Forty-five Cars Move CORRIEDALE ASSN ELECTS STANFORD NEW SECRETARY OVER THE TOP Schleichers '45 Wool

Last year's wool clip is moving out of Eldorado this week in abou' 45 freight cars, as the Eldorado Wool Co., makes preparation for Baptist Song Festival receiving the current season's clip

Receiving centers for the wool are warehouses operated by the buyers, Commodity Credit Corporation, at Lubbock and other Texas centers. By Monday a total of 32 cars had been shipped, leaving about 10 or 12 to go within the coming few days.

From 9 to 12 extra men have been employed by the Eldorad Wool Co., to assist with moving of the 200-pound sacks from the company's uptown warehouse to the main warehouse near the depot where weighing takes place before the sacks are loaded into freight cars. About 7500 bags are handled in the entire operation. All of this wool is from the April, May and June season, in 1945.

Bids on the two 1945 mohai clips-a total of 65,000 poundsare under consideration by the Eldorado Wool Co., who have already signed contract for the 1946 spring clip. The Eldorado Wool Co., use their smaller warehouse, known as "salt house" for storage of



Any memorial should be practi cal. it should be morally uplifting. it should meet some real need and it should be as nearly permanent or continuous as possible.

There is no question that a hospital would be practical. Texas lawmakers have recognized the fact that such is the case by passing gate Hospitalization for Schleicher a law making explicit provision for counties to issue bonds 'for the building, equipment and maintenance of hospitals. There is no question as to the legality of such a bond issue. This law also provides for the managing of such county hospitals by a board of citizens appointed by the commissioner's court, thus taking care of the future in a permanent, definite manner.

There can be no question of the need of such an institution in Eldorado for Schleicher County. At a meeting of the medical fraternity in San Angelo held Tuesday of this week it was stated that hospital facilities in this section were only about 60% of what is seriously needed and it is a well known fact







> "For one thing, a privately owned hospital begins as a poor investment because it must offer rates comparable to those of hospitals subsidies or by endowments and that are in most cases, tax exempt Taxes, etc., represent a continuous charge against operating income of about one dollar per bed per day. That means that the privately owned hospital must collect an average of one dollar more than the subsidized or endowed one. The cost of operating a hospital depends mainly on the number of its beds regardless of whether they are oc cupied, while the income depende upon the number occupied and the ability of the occupant to pay normal rates. Generally 70% of a hos-

pital's beds must be continuously occupied at the normal rate to enable it to pay expenses. This rate of occupancy in a small community is difficult to maintain.

"Most hospital authorities agree that no hospital of less than 40 beds can expect to give good service and live on its income.
