Election Ordered For Annexation of Six School Districts

Possibility of a rural h. s. dist. for Schleicher County was brought a step nearer Wednesday afternoon when the county school trustees in special session, were presented with a petition signed by 270 Schleicher County voters, and ordered an election for August 19.

The action Wednesday came as a result of a Schleicher County mass meeting Thursday night at the courthouse, at which L. A. Wood, State Supt. of Schools, and John Olson, Census Director, presented this plan as most practical and workable in this particular county.

As three weeks must elapse before the election can be held, the date of Monday, Aug. 19, was chosen. If the vote is favorable, the last preliminary step in establishing the rural h. s. district will be calling of another bond election to raise the tax rate to not more than \$1. Order for the election of the 19th is being posted in the voting precincts effected.

At the meeting on Wednesday, all angles of the proposed plan were discussed by board members and school patrons. The question of transportation was brought out, and it was explained that transportation for students would have to be provided by the new district. It was further pointed out that eventually roads would have to be improved if busses made their scheduled routes, this being a problem which county commissioners would have to solve.

The proposed plan of annexation was suggested by L. A. Woods as being the most practical of three possible procedures: grouping, consolidating, and annexing. By annexing, the common schools effected maintain their original boundary lines and set-up, enabling them later, to vote the plan out if they desire to do so.

One school, Loftin, would be left out under the plan suggested, and six common schools, Adams, Mayer 1 and 2, Cliff, Bailey Ranch, and Kaffir would join Eldorado, an independent school, in establishing a rural h. s. dist. Pupils under high school age would either be brought to town by bus or taught in the schools of their districts—this to be worked out later. The rural high school district would be a board elected from the county at large. By law only 6 common schools may be annexed with one independent school.

Proponents of the plan explained Wednesday that the new rural high school would, by having more revenue, give better service in three ways: it would enable the board to pay better salaries and thus make teaching here more attractive to well-qualified instructors; it would provide better equipment for all departments of the school; and it would provide a more complete curriculum for the young people who attend. Those opposed to the plan brought out such objections as the higher tax rate, the distance children must travel, poor roads and fear that bus service would not be furnished as promised—objections usually raised when a step of this type is under consideration.

The schools will be pressed for time in putting the new program into effect, if it is voted in. Conveyances for transportation of children must be bought, the course of study mapped out, teachers hired, and the entire set-up put into workable shape within six or seven

weeks.

Whether the new plan will be accepted or rejected by Schleicher County voters is not known at this time—but one point was brought out many times in the meeting Wednesday—lack of sufficient funds has handicapped both common and independent schools, and in order for schools to continue to operate at all, more money must be raised in some way.

Preceding the Wednesday meeting, new trustees for the common school district were selected: John Reed, Loftin; Mrs. Lewis Tisdale, Mayer; Ford Oglesby, Kaffir; Carroll White and Forest Runge, Dist. 5; Otto Williams and Webb Montgomery, Adams No. 3.

KOY TEST NO. 2 NOW DRILLING BELOW 4500 FEET

Funeral services will be held at the First Baptist Church at San Angelo Saturday afternoon at 3:00, the Rev. A. C. Donath officiating, and interment will be in Belvedere Cemetery with Masonic rites.

Investigation of the accident revealed the fact that the window screen of the room occupied by Nutt was unlatched. A verdict of accidental death was returned by a justice of the peace.

The victim fell head first, and his body, clad in shirt and underwear, was found near the hotel curb.

He is survived by a son, a daughter, and three brothers.

Farm Safety Week Stresses Hazards

This is Farm Safety Week, states Don McCormick, manager of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-op. Throughout the nation, leaders in farm communities are stressing the importance of safety in the home, by pointing out hazards which should be corrected.

From Co-op Power, p. 9, July issue, comes the following information:

In Kentucky, a farm woman member of a rural electric cooperative had her washing machine in a shed in the back yard. She ran an ordinary extension cord from a plug on her back porch to the machine. When she finished, she "forgot," disconnected the plug first from the machine and walked back toward her house with the extension cord in her hand. As she did so, she stepped into a puddle of water and was immediately electrocuted.

If the extension had been disconnected first at the plug, or, even better, if she had disconnected the plug first and then the washing machine, before picking up the extension cord, the accident would never have happened.

These and many similar incidents add up to a slogan that will be emphasized throughout the Nation this month—"Treat Electricity with Respect."

Points to be remembered in regard to electricity are: Get expert advice before you wire. Have your wiring done by an expert. Have wiring inspected. Have proper ground wires installed on electrical equipment. Replace fuses with new fuses. Light up dark corners. Keep electrical cords in good repair. Use protecting guards over moving equipment parts. Avoid mixing water and electricity.

"Too bad it happens only every other year—" that is the expressed opinion of the average Schleicherite who this week is making plans to take in Election Day events in his county seat town.

Saturday will be a gala day in Eldorado, with an afternoon rodeo, numerous concessions, bingo games, and a bulletin board in which election returns will be posted. Most important of all, the day will provide an opportunity to visit friends from the far corners of Schleicher County.

A main attraction of the day's entertainment will be an Election Day rodeo, sponsored by the Eldorado Ropers' Club, at their arena, starting at 2:00 p. m. Saturday.

An elaborate program is offered, including sack race, calf roping, steer roping, barrel race, team tying, cigar race, steer ribbon contest, bronc riding, kids roping, and open matched ropings.

The club promises two hours of entertainment, the opening event being scheduled for 2:00 p. m.

The Eldorado Roping Club, the county's newest organization, has already staged several big jamborees, which will be topped by bigger and better performances Saturday.

The Lions' Club will take over the town Saturday night, with bingo games for which big prizes will be offered and a board on which returns will be posted as election results are available during the evening. As this is an event which concerns each voter in Schleicher Co., it is conceded that every able-bodied person who can make the trip to town will be here for the occasion.

The P. T. A.'s part in the day's activities will include sale of food, which will take place throughout the afternoon and evening. The club will sponsor a food stand near the bank building, at which cake, sandwiches and cold drinks will be sold during the afternoon and evening, and will also have a stand at the rodeo in the afternoon.

In view of the elaborate plans which the city and county organizations are making, one of the biggest crowds seen here in many years is expected.

VOTING SATURDAY

Voters will vote at their regular voting boxes before coming to town. While there is comparatively little competition for county offices, the state races, especially that of governor, promises considerable excitement.

Shivers Supports Good Roads Amendment

The Texas Good Roads Association has congratulated Allan Shivers, candidate for Lieutenant Governor, for his foresight in supporting the good roads amendment to the constitution.

A letter received from Charles E. Simons, executive vice president, informed Senator Shivers that his name was being enrolled in the permanent minutes of the Association so "that efforts in this regard will not be lost to posterity."

Shivers, on at least 51 different occasions during the past week urged an election based upon experience, qualifications and training for the position of lieutenant governor.

During his sweep of North Texas Shivers urged definite responsibility for granting clemencies to criminals by revamping the parole and pardon system, increasing the scope of the Texas Public Health System, stronger enforcement of the law to the end of preventing the growing total of traffic deaths, and commended the tenacity of the Texas League of Women Voters in its campaign for a secret ballot.

Four State Senators gave a public endorsement of Shivers candidacy in a thirty minute broadcast. They were Charles Johnes, A. M. Akin, Jr., George Moffett and Buster Brown.

Senator Shivers is scheduled to make five radio broadcasts during the coming week.
