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REYNOLDS BACK FROM NAT'L MEET IN NEW JERSEY

C. A. Reynolds is back on the job as superintendent of the Eldorado Schools, after attending sessions of the National Ass'n of School Administrators in Atlantic City, N. J. Present were 10,000 U. S. school administrators, of whom 350 made the trip from Texas in a special train.

Among the main speakers were Robt. Taft of Ohio, who talked on federal aid, Ellis Arnall of Georgia on "Whose Country Is This," Dr. A. J. Stoddard of Philadelphia, on Educational Firsts, Dr. James Conant of Harvard, and many others.

Over 60 sectional meetings were held, Supt. Reynolds attending two on building planning and one on curriculum. Exhibits included everything from busses to reading aids.

Supt. Reynolds of Eldorado, Supt. Polly Wells, Sonora, and Supt. Supt. Murray Fly of Odessa visited three outstanding schools in New York City, including the famous Horace Mann school at Columbia U., and two others, and a Chicago University school, with the view to learning improved systems of grading, promotion, guidance, remedial reading, etc.

Mr. Reynolds states that he received much inspiration from his trip.

Principals Re-elected

Meeting in regular session Monday night, the school trustees re-elected Peyton Cain and Wendell Hall as high school and grade school principals. Others teachers will be elected at the April meeting.

School Census On

A. J. Atkins is conducting the school census and is anxious to obtain the names of all scholastics—children who are 6 after Sept. 1, or are still 17 at that time. Each scholastic means \$35 to \$55 for the local school, and should be reported.

An emergency census was recently completed, after granting of special permission by the state—the emergency census having been needed on the basis of oil discovery here.

A total of 81 scholastics who had not been included on the last census roll was compiled, and the emergency list sent to the state. If approved it will bring in a good sum of money for the school.

6-6 Plan

Supt. Reynolds states that he is considering a six-six plan to relieve crowding in the grammar school—the upper six grades would be taught in the high school building. The grammar grades have been crowded throughout the year, and several have had to be divided, necessitating finding of additional classroom space.

No. 1 Sam E. Jones Location Is Staked

No. 1 Sam E. Jones, location for which was staked Tuesday of last week, will be a wild cat test in south central Schleicher Co., location having been staked by Francis A. Callery of Ft. Worth. The test will be 660 feet out of SW corner of sec. 31K, GH&SA. It is 1 1/2 miles north of the Sutton Co. line and 8 miles southeast of the Koy field.

The Callery block includes 1400 acres—the south half of Sec. 31, northwest quarters of sections 32, 12 and 30, and south half of sec. 40, east half of NE 1/4 Sec 34, east half of NE 1/4 Sec 17, and SE 1/4 of NE 1/4 of Sec. 32, all in block K.

Lease holders are Texaco, Danziger, Magnolia, Shell, Hunt, Geo. T. Wilson, C. Andrade, Geo. J. Greer, F. G. Lippitt, Hill & Hill, A. W. Evans, Alvert Evans, C. G. King.

No. 1 Jones will be 4 miles north and three-quarter mile east of No. 1 John I. King, Sutton wildcat—SW 1/4 sec. 26-x-COSD&RCNG—which failed to develop in Ellenburger which it topped at 5160 ft.

The fire siren is again functioning due to assistance rendered by Aldermen W. M. Patterson and E. H. Topliffe and Gas Mgr. Palmer West, who repaired and put up the siren.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

J. W. Davis of the Reynolds community, cooperating with the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District, has put twenty acres of his pasture land into cultivation.

Nick Jureck, one half mile south of Moore's Gin, had terrace lines run on a 133 acre field last week. He established a system of rows whereby the point rows fall midway between the terrace lines. Jureck plans to build his terraces next fall with his own equipment.

The District Supervisors of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District met March 14 in their regular monthly meeting and approved applications for district assistance in planning a complete soil and water conservation program, on three farms and one ranch.

The applications approved included farms and ranches owned by A. P. Bailey, E. H. Sweatt, Thad A. Thomson Jr., and Arch D. Carson, totaling 11,383 acres.

COUNTY BOARD'S LAST MEETING IS MARCH 31

Unless a late change is made in the status of selective service, the meeting of the local board, scheduled to take place March 31, will be the last one, and the group will automatically be dismissed after that time.

W. F. Meador is chairman of the board, Ford Oglesby is secretary, and J. E. Spencer is the third member.

THREE HOUSES ARE COMPLETED AT STATION A

Completing of three new houses at Humble Station A and extending of two pipeline loops in the vicinity of Sonora have occupied attention of Humble officials as the company extends their holdings in a late winter expansion program in this locality.

The three fine modern 5-room houses are complete with hardwood floors throughout, and were put up at a cost of about \$9500 each. Partially prefabricated, the residences are ultra modern in design, and bring the total number of company houses up to 12. The new houses are occupied by O. M. Skipper, general station A manager; T. W. Reavis and Carl Gardner.

Other employees who live in company houses are Wilton Baggett, at present living in the school house but who will later occupy a company house, J. A. Lambert, B. B. Wagnon, S. T. Stricklen, P. B. Griffin, L. E. Ratliff and C. B. Reece.

The 12 houses provide living quarters for company men and their families—and by furnishing houses near places of employment eliminate driving to and from work, and having to find apartments and houses in crowded neighboring towns.

Contract has been let for two pipeline loops—2 1/4 miles of 10-inch line, crossing the Eldorado-Sonora highway 2 miles from Sonora; and 8 1/2 miles of 12-inch line, crossing the Sonora-Junction road 6 miles below Sonora. Work will start in a few days. Station A is in Schleicher County, two miles from the Sutton County line, and families get their mail through the Sonora office.

SEWER CONNECTIONS MADE

New connections on recently completed sewer extension lines are being made gradually, report city officials.

New residences must be connected with the sewer, if sewer lines are available, and state-approved septic tanks must be replaced in time with sewer connection, when repairs or replacements are needed. Under city law, the private cess pool may be used as long as it is functioning well. All houses which are built along sewer lines must be connected with the sewer.

ROPER'S CLUB IS ORGANIZED

A new year for the Eldorado Ropers' Club was ushered in Friday night, when an organization meeting was held, resulting in election of new officers and mapping out plans for the summer's activities.

Three directors: Horace Linthicum, Jack Jones and Norman Benson, were selected to head the group for the 1947 roping season. Dues were set at \$10, money to be paid to N. E. Britton, incoming secretary-treasurer. The dues will be used as a fund from which expenses of feeding the calves and repairing and keeping up the pens will be defrayed. Fifteen men attended the organization meeting, and more members are joining daily; last year's membership totaled 45.

The Brahma Calf Club, of which Linthicum is committee chairman, is selling stock at \$10 per share and members hope to sell 100 shares. This money goes into a separate fund to buy the calves. Members point out that a 50c profit per share was realized by share holders last year.

The Eldorado Ropers, who organized for the first time last year, point out that their main objective in roping is recreational, not commercial. They state that they have not perfected their plans for the season, as their immediate aim is putting over the membership drive, but announcement will be made later concerning summer plans.

Funeral services for Jess Bradshaw, 53, were held at 5:00 o'clock Friday afternoon from the First Baptist Church with the Rev. J. M. Hays, pastor, officiating. Special songs by the choir included "The Old Rugged Cross," and "Farther Along." Mr. Bradshaw died at 11 p. m., Thursday, March 13, at the family home here after a lingering illness.

Jess Bradshaw was born in Travis County, August 3, 1893, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Bradshaw. In 1908 he moved with his family to McCullough County, and in 1913, he was married to Miss Emma Kaiser of Sonora. To this union was born one son, O. B. Bradshaw. In the fall of 1928, the family moved to Schleicher County where Mr. Bradshaw farmed until recent years. He became a member of the First Christian Church in 1923. Mr. Bradshaw and his wife had made many friends in Schleicher County, and he was well liked by all who knew him.

RETAIL ASSN. IS CONSIDERED AT FRI. MEETING

A temporary organization for establishing of a Retail Credit Association was set up at a meeting of a group of 15 interested merchants Friday night. Carroll Ratliff was elected president; W. M. LAMBING SEASON AT HEIGHT IN MUCH OF COUNTY

The lambing season is at its height, and new-born lambs are reported to be doing fine in the warm weather which followed the recent rains. Much of the county is now in the middle of the lambing season, especially wooded sections in which early lambing is usually profitable. In open Divide areas the season may last on through most of April, as there is little protection from brush, and warm weather is a requirement.

GOOD RAIN IS GENERAL IN THIS COUNTY

Greatly benefitting West Texas ranges and farm land, general rain fell over Schleicher County Monday night, continuing most of Tuesday. Moisture which averaged better than an inch in most of the county, had already begun Wednesday to brighten grain fields and turn the ranges a greener shade. Farmers were of the general opinion that the slow, steady downfall would be a boon to spring planting and ranchmen who have been feeding stock since January, felt that it would put an end to this costly job.

Oats and other small grain were assured an excellent growing season with the steady fall. Some ranchmen termed it a "million dollar affair."

Rainfall in this county ranged from .71 inch to 1.5 in., with the Earl Cathey, Henry Mittel and J. F. Runge ranches and Vermont community receiving the heaviest. All parts of the county reported some rain, and Eldorado received 1.1 inches. Most of the west part of the county received about an inch, and the C. O. Bruton farm south of town reported an inch. Other reports were similar.

The rain followed the light precipitation of last week, which had left the land wet. Unpaved and unsurfaced roads of Eldorado and Schleicher County were extremely muddy, and even some caliche roads, weakened by hard freezes last winter, were soft and spongy. Cultivated land and native pastures will all benefit greatly by the precipitation.
