William Mittel, 41, Sutton Co. rancher, and brother of Ben, Archie, Perry and Henry Mittel, who ranch in Schleicher County, died of a heart attack in a San Antonio hospital at 1:00 a. m., Wednesday, July 3. He had had an appendix operation 8 days preceding his death, and died Wednesday after a day spent in an oxygen tent when he sustained a heart attack.

The body was brought to Sonora Wednesday, arriving in town about 8:00 and at the family home about 10:00 p. m. The funeral will be held today, July 4, from the Methodist Church of Sonora at 4:00 p. m., followed by interment in the city cemetery. The officiating pastor will be Rev. Eldridge, Sonora Baptist pastor.

Born near Fredericksburg, Dec. 2, 1905, he had spent most of his life in Sutton Co., where he has been living on the home place near the Sutton-Schleicher county line.

He is survived by his wife, formerly Bernice Holman, two children, John and Martha, his mother, Mrs. Christine Mittel of Sonora, two sisters, Mrs. Joe Berger and Mrs. Charlie Hall, of Sutton Co., and the above-mentioned brothers.

Washington News Letter

By Congressman Fisher

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

The House moved fast last week, passed various appropriation bills, adopted conference agreements on Selective Service, OPA, a pay increase for Army and Navy enlistments, and other routine business.

Washington is going through another transportation strike, with taxis out of action this time. The cab unions are striking because of the District Committees in Congress have not acted to limit the number of permits for taxis here. Some cabs are running, however, and a few of the drivers have been attacked by hoodlums, presumably men on strike. But it seems that folks get along very well without taxis and 10,000 of them taken off the streets relieves the traffic jam a lot.

The Texas delegation of 21 in Congress will see a lot of new faces when the 80th Congress meets next January. Four present members are not running again. These are Hatton Summers of Dallas, Fritz Lanham of Ft. Worth, Luther Johnson of Corsicana, and Sam Russell of Stephenville. Summers came to Congress in 1913 with Speaker Sam Rayburn. They were sworn in on March 4 of that year and have served continuously since then. Rayburn rose to the Speakership, while Summers has for twelve years been Chairman of the powerful Judiciary Committee.

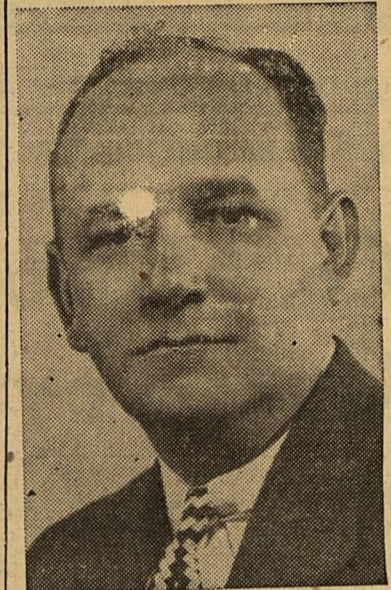
Fritz Lanham, one of the most able and beloved members of Congress has served nearly 28 years, while Luther Johnson is finishing his 12th term. Russell, who is quitting because of his health, will have served three terms.

Of the remaining seventeen Texas Members, six are unopposed. They are Rayburn, Worley, Pickett, Lyle, Poage and Fisher. Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls is one of the Texas Members who has the active opposition of the CIO-PAC. His race, along with that of Milton West of Brownsville, who is opposed by the

same group, is of particular interest here.

Generally, over the Nation, the incumbents have thus far been favored by primary polls this year. Of 184 members who have been up for renomination, so far only four have been defeated in the primaries.

Mr. and Mrs. Stevens, Mr. and Mrs. Swatzell, Miss Kleitches, and Jack Swatzell.

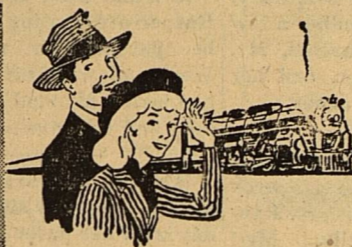
