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## EAGLES UPSET JUNCTION ELEVEN HERE FRIDAY NITE

The Eagles moved up a place or two in District 8-B by beating Junction here last Friday night. According to sports dopsters Junction was due to beat Eldorado by a large score. But the local boys, showing more spirit and more ability to play football than they have all season, beat Junction 20-12. The game from the kick-off to the final whistle was a hard fought battle. Both teams played hard but clean football. Junction's backfield displayed speed and ability but was stopped time and again for no gain by a hard charging Eldorado forward. Junction got the edge on Eldorado the first half by making a touchdown in the second quarter. ## PAVING JOB TO BE FINISHED IN SHORT TIME

Still moving well ahead of schedule, in spite of delays caused by rain, Schwoppe Bros. are preparing to wind up the paving project in the coming two weeks, and move crew and equipment out to another location.

While the entire city is not paved, due to lack of funds to cover such an extensive project, practically all residents have paving accessible, and the town is out of the mud, in that most residents can take a paved route to the business district.

To make the paving more useable, many home owners and landlords have paved at the front of their premises, and caliche their driveways and in other ways improved their premises.

The city is expecting to join with Lions in conducting a safety campaign. It is the aim of the city officials eventually to eliminate all center parking. A plan of combined parallel and head-in parking will be worked out for the large sections of paving between the post office and the courthouse curbs, including the 60-foot and 75-foot strips which flank the center island which divides the traffic. Traffic from Menard and traffic from San Angelo, by keeping to the right, will be routed through more efficiently.

Schwoppe Bros. will spend much of their remaining time working on drainage, smoothing off of shoulders and clearing away of debris. Taylor Construction will probably be here many weeks before they complete the sewer and water line extensions.

## No Water Mains

White Schwoppe Bros. will have completed their 5½ miles of city paving next week, and the Taylor Construction Co., will probably have completed all sewer extension work contracted for, the latter have not even made a start on water lines provided for under their contract. The cause of delay has been lack of pipe for water mains, which will not be available until next spring—if then!

The Taylor Construction Co., have been granted an extension of time by the city, and will leave when their sewer lines are completed, to return upon delivery of pipe.

## GAS EXPERT TO APPRAISE RIO SYSTEM

Weeks of jockeying for advantages between the Rio Gas and Power Co., and the City of Eldorado, over the proposed purchase of the gas system by the City, resulted Tuesday night in appointing the Beavers & Lodal Engineering firm to appraise the system.

The city fathers are favorable to the deal, and the company would be glad to sell—but to date the two groups have not been able to agree on a purchase price. It is conceded by the city that the system is a going concern which yields good profits annually, yet much of the system must be rebuilt before it is in first-class condition—a factor which both parties are having to consider. It is understood that the company's asking price is in the neighborhood of \$80,000.00.

In charge of the appraisal will be Dix Fowler, of San Antonio, an expert on gas systems, who, with several assistants, and with the aid of Alan Sanders, city engineer of the Beavers & Lodal firm, are expecting to start on their several-day appraisal job at once.

The fact that both parties are anxious to have the system appraised would indicate that an agreement can be arrived at soon. It is understood that by Dec. 1, a report can be turned in by the appraisers, which will give the gas company and the city definite figures on which to work out what may be a compromise selling price.

The Rio system supplies only the city of Eldorado, and receives gas from the Page field 8 miles east of town.

## All Set For Doubling Size of S. W. Electric Co-Op

Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op., Inc., has received an allocation for \$260,000.00 to construct 254 miles of line to be known as Section B, build one sub-station and to purchase equipment to build lines. Orders have been placed for all materials except poles, and they will be ordered soon.

This will be known as a "Labor Only" contract, as the Co-Op furnishes all of the material and when enough material is on hand to construct 100 miles a contract will be let to build that amount of line. The R. E. A. has found this method to be very satisfactory and lines can be constructed at less cost. The Co-Op will build by "force account" with its own labor about 10% of the total miles to be built on Section B.

A sub-station will be built about 9 miles west of Sonora on the 66 K.V. line of West Texas Utilities to serve about 125 members in Sutton, Crockett and Val Verde Counties going south and southwest of Juno. Material suppliers are of the opinion that with the lifting of O.P.A. and with no major strikes, all materials necessary to build R.E.A. lines will be available much sooner than they had promised them.

The telegram announcing approval of funds for this project was received by Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op President P. K. McIntosh, last week, notification having come from the office of Arthur Gerth, chief of the Finance Division of REA. The \$260,000.00 will build 254 miles of lines in Schleicher, Sutton, Irion, Crockett, Val Verde and Tom Green counties, and the section known as Section B. will serve 174 families.

## THREE CARS INVOLVED IN ACCIDENT TUESDAY

## Tisdale Shallow Sand Discovered

An oil field development which may completely upset the dope in this county, has occurred here, with encountering of a good oil showing in the Tisdale test, 3½ miles east of Eldorado, early this week, at a depth of 2709 feet—as compared with about 5700 to 5800 pay depth in the Cooper-Koy field, 8 miles east.

Upon encountering the showing, drilling operations were stopped and testing started. As a preliminary to setting of casing, two drill stem tests have been taken, one core test, one Schlumberger and one directional survey.

The first showing was encountered between 2709 and 2729 feet, and a second at 2772. It is understood that casing will be set at 2774 feet. Casing is being brought in from out of town. Enough small pipe was on location for the job, but a larger size was desired—for use in case the drillers decide to go deeper.

The testing will probably require a week or two. Casing must be set, and after 72 hours or less, depending on the quality of the cement, this cement must be drilled out, the casing perforated, followed by acidizing and testing. Officials interested in this test converged on Eldorado Monday to look the situation over—including W. M. Holland and Rudy Grossenbacher of San Angelo, and Trustee Judge W. L. Elliott and his brother Cecil of Sonora. Others here who own acreage included Mrs. Velma Shirley and Rex Cushinberry of Sonora. Much of the promotional phase of this well has been done by Sonora people.

A new Woolen Mill output is wool yarn in several colors, on which contract has been let to a necktie manufacturer in New Mex. The spools of yarn are now leaving the mill regularly.

It is usually reported by oil men that a 2500-ft. well can be dug for about one-third the cost of a 5000-ft. one, and if a shallow field should be uncovered it would encourage drilling by many smaller outfits. Officials connected with the well are optimistic concerning the status of this test.

The official title of this well is L. W. Elliott Trustee, Virge Tisdale No. 1, located 660S and 660 E of N & W lines, sec. 16, block A, HE&WT RRCo. The drilling superintendent is Shine Swenson.

The oil development at Tisdale's climaxes a month of leasing activity in the vicinity of Eldorado. Some leases have been bringing \$20 an acre. Also there is a well founded rumor to the effect that at least two more wells, in addition to the producers in the Koy field and the wildcat at Tisdales, will go down in this county before Jan. 1st. About 75 to 80 per cent of the county is now under lease.

## James Bruton Leaves For Washington Job

C. to accept a civilian position with the Office of Strategic Service, which is connected with the State Department. ## No More Information On Menard Road Bid

No word from the State Highway Department has been received concerning the department's decision on Schleicher County's 14½ mile strip of highway, on which a low bid of \$179,781.36 was placed by H. D. Zachary on October 24.

While this bid is considered high and may possibly be rejected, no announcement has been made by the highway department to date. It is understood that if the department decides to have the state do this work, it will not delay starting on the project, slated for this winter.

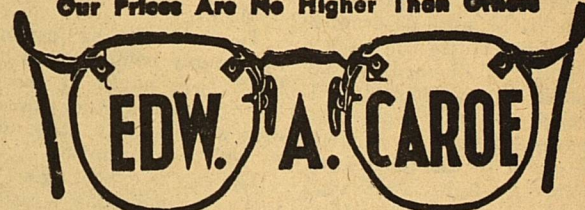

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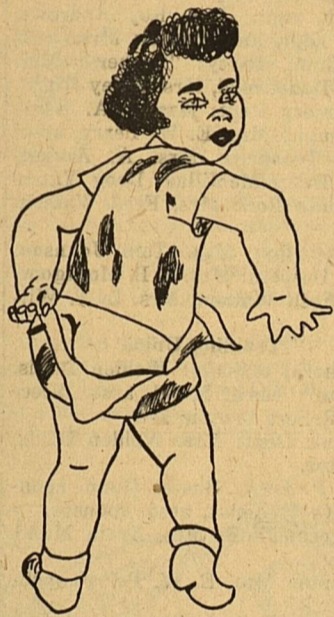

**Teacher Shortage Is Acute In Texas**

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey among city and county school superintendents to determine the condition in the public schools of Texas. Replies were received from 1,038 superintendents representing 35,874 teaching positions or about 78% of the total in Texas. The turn-over in the teacher personnel in the public schools for this year is the greatest in our history. 9,272 teachers or more than 25% were new in their job when school opened this fall.

Of the teachers included in the survey, 5,730 were listed with sub-

standard qualifications which represents 1 out of each 6 in the state. Superintendents reporting stated that they had in their school systems 2,157 classes with a student enrollment of 40 or more. The national standard for enrollment is 27 students in high school classes and 30 in elementary classes. This over-crowded condition has resulted from the shortage of teachers and, in many instances, a lack of adequate classrooms.

Today, Texas needs at least 9,000 qualified teachers to relieve over crowded classrooms, to add to the curriculum many subjects that have been eliminated during the war years, and to replace sub-

Supt. Charles M. Rogers of Amarillo, retiring president of the Texas State Teachers Association commented that: "Today if our public schools could employ immediately all of the students in the colleges and universities of Texas that are preparing to be teachers, we would not relieve our great shortage. I am sure that we do not have in our Texas institutions of higher learning 9,000 people today who are preparing to become teachers. We must raise salaries in Texas high enough to encourage those now in college to enter teaching as their chosen profession. I cannot see any other solution to the problem."

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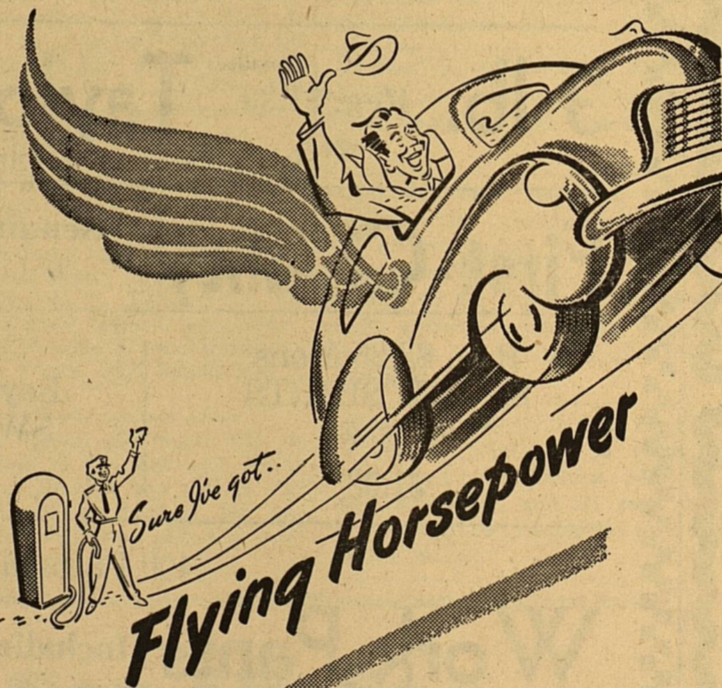

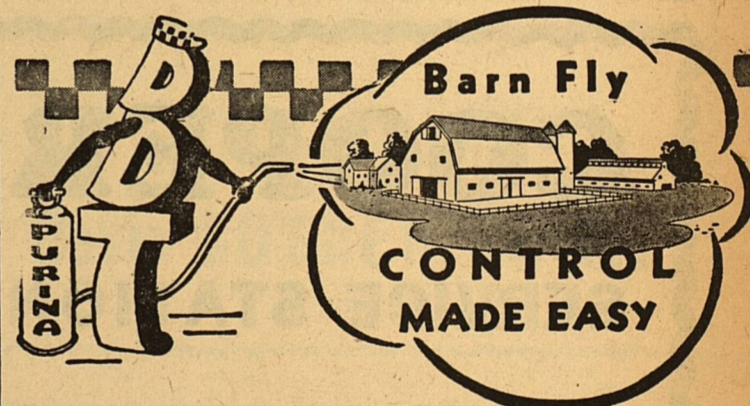

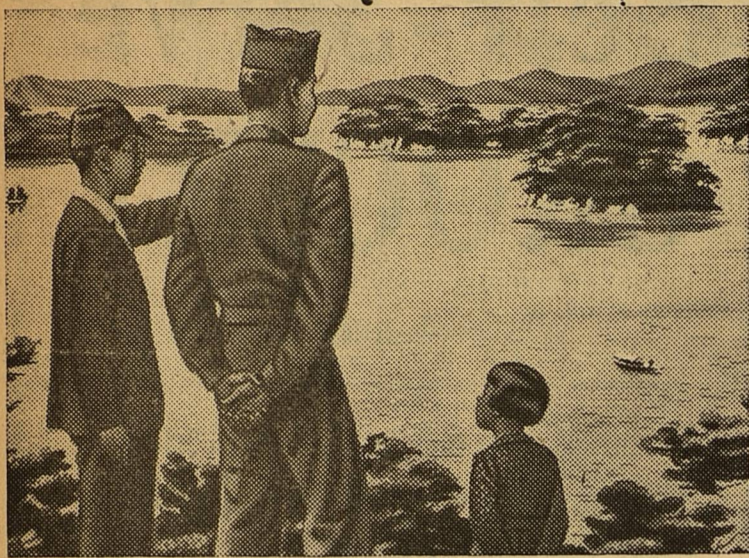

**Recipe Exchange**

Another favorite recipe for a dessert requiring very little sugar is the following Whipped Cream Pudding: ½ envelope Knox gelatine, ½ sup sugar, ½ cup milk, 1 egg, ½ pint cream, ½ tsp. vanilla, 6 graham crackers.

Soak gelatine in milk one hour. Beat yolk of egg, add sugar to milk and gelatine. Cook until it makes a thin custard. Cool, then add vanilla. Beat egg white and cream separately, fold together, then fold into the custard. Lightly butter a flat pan, sprinkle with graham cracker crumbs. Pour in pudding and sprinkle more crumbs on top. Place in refrigerator to cool.

## "Papa" Cain

Mr. Cain who, besides teaching history III, civics, being principal, coaching, and doing numerous other odd jobs, is our subject for this week.

He was born in Central Texas. His father was a merchant and his mother a school teacher. His father died when he was only 14. He attended two high schools and was valedictorian of his senior class. He was very active in sports, being a four-runner man and captain of various teams. He was also the president of a literary society. When a senior, he stayed back so as to be able to play football an extra year. "It wasn't a very great success, because we didn't win district," says Mr. Cain.

He attended college at Sul Ross State Teachers College. Mr. Cain made this statement: "I had three occupations to choose from—being a lawyer, doctor, or school teacher. I chose teaching because of the lack of finances." Mr. Cain made Alpha Chi and the Scholarship Society of Small Colleges of the South. He was also editor of the college newspaper and editor of the "Dirt Line" which was part of the annual.

He received his Bachelors degree in 1933, and his Masters degree in 1940. Mr. Cain says, "My mother, my brother, and myself hold five degrees from Sul Ross. And too, I kept six members of the immediate family while they went to college, from 1932-1941, and all but one graduated."

Our subject, as doubtless it is known, is always interested in sports. He has played football, basketball, baseball, tennis, and golf in Sul Ross. "In a modest sort of way, that is," says he. At any rate, he won a golf tourney for 15 years, and quit.

1942 found him holding an important looking letter which began "Greetings!" and was signed "Uncle Sam." So he was urged into the army with pvt rating. At the end of three months he was a corporal, and went to OCS. In 1943 he was made a second lieutenant and eventually he climbed to first lieutenant rating and then to captain. "On the 26th day of July, 1946, I escaped from the army," states Mr. Cain, and "I received the army accommodation (the chair borne and perfectly safe version of the bronze star) in March, 1946." For a bit of reminiscence of army life, Mr. Cain remembers most vividly the time he was mess officer in an automatic weapon outfit, until he memorized the TM10 (equivalent of army cookbook).

Mr. Cain hasn't been teaching long, only 21 years. He was married in 1930, and Mrs. Cain has seen him through most of the 18 years of civilian teaching, and three years in the army. "I saw an army anti-aircraft artillery school shrink from one with a faculty of over 2,000 instructors, to 136—and I was still in," remarks Mr. Cain.

The secret ambition of our mysterious principal is to take his PHD at or about the same time Beep (the recent arrival) goes to college. We wonder what Beep would have to say about this. Mr. Cain, among other things, was called "Beep" in the army—hence, the offspring's nickname.

## "Armistice Day" by Mr. Cain.

In 1916, a poet sang:  
In Flanders Fields the poppies blow  
Between the crosses row on row  
That mark our place;  
And in the sky the larks still  
Bravely singing fly  
Scarce heard amidst the guns below  
We are the Dead, the silent dead—"

School boys and girls, today have perhaps forgotten the fierce struggles in Europe of 1914-18, in which 100,000 Americans died. World War II is still so vividly with us that those who never knew World War I tend to dismiss it too lightly.

World War I staggered the minds of men of that time with its hideous waste and cruelty, its millions of dead in Europe, its starving children; its suffering and unredressed wrongs; these wrongs obscured by the clouds of lies and propaganda that helped lead to World War II, which in turn has staggered and horrified the minds of men with its wanton murder, cruelty, injustice, and death.

Let us remember and honor the soldiers of 1918, both living and dead. Their hardships were as real to them as any suffered by anyone today. The rain in "Flanders Fields" was just as cold; the mud just as deep and uncomfortable to sleep in, and the pangs of death were just as painful then as on the beaches of Tarawa and Normandy in the last three years for soldiers of only yesterday instead of yesterday.

So let us grieve for a day for the Americans who as bravely did their duty in those exciting years as any American ever did. Let us resolve that the blood they shed as well as that of the men in World War II will never be forgotten or wasted by cupidity or stupidity on our part tomorrow.
