The three fine modern 5-room houses are complete with hardwood floors throughout, and were put up at a cost of about \$9500 each. Partially prefabricated, the residences are ultra modern in design, and bring the total number of company houses up to 12. The new houses are occupied by O. M. Skipper, general station A manager; T.
