## L. L. TISDALE, FT. MCKAVETT RANCHER DIES

L. L. Tisdale, 68, West Texas ranchman, died at his ranch home near Ft. McKavett of a heart attack, Sunday night, May 26. Mr. Tisdale suffered a stroke some few years back and had been in ill health since that time.

Mr. Tisdale was born in Fluvanna County, Virginia, on April 8, 1878, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Tisdale, who were from two of the first families of Virginia. He came to Abilene, Texas, with his parents in 1882 and lived near Cedar Gap, now Tuscola, for about 3 years. His parents moved to Kimble County in 1886 and made their home near Roosevelt for four years until moving to Menard County; there his parents bought the Scutter ranch where he grew to manhood.

After leasing ranches for some time, Mr. Tisdale bought the River Ranch at Ft. McKavett where he made his home for 30 years. He was a breeder of fine goats and sold registered billies to many West Texas ranchmen. He also ran Hereford cattle and some sheep on his ranch. A typical West Texas ranchman, he and his wife made their many friends welcome and had built a guest house for the purpose of accommodating their friends, who always enjoyed fishing and hunting on their ranch.

Mr. Tisdale was married on Apr. 20, 1928, to Mrs. Josephine Jones of Dallas, who survives him. Other survivors include one son, Lewis, Jr., Ft. McKavett; a daughter Mrs. Yvonne Prugal, Abilene; two sisters, Mrs. Lottie Bolt, Junction, and Mrs. Cora Millar, Corpus Christi; two brothers, V. G. Tisdale, Eldorado, and R. A. Tisdale, Menard County.

He was a member of the Episcopal Church, and also a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Sheep

and Goat Raisers Association.

Funeral services were held from the Episcopal Church at Ft. McKavett, Tuesday afternoon, May 28, at 4:00 o'clock, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Stanley Howser. A trio of Menard girls sang the Lord's Prayer, and Menard women sang "Lead Kindly Light" with an organ accompaniment. ## KOY TEST DOWN TOWARD 5800 CONTRACT DEPTH

Drilling only about 70 feet in 24 hours in a lime formation, Parker Drilling Company is nearing contract depth of about 5800 feet on the oil test on the Jess Koy Ranch this week.

Little definite information is available to date, and it is understood that another week or two will be required before operators can evaluate what they have.

There is possibility of completely abandoning the test if a dry hole is indicated—or it may be drilled deeper, another test may be made if the showing on the present one is favorable, and if this one is a producer others will be drilled.

The crew will probably be here several weeks, in any event, it is understood.

Three resignations have been accepted by the school board, and one new teacher elected recently. Resignations include Miss Oma Ford, who is resigning to teach at Junior High in San Angelo. Miss Ford has been a teacher in the Eldorado school for a number of years, having taught history, mathematics, spelling, English and Spanish at various times in the grade school. This year she has served as Spanish instructor in both the high school and grade school, and was the senior sponsor.

Mrs. Bill McWhorter, the former Louell Wroe, high school English instructor for the past year, has resigned and will be at home in this county.

Miss Earline McFall, mathematics instructor in high school, has resigned and it is understood that she will marry at a later date. She is at home for the present with her parents in Cherokee.

## SOFGE IS GIVEN 2-YEAR TERM IN PENITENTIARY

Concluding a 6-day trial in Runnels Co., at Ballinger, the jury Saturday found Carl Sofge guilty of shooting his brother Clem in the business district of Eldorado October 22, and sentenced him to serve a penitentiary sentence of two years.

The defendant immediately filed with Judge John F. Sutton a formal motion for a new trial. On Schleicher's change of venue of venue order the case had been transferred to Runnels Co.

A five-man battery of lawyers had represented Sofge. He pleaded self defense, and much of the testimony during the trial centered around the question as to whether Clem was or was not armed when he was killed. Glenn R. Lewis, a special prosecutor, assisted Dist. Attorney Ralph Logan. The jury returned their verdict after 8½ hours of deliberation.

With the rendering of the verdict Schleicher Co. returns to normal activity. The trial last week had been attended each day by many from here, including most of the courthouse officials, the numerous state and defense witnesses and many others who attended for various reasons.

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## City of Eldorado Lets Out Its Belt to Accommodate Newcomers

Eldorado is letting out seams and moving over buttons! Slowly but surely the city is outgrowing its trousers!

An influx of crews has caused the biggest pinch—and crews have been arriving steadily. There are crews to work over Schleicher County's telephones, others to make electricity available to Schleicher and neighboring counties—but the majority are here to do something about the liquid gold which may lie within Schleicher County's mesquite, cedar and rock covered hillsides.

An overall resume of the situation reveals these facts and figures:

At least six construction, oil and

surveying crews are making Eldorado their headquarters, and others are expected to arrive at any time to join approximately 85 from out of town who are already here.

Taylor Construction Company, with a crew of 25, two thirds of whom are from out of town, have been here over a year, and will probably be here another year or two while work continues on the REA lines now under construction. Six new men joined this crew here in April, as availability of poles speeded up construction work. Headquarters are in the McWhorter building in the business district.

The San Angelo Telephone company has 25 men, composing construction crews working on re-

building of their telephone lines in Schleicher Co. The crews are completely rebuilding the company's lines in preparation for installation of the dial system. The new dial building is now completed, but installation of equipment will require many months, work to be done by company men during the remainder of the year.

Petty Geophysical Co., has a crew of 26 men at work out of Eldorado, 15 of these men being from out of town. It is understood that their work in this locality will require many months. They arrived in Eldorado in April.

Seismograph Service Corp., of Tulsa has 5 men on the job here on survey work for Phillips Oil

Co. Curtis of Mertzon, with 2 or 3 rigs, is working with this crew, but his men are camping on location, it is understood. Their work at present is east of the Cliff schoolhouse, near the location of the old Humble well. The crew is here on an assignment which will require 9 months to 2 years for completion—and it is understood that more men may arrive later.

The Parker Drilling crew, including 9 out of town men and 6 from Schleicher Co., have been on the job here several months, and within a few weeks will have completed work on the Jess Koy well. L. W. (Poochey) Ballew recently went to work for Parker, replacing one who left Eldorado recently. If

another well is drilled, this crew will be on the job here for an indefinite period.

Personnel of the Atlas Geophysical crew, with Robert Acker in charge, are arriving in Eldorado this week, after arrangements had been made here Sunday by crew members for living quarters in Eldorado. About 10 men compose the crew.

It is understood that Stanolind is sending a crew to Eldorado soon for Schleicher County survey work.

The new families are utilizing all available facilities in Eldorado, and are occupying anything offered, from trailers to all types of apartments. Married men with families are frantically looking for

houses and apartments. Some are located in quarters which are unsatisfactory at the best, and others have not yet been able to move their families here. Single men, while experiencing some difficulty, are finding the going easier, many having found rooms in private homes which have never before been opened to "lodgers."

In the remaining months of the present year there is the possibility of construction crews coming here for the purpose of building paved city streets, for building sewer line extensions, and for the building the new state highway to Menard—all of which have been authorized and voted, but which have not yet been let to contractors.
