cattle lice. For hornfly control dip in a .1% DDT mixture when fly population reaches 100 flies per animal, or more or spray the animal's back with about 2 quarts per animal of a .2% DDT mixture. The first treatment protects the animal from hornfly damage about 10 to 14 days, a second treatment lasts about 3 weeks and a third treatment lasts about one month. Repeat the treatment when fly population reaches 15 or 20 flies per animal.

All three species of lice can be controlled by dipping twice at 14 to 18 day intervals with a .15% DDT mixture, or if the animal is

thoroughly wet with a .15% DDT spray at the same intervals as the dip. Regardless of whether the animal is dipped or sprayed, it is necessary to wet the animal thoroughly and especially the head, in order to get complete control of lice.

If the object is to control both hornflies and cattle lice with the same treatment, then the cattle should be dipped at least twice a 14 to 18 day intervals in a .15% DDT mixture, or sprayed all over at the same intervals with a .2% DDT mixture. If the above treatments are given in late spring, summer, or fall no treatment will be necessary for lice control during the winter.

Important: DDT does not lose its strength in the dipping vat, and can be used for the entire season unless the water is highly alkaline. To make a .2% DDT mixture use 3 1-3 pounds of 50% wettable DDT to 100 gallons of water.

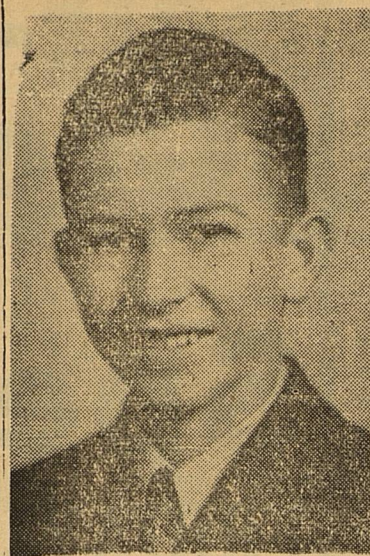
